Institutions of Higher Education (IHE) awarded may use distributions from PSTAA funds only to improve educational outcomes in early learning, K-12, and higher education, including, but not limited to, for facilities and programs for children and youth that are low-income, homeless, or in foster care, or other vulnerable populations to start endowments to provide support for improving educational outcomes in early learning, K-12, and higher education. At least ten percent (10%) of funds shall be designated for use by community-based early learning providers. PSTAA fund recipients shall expend a portion of their PSTAA funds on new and/or innovative early learning programs.

#### Description of proposed use of funds:

#### Focus: Access: Barrier-free access to higher education

Research shows that waiving college application fees increases college matriculation (particularly for students at under-resourced high schools and community colleges receiving college counseling) and induces high-achieving students from low-income backgrounds to apply and be admitted to more selective institutions. College application fees can even be obstacles for students from higher-income backgrounds.

Washington State University Everett will eliminate these barriers for local students through a series of new scholarships for new and enrolled students residing within the RTA.

Confirmation fee scholarship (\$200 per confirmed student)
For Fall semester of 2023 alone, WSU Everett received 211 applications from college-ready individuals. The barrier-free application program will save students about **\$42,200**, eliminating a major barrier and providing a platform from which to launch their futures in Snohomish County.

Another component to barrier-free access to education is housing. WSU Everett also aims to serve students facing food insecurities, housing insecurity and/or unhoused. Funds will be used to rent out space either at Everett Community College or local dwellings to provide a transitional opportunity for unhoused or housing insecure students until more stable housing can be secured. Providing these new housing services will significantly improve student retention for students facing housing challenges so that they can focus on their classes and studies.

### **Scholarships**

College is expensive. <u>According to CollegeBoard</u>, in the past decade (2007-2017), tuition rates rose 37% at public four-year colleges. That rate jumps to 213% when comparing current tuition with that of just 30 years ago, accounting for inflation. With no end in sight to the continual increase in the cost of an education, low- and middle-income students are facing more difficult choices than ever.

We have a unique opportunity to support Snohomish County students within the Sound Transit Regional Taxing Authority, particularly for families with young children.

Based on financial need and/or academic achievement, WSU Everett will offer current-use scholarships during the 2023-24 academic year.

A total of **\$140,000** will be disbursed as scholarships for students in financial need, those who have demonstrated academic achievement at their community college and shown community involvement through work and volunteerism.

# Focus: Retention, Success, and Completion

Proactive advising leads to gains in retention and completion, <u>according to studies</u>. But a <u>report from the Center for Community College Student Engagement</u> shows that effective advising may have a larger impact on returning students and thus colleges' persistence and graduation rates.

The report highlights that 78% of returning students reported meeting with an adviser, compared to 62% of entering students. According to CCCSE, that detail is significant

because less than 50% of first-time-in-college students return to the same institution the following fall, indicating that early advising leads to increases in retention.

Participants in our new barrier-free access to higher education program will be required to complete specific learning during their studies, including mandatory advising and new University 101 seminars that will provide students with the tools they need to succeed, stay in school, and complete a degree.

Internally at WSU Everett, we are experiencing more engagement for retention and completion through student-on-student interactions. WSU Everett proposes to utilize allocations from the Funds for Service in direct support of campus initiatives such as Student Influencers, the Cougar Food Pantry, the Cougar Closet, and Childcare Services to enhance campus culture focused on student success, retention, equity, and inclusion.
