I. Action on Items from Committee

1. Finance and Economic Development

There being no objections, Council Chair Dunn took the agenda out of order for the item under Committee of the Whole to be discussed and considered along with items under Law and Justice/Human Services Committee.

2. Law and Justice/Human Services

a. Motion 22-330, approval of Real Estate Purchase and Sale
Agreement between Harman Investment Group, Inc. as
seller and Snohomish County as buyer for real property
located at 1602 SE Everett Mall Way, Everett, WA, Identified
by Tax Parcel Number 28051800400600

Heidi Beazizo, Senior Legislative Analyst, provided a staff report for Motion 22-330 and Proposed Substitute Motion 22-338. She also explained Motion 22-314, relating to budget transfers of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds in Grant Control Fund 130 for the proposed purchase of hotel buildings and for contracts related to treatment and behavioral health.

Executive Dave Somers addressed the Council in strong support of the three motions. He provided additional information relating to the County's proposal to use ARPA funds to purchase hotels for bridge and permanent supportive housing, with 24/7 wrap around services.

Discussion ensued as Executive Somers, along with Mary Jane Brell-Vujovic, Human Services Director, Kara Main-Hester, Chief Recovery and Resilience Officer, and Ken Klein, Executive Director, responded to questions from Councilmembers relating to details and conditions of the purchase and sale agreements, project and renovation timeline, property appraisals, cost per unit, cost of operations and maintenance, security, restrictions on the use of ARPA funds, and data analysis.

Councilmember Low expressed appreciation to staff for their work, but he also conveyed concerns regarding the hotel property in Everett. He questioned the purchase process and provisions for cancelling the agreement, in the event that the County finds problems with the property. He also noted concerns relating to costs.

Councilmember Nehring explained the need for a requirement or code of conduct for those receiving housing services to participate in chemical dependency treatment services, if they have a substance use disorder. He requested that the Council delay action on the purchase agreements at this time.

Councilmember Wright spoke in support of the motions and thanked staff for their time and work in putting together the information. She noted that the proposals will make a difference to address homelessness and will provide 129 beds in time for the winter.

Council Vice-Chair Mead noted the need for data follow up and analysis of people who receive services. He also expressed support of the motions, however, he opposes placing restrictions for those participating in the County's housing projects.

Council Chair Dunn expressed support of the motions. She also indicated the need to think of those who have been helped by providing bridge and permanent supporting housing, as well as those who could be helped with the current proposals.

ACTION: Council Vice-Chair Mead made a motion to approve Motion 22-330. Councilmember Wright seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of three to two, with Councilmember Low and Councilmember Nehring opposing.
