Dear Members of the Snohomish County Council,

After reviewing the proposed budget, I would like to request that 2 million from the Roads Maintenance budget, and 1 million from the Solid Waste budget be transferred to the Parks Construction budget.

This extra money could be used to update the Evergreen Fairgrounds to make winter use of the recreation center safer for all who use the facilities. This money could also be used towards new construction of outdoor recreational facilities for motorized recreation that the council concluded that had a place in Snohomish County"s vision for its citizens and their children.

I believe cutting out deicing chemicals and using salt on our roads would greatly reduce the financial impact of winter snow and ice removal. There are not any long term studies of the effects of these products to our environment to tell us if it is safe, these products promote corrosion of vehicles that leave deposits of harmful pollutants on our roads and stormwater systems. These products also force water to run off in times that we need that water to slowly infiltrate back into our struggling auqafirs. All this runoff flows untreated into our Salish Sea and raises the salinity that causes major changes to the acidity and makes it hard for native species to survive. By only using sand or wood products seems like the most practical way. They are environmentally safer while pollutants bond to the material that is later cleaned up and disposed of by sweepers, Vactor trucks and ditch cleaning equipment.

The maintenance nightmare for Snohomish County Fleet will also improve because Road Maintenance equipment will not be failing due to the corrosion and break down of the structural equipment used to spread these chemicals and drive on them. Brake systems on everyone's vehicles are being compromised and could cause potentially devastating fires from brake linings getting too hot and catching on fire.

I also believe Solid Waste has some room to give a little to the Parks Construction fund. I was advised today by a staff member at the Arlington Transfer Station, "that since it was the government, that the safety issue that I addressed, would never get fixed." Clearly if Solid Waste isn't going to fix their facilities to keep ratepayers safe, they could use that part of the budget to help promote safe motorized recreation.

There is standing water where the public has to stand and dispose of their garbage, this is caused because of drop box trucks slamming their boxes on the ground to shake the load out of the drop boxes. This is breaking the concrete up and has created a 1 inch deep hole that collects water and creates a potential slip hazard. Apparently the drivers are not supposed to do this but it has become standard practice that causes damage to our facilities. I witnessed an elderly gentleman trying to scoop the water out of the way, with a stick, so he didn't have to stand in it. I grabbed a broom and swept the water out for him. He thanked me and said he didn't like standing in water, I agreed and then brought the issue up to the employee.

I believe placing a steel plate in this location would fix the problem, if they cannot stop drivers from breaking Solid Waste policy.

Subject: Objection to Budget Proposal for Parking Lot Swap at Lord Hill Park Recreational Park

Hello Snohomish County Council Member and to Whom it may Concern,

Thank you for providing me with the opportunity to express my opinion regarding the upcoming budget proposal for the intended parking lot swap at Lord Hill Recreational Park. My name is Candy Dysart and I have lived in Snohomish County on Lord Hill near the park entrance since 2004. I have resided in and through property taxes, have financially supported Unincorporated Snohomish County for over 45 years.

I feel the need to voice my opinion about the proposal of spending \$2,000,000. on parking improvements. I am asking the council to reject this unfair spending designed entirely to convert the park for Speed Bike usage and forcing less for Equestrian usage for the following reasons:

- 1. The lower parking lot is already perfect for the current usage required for horse trailers and the safety of parking, safety for possibility of loose horses, and not a steep grade like the upper lot. The upper lot could be easily modified to accommodate additional general use car parking along most of the entryway where the play area remains. I do not feel the expense is justified on something so frivolous and unfair as swapping the parking lots. It seems this effort is for the purpose of satisfying one group of cyclists who have taken over some of the trails that used to be all purpose. The converted trails are not for anyone but speed bikes and make the connecting all purpose trails unsafe for everyone. All park users, including bikes, are supposed to yield and that doesn't always happen. It is very evident that the growing popularity of fast mountain bikes has taken precedence over every other user of the park and squeezing out equestrian usage by limiting park access. The proof of this is the willingness to spend \$2,000,000 to swap parking lots to make it happen.
- 2. There is no better design that works in the Equestrian lot that incorporates the lay of the land without ruining the current environment. It is sloped, it drains well, and there is a proper turning radius for larger horse trailers, so it's best to just leave it alone!
- 3. With the cramped small area of the upper lot, I would never be able to maneuver or safely park my extended crew cab truck with an extra large 3 horse trailer. Even if there were no other trailers in the lot, the turning radius for me is too tight. Not to mention driving too close to horses preparing to ride that are tied to trailers. I won't even try because it is way too dangerous. If this swap takes place, you will have forced me out. Even if I drove all the way around the park to the other lot off Tester Road, it would not accommodate larger trailers either, especially while people are fishing.
- 4. There is a huge problem with safety on the trails with High Speed Mountain Bikes, E-bikes and loose dogs. A collision of a Speed Bike and a horse with a rider or a hiker is a substantial risk of death or serious injury supporting reckless endangerment. What is going to be done to avoid this from happening? This is much more important than unnecessarily spending 2 mil on a parking lot. How is

Snohomish County going to keep users safe throughout the park without massively increasing Ranger enforcement?

- 5. Let's first improve safety on the trails and **abandon all speed traffic** from the park entirely. The **speed in the park should not be faster than a person can jog.** This does not mean to abandon the current traffic rules in the park to yield to Equestrian traffic and stop until you get an 'OK to proceed' from the equestrian rider acknowledging they have their horse under control. The slower speed would be safe for everyone using the park. This would alleviate accidents, mishaps, arguments between users and make the park a peaceful place instead of a potential crash course. I feel unprotected with the current looseness of rule enforcement and am forced to use the park at off hours in an effort to avoid careless Speed Bike traffic.
- 6. The signage for Speed Bikes Rules in intersections and 'no bike' areas was intended to be followed, but they are ignored. I have had personal dangerous experiences and near mishaps. I was dumped when a bike came from behind some trees at an intersection and my horse spooked. I understand the necessity to have a place where Speed Bikes can race. It should be another location other than Lord Hill Rec Park where they can go as fast as they want, when they want and not have to worry about injuring other park users. There are hardly enough close by safe places that people can go to enjoy the solitude and peace like Lord Hill Park without the worry of someone coming around the corner at full speed.
- 7. Another point is that I would rather see funds spent on security in the parking lots as well as the entire park. This would certainly deter destruction of property and encourage following the rules. If that means to require a parking permit, then maybe that might be in order. How much would it cost to have a security guard at the street entrance? There should be better signage with park rules posted also. I wonder why Bridle Trails State Park works so well? There are no bikes allowed in the park at all. There is also part time security at the entrance and park officials seen throughout the park. Currently there is no show of force at Lord Hill Park. Portable toilets are vandalized, garbage is dropped in the lots anywhere and dog poop bags are left on the trails. I often see tire scratch marks in the dirt where someone is doing donuts in the gravel and leaving ruts. More signage is needed to not leave horse poop behind also in the trailer parking area. It seems like the Ranger position could use a lot more show of authority and assistance throughout the park and punish offenders with a citation.
- 8. Logically and with safety in mind, it will NEVER work out having Speed Bikes on any path with pedestrians and horses especially with population growth and more users to the park. For that reason, Speed Bikes and E-Bikes should be excluded from the park and relocated to a more suitable area. The majority of the funds available could go to support a 'SPEED' cycle park at another location.

I totally understand that there are people that ride bikes, instead of horses, that just want to casually enjoy the tranquility of the trails along with hikers, joggers, dog walkers, and visitors that like to take the family out for a stroll. This slower moving group, for the most part, have learned to yield to horses and to be respectful of each other with posted information and friendly encounters.

Thank you for reading this and taking these points into consideration. I am looking forward to a peaceful and safe outcome where I can be safe and room to park my truck and horse trailer.

Council Member Dunn,

Thank you for your explanation. I appreciate the clarity as I'm not familiar with the budget process. The word "block" came from another Council Member's response.

Hikers and equestrians have been raising these ongoing safety issues for a decade with Parks, but our reports of incidents and concerns have fallen on deaf ears.

There was no public process in the decision to swap parking lots. Parks is only addressing the parking lot which doesn't solve the real problems on the trails and creates even more safety issues.

I'm aware that it would be unusual to schedule a ranger at Lord Hill, but Lord Hill is a unique situation. At 1,463 acres and nearly 30 miles of trails, it's the largest park in the county system. The extreme sport of high-speed, downhill biking is mixed in with other slow users. Many parents come with small children running back and forth across trails. There often are other parents with baby stollers. A few years ago, a high-speed bike rider came within an inch of hitting a baby stroller.

These extreme bikers need a dedicated downhill bike location.

We have requested a ranger be scheduled at various times to provide a presence and enforcement. This would solve the bulk of the problems. Any rangers added for Lord Hill could also be used across other parks. Signs play an important role, but a large percent of park users ignore them. If these bad actors thought they might see a ranger on the trail, many folks would clean up their acts. Right now it's common knowledge that rangers are not scheduled in the park.

Just today we encountered four women with five large off- leash dogs. The dogs were out of control and charged at our horses about 9 am and again about 10:30 am. It was an intense and difficult situation to handle and could have ended very badly. We know of other people, dogs and horses that have been injured in off-leash dog attacks in the park.

We hope we have your support to craft an amendment that blocks funding for the parking-lot swap and improves safety throughout the park now — not in three to five years — and is cost effective.

I would welcome an opportunity to talk with you about my perspective if more history would be useful.

Dear Joan.

Thank you for continuing to be engaged with matters regarding Lord Hill Park and taking the time to write in and share your concerns.

As you know, Council has been reviewing and deliberating the Executive's Proposed 2024 Budget, and at our October 25 council meeting, councilmembers had our first discussion about Council-proposed amendments and Budget Conditions/Notes. The purpose of this meeting was to take a first look at the totality of councilmembers' proposals and

determine which items already have consensus from the full council. These items with no concerns or requests for further information are then moved to a consensus slate and will voted on all at once at the final budget hearing. If a councilmember had a question, concerns, or requests for more information then an item was flagged for more clarification from staff before the item comes back before council for a final vote at the final budget hearing.

CM Nehring did not support the two Park Ranger positions because they did not have new revenue associated with them. I asked for continued conversations on the two items regarding Lord Hill Park because the amendments and notes as written were ambiguous and necessitate further information from our Parks Department before implementing. My analysis didn't show that they are ready for a final vote as-is and I wouldn't support a poorly written amendment. One amendment would add two park rangers, one of which would be assigned full-time at Lord Hill Park. Snohomish County has a large parks system and manages 12,000 acres of parks across 121 park properties and adding a Ranger at just one park is not in line with department practices.

The Budget Condition that was proposed stated that the money appropriated for the Lord Hill Parking Lot improvements would be conditional "until a community supported construction plan has been presented to Council". I asked that before we move this to a final vote, there was further clarity on what a "community supported construction plan" is, how that would be agreed upon, and who would do the work to put this together. If there was opposition from one sector, such as bicyclist or equestrian groups, this poorly written condition would prevent any improvements from happening.

Councilmember Peterson also shared my concerns asking if there is necessary staff time and cost from our Parks Department to do that work, and Councilmember Low also agreed and supported that it would be pulled for further discussions and analysis. It's also not clear if the funding source for capital improvements could be used for community outreach.

Sharing concerns on items at this week's budget meeting was not a "block"; it was calling out an opportunity to make sure we get things right before setting a ball in motion that has unintended consequences or a financial requirement of the county that we can't meet. I hope Councilmember Low is willing to work with the Department and council to find consensus.

I listened closely to the testimony that you and many of your fellow trail users shared at council meetings and am hopeful that we can get to a decision that meets your needs and works well for everyone, but to get there, we need further discussions.

Good morning, Council Member Dunn:

I'm writing because I understand Council Member Sam Low presented a proposal to the Snohomish County Council on Wednesday Oct. 25, 2023, for more Park Rangers at Lord Hill Park and to block funding for the parking-lot swap unless the equestrian community is engaged for support, and that you blocked it.

What are your concerns about Council Member Low's proposal for improving safety within Lord Hill Park for all users — hikers, equestrians, bikers, etc.?

Are you willing to support improving safety for all users, including the equestrian community?

I'm surprised that any candidate endorsed by the Washington Conservation Action and Sierra Club would oppose a project that preserves Lord Hill as the slow, quiet, serene haven it was created to be for all users — hikers, equestrians and bikers. The Land Conservancy also was involved with enhancing this nature park with a large addition to the park about 2000.

In the last 10 years, after bikers installed 7 miles of unauthorized high-speed, downhill bike trails, there have been an increasing number of dangerous high-speed bike encounters and accidents with children, hikers and equestrians. E-bikes which are allowed at other appropriate trail systems are not allowed at Lord Hill because of the many narrow winding trails and large number of other park users. Without enforcement, the number of e-bikes is proliferating. The incidents of off-leash dog problems and attacks also has skyrocketed.

Scheduling a ranger on the trails would solve these problems.

We are not anti-bike. Low-speed bikers have done a good job of sharing the trails. The \$2 million proposed for the lot swap could go toward escalating the search and purchase of a dedicated high-speed, downhill biking park. This type of extreme biking deserves its own location where bikers don't have to worry about other users. The Lord Hill biking community is extremely enthusiastic about the search for a new county bike location. They likely would be thrilled with \$2 million for that project.

There also are several other locations at Lord Hill where a parking lot for bikers could be created near their trail system, minimizing their travel on the multi-use entrance trail, greatly reducing conflicts.

I urge you to either support Council Member Low's proposal or provide another solution for final budget adoption in November that improves safety for all users, including equestrians, at Lord Hill now and doesn't cost millions of dollars.

Council Member Low,

We are grateful for your efforts to solve safety problems at Lord Hill Regional Park.

We hope the Council will be able to work together and also with Parks to solve the safety issues at Lord Hill by not funding the lot swap and by adding some ranger enforcement at Lord Hill.

On the proposal to block \$2 million for a parking-lot swap, I have a question about the reference to the "community supported construction plan." Does that mean that Parks needs to get the equestrians on board for the lot swap? The vast majority of the equestrian community does not want a lot swap regardless of how Parks can mitigate. We hope the final language does not require equestrians to get on board with the swap. Please just stop the swap.

Parks reasons for swapping lots are flawed.

The Pressure Point shown on the Parks graphic for the lot swap is actually a point that equestrians pointed out in 2018 when they asked Parks to install No Bike signs because bikes were riding through the horse lot at high speed. Parks did add No Bike signs and that helped tremendously.

All park users do not need to be funneled through that spot marked as Pressure Point. The new entrance trail from the upper lot could be connected with the main trail 20 feet or more to the northeast away from the site marked as Pressure Point. That would separate horses and bikers without swapping lots.

A lot swap would not provide safety, separation and direct access to horse/hiker trails as the Parks plan has claimed.

Not safe: Swapping lots will not solve safety problems and will only create more hazards for equestrians. Mitigation can't solve the steep grade at the drive up to the upper lot or other problems.

No separation: The swap does not provide separation from bikes as equestrians still would have to use the multi-use pipeline to get to their trails.

No direct access: It does not provide direct access to horse/hiker trails. The new route places equestrians farther away from the horse/hiker trails.

The plan also prevents equestrians from making a loop and forces them to return to the parking lot by backtracking the way they came. This is especially a problem for riders who are only out for an hour or so.

Do not swap parking lots. Keep the lots as they currently are. The lower lot meets all equestrian parking safety standards.

A ranger presence on the trails at various times would help solve most safety issues.

First, let me introduce myself.

- My name is Deborah Chase and I am a former and current elected official as well as a retired Project Manager. I helped incorporate the City of Kenmore in 1997, served on the interim and first full Kenmore councils, ending the last 2 years of my full council term as Mayor from 2001-2003.
- I am currently serving as a Commissioner for Snohomish County Fire District 5.
- My 30-year project management experience began in telecommunications at US West Cellular (merging to AirTouch then Verizon Wireless) and ended at HDR Engineering where I was a multidiscipline civil engineering project manager. I managed budgets ranging from individual projects of up to \$6 million to full department budgets of \$60 million.
- As a side note: while Mayor of Kenmore, then Council Member Dave Somers and I attended a community officials meeting with Senator Patty Murray, my junior high and high school classmate.

I highly respect the work of local elected officials, especially when it is done well. But doing it well requires balancing citizen wants with needs, focused toward finding the common good.

So why am I writing to you?

I'm submitting additional comments beyond my 3-minute testimony via Zoom at the October 24th 10:30 am budget hearing as 3 minutes is a woefully small amount of time to give a robust argument for or against a budget item. Conversely, I fully understand the need to keep in-person comments short to allow all comers a chance to speak.

As a fellow elected official, I'm astounded that neither Parks, the County Executive, nor the majority of this Council see the need to take a step back and listen to the equestrian community's safety concerns about moving them to the upper parking lot. This isn't a "you're not listening to what I want" or "how dare you take something away from me" moment. It is instead an "I can't believe Parks can't see how unsafe the upper lot is for me and my horse, no matter how much grading or mitigation Parks tries to add, and how much it screams to equestrians – GO AWAY. Your safety doesn't matter to us".

If Parks had studied and gathered data about where the conflict points producing accidents and near misses actually occur, there would be good data to start planning how to ensure safety throughout the park. That hasn't happened, and just because Parks is "unaware" of problems doesn't mean they don't exist. Instead, Parks with the Executive's support is plowing forward with a solution to address safety concerns conceived in a consultant-led charette attended only by Parks personnel where neither the consultant nor the personnel had any demonstrable experience with equestrian design or guidelines. That exercise appears to have completely ignored safety concerns throughout the park except in the equestrian parking lot and the main trail entrance from that lot.

There are far more conflict areas in the park than the equestrian parking lot. **See Attachment A,** a map with notes showing the many points of conflict (both incidents and near misses) throughout the park.

To be clear, moving equestrians to the upper lot has serious flaws, making the parking area and trailhead inherently dangerous for equestrians every time they come to the park, and does nothing to improve safety parkwide. Please **see Attachment B** shared with Parks with details of how the upper lot does not and cannot comply with *Equestrian Design Guidebook for Trails, Trailheads and Campgrounds*, 2007 (developed with US Forest Service and Federal Highway Administration) guidelines.

Equestrians have opposed the parking lot swap since it was unilaterally imposed by Parks

In July 2022 Parks issued the Lord Hill Regional Park Final Preferred Plan in a Zoom meeting that included significant unilateral changes from the March 2022 Draft Preferred Plan, none of which were vetted with the public prior to addition. Those changes included:

- a parking lot swap,
- a new equestrian and hiker trail from the north lot,
- making a long section of the Main Trail hiker/biker only so equestrians no longer have a full loop at the north section of the park,
- reversing the slow park concept,
- dropping the plan to create equal mileage for equestrians and bikers and disallowing building of previously approved equestrian/hiker trails, and
- adding back biker-only trail designations that exclude hikers and retain most high-speed flow trails built without approval.

Equestrian stakeholders were not given any opportunity for review or input. In response, Parks stated the process was going on 6 years and Parks needed to make the plan happen now.

On October 20, 2022, members of the greater equestrian community (127 via grassroots outreach in 3 days) requested a clarification from the Parks October 2022 Park Updates newsletter regarding the timing for the parking lot swap versus the 10/10/22 meeting agreement with the Lord Hill project manager and notified Parks they oppose the parking lot swap. **See Attachment C** for a copy of the letter.

Let's talk budget numbers . . .

The 2023-2028 CIP adopted by Council included \$1,351,844 for the Lord Hill Preferred Plan Updates. Now, a year later, the total for Lord Hill projects (now 3) in the 2024-2029 CIP is \$3,249,414, an increase of 240% or 2.4 times higher than the prior year.

The newly separated Lord Hill Parking Lot Improvement project is now estimated to be \$2,179,690, a three- to four-fold increase over the 2023-2028 CIP.

If you approve the Executive Recommended 2004-2029 CIP with the LHRP Parking Lot Improvement project as is, you are approving spending a minimum of \$2 million to do almost nothing to improve safety at the park. And you'll be rewarding the bullying behavior of a small number of mountain bikers.

In my view of good government, it is incumbent on you, the council, to ask in-depth questions before approving CIP elements your citizens express concerns about. For example:

- How does the parking lot swap improve safety throughout the park?
- What additional data was collected and compiled (e.g., observations, trail camera video footage, park user input and comments, outreach questionnaires) to determine the full extent of safety issues and/or concerns throughout the park?
- What experts in mitigating conflicts between park user groups were consulted before deciding to implement a parking lot swap?
- What was done to engage the affected user groups in a public process related to a parking lot swap before it was included in the Preferred Plan?

In case you haven't heard:

1. Parks worked with a consultant to develop the conceptual parking lots once swapped – this consultant has only one equestrian project on their resume – an eastern Washington campground where horse trailer parking was included in the campsite design. This does not qualify the consultant to design an equestrian parking lot, especially when neither Parks nor the consultant followed the *Equestrian Design Guidebook for Trails, Trailheads and Campgrounds* guidelines.

2. There have been serious injuries inside the Park, far from the equestrian parking lot, resulting from incidents between speeding mountain bikers and both equestrians and hikers. They range from bruises related to falls to broken arms and concussions.

Parks will say they haven't heard about many of the incidents throughout the park, and that is partially correct.

- There is no reporting system other than calling 911, and recently those calls have only happened a few times for incidents in the equestrian parking lot.
- There are reasons for that it is difficult to control a spooked horse and get out a cell phone to call 911 on a trail.
- The confrontations in the parking lot are actually safer for equestrians as the parking lot is a large open space where one can more easily dismount and control a horse during a confrontation.
- Many equestrians have reported both concerns and specific details about incidents to Parks, with little to no success. Why? Parks has no internal tracking system for reported incidents, nor any external reporting information available to park users.
- 3. Parks personnel, specifically a Park Ranger, worked with mountain bikers on unauthorized work parties to build fast downhill mountain bike trails and high-speed berms and jumps between 2017-2022.
 - At the same time, a copy of the proposed trail system (with "Proposed" cropped out) was posted on an LHRP mountain biker Facebook page. Many confrontations followed as bikers believed the trails on the proposed map marked biker only were already in effect and Parks only posted a map at the kiosks and on-line showing all trails were open to all users. This map was finally updated by Parks in 2023.
 - Wayfinding was a problem for all users as trails did not have signage, prompting an equestrian group to give Parks several thousand dollars to add signs. Instead, Parks used the money to build a kiosk and post the maps showing trails were open to all.

The parking lot swap is just as ill-advised and poorly managed as how Parks has addressed safety concerns from roughly 2015 through today as the unauthorized high-speed downhill bike trails have drawn a huge increase in mountain bikers.

In closing:

As council members you bear a fiduciary responsibility to the citizens of Snohomish County to ensure that the budgets and expenditures you approve are both cost effective and appropriate.

The parking lot swap is not cost effective, appropriate, or effective in solving safety issues and concerns throughout the park.

I urge you to remove funding for the portion of the Lord Hill Parking Lot Improvements project related to a parking lot swap from the 2024-2029 CIP budget and apply those 2024 budgeted CIP dollars to either trail cameras with hardened cases and cable locks to allow Parks to compile information about conflict points throughout the park, or to the Mountain Biking Park feasibility study to accelerate its development.


I also urge you to request additional Park Ranger patrols throughout the park, both emphasis and educational, during both peak park usage and various other times to curb the behaviors that make the park unsafe for many users.

Points of Conflict in Lord Hill Regional Park

Conflict Point Notes:

- The conflict points represent where incidents and near misses regularly occur throughout the park. Most are complete accidents, such as blind corners at trail merge points or riding with ear buds. Only a small number are due to ignoring park rules.
- The parking lot swap will only address the conflict points at the current equestrian parking lot and those along Beaver Lake Trail and a portion of the Main Trail to the point where it is intersected by Wayne's World and the West View Trail. The rest of the park, including where the most serious accidents have occurred, will not be improved with a parking lot swap.
- The West View area, due to its proximity to many of the mountain bike trails, has heavy bike traffic.
- Large/serious incident areas:
 - On the Pipeline just north of the intersection of the north Temple Loop entrance and the Pipeline, there is a steep hill with a blind curve.
 - On the Quarry Trail stretch that's close to the northern finger of the pond there is a cliff and the site of bad incidents.
- Part of the South Pipeline Trail is a steep hill that most equestrians don't ride. Additionally, the south parking lot has a limited number of truck-trailer parking spaces.
- The South End has a large off leash dog area and thus there have been many conflicts with off leash dogs throughout that area. The majority of the conflict areas on the South Entrance Road and nearby trails are with off-leash dogs.

We are writing to you for a clarification regarding the announcement in the October 2022 Snohomish County Parks and Recreation Update in the last bullet point of the Lord Hill Regional Park Updates section stating "The parking lot swap will happen later this fall." This timing was as surprising as the addition of the parking lot swap to the final preferred plan. It is also inconsistent with the discussion on October 10, 2022 where there was verbal agreement that a lot swap would not happen until you met with equestrian stakeholders and reached agreement on the interim and final layouts and improvements as well as ensuring the new trail was fully stabilized for equestrian use.

While the October 10, 2022 meeting at the north parking lot appeared productive, many of us are concerned Parks believed the full equestrian community supports the proposed parking lot swap. **To be clear, we do not.** Other alternatives were suggested to resolve the reported conflicts such as:

- providing a minor reroute of the first trail intersection along the Main Trail to connect further from the trail head,
- posting signage,
- updating the trail map both on the park kiosks and the County's Lord Hill webpage, and
- providing educational outreach and emphasis patrols.

Many of the meeting attendees raised concerns and pointed out problems with the proposed lot swap, both logistical and safety related. Parks noted that the work that can be done on the north lot at this time is minimal because of limits on impervious surface additions in order to not trigger permitting. Given Parks decision to introduce the parking lot swap into the final preferred plan without any stakeholder input, and that you responded to a question that the swap was a done deal, the group present suggested many ways to improve on the Parks immediate plans for the mandated lot swap in order to make a bad solution just a poor solution.

So again, to be clear, we are adamantly opposed to the parking lot swap that Parks unilaterally mandated in the final preferred plan that was added after the final draft plan review without any opportunity for stakeholder input.

As a reminder, the equestrian parking lot was built in 2009 to address the following problems:

- 1. To eliminate 911 calls to rescue horses that had fallen from or been injured on the boardwalk bridges. We recognize this risk will be eliminated with the new trail from the north lot, but there are other safety issues for equestrians at the north lot that were raised during the October 10th meeting that need to be addressed before any lot swap.
- 2. The back-in angle parking spaces were difficult to maneuverer for many equestrians and did not accommodate large trailers.
- 3. The steep entrance from 127th to the lot required starting from close to a dead stop at the turn onto 150th from 127th. This was hard on tow vehicles and unsettling for many horses.

- 4. There were not enough equestrian spaces. Overflow parking occurred regularly along 150th and sometimes 127th. It is highly likely this will occur again with a parking lot swap.
- 5. Items 2) -4) turned away many equestrians.

Building the equestrian parking lot in 2009 created a premier equestrian parking experience to match the trail riding experience of Lord Hill. The entrance is via a long, level driveway off 127th ending at a large lot that accommodates 12+ equestrian rigs regardless of size. The lot is surrounded by trees, creating a natural barrier if a horse bolts or gets loose, keeping them from reaching 127th.

During the October 10, 2022 meeting attendees heard you say Parks didn't feel the parking lot swap was necessary to resolve the conflicts and we agree. Losing the equestrian parking lot is a bitter pill for the equestrian community, especially as it was designed just 13 years ago specifically to welcome equestrians of all levels.

The attendees also heard you say Parks is implementing the swap to show the equestrian community that Parks is doing something to address the conflicts. We disagree that the swap is a solution, let alone the right solution. As noted earlier, we believe minor trail intersection adjustments, signage, updated maps, education and emphasis patrols are a less expensive and much better long-term solution to the reported concerns, as the conflicts that do happen are throughout the park, not just at the equestrian lot or trail head.

Given all of the above, please note we are asking for an email response verifying Parks will not swap the parking lots at this time.

We are also interested in a better understanding of how the new trail building and improvements to both parking lots are being funded. We heard from others that ADA grant dollars are being used to build the new trail that will replace the Boardwalk trail from the north parking lot, but recognize that may be incorrect.

Please explain the funding sources by name, whether they be maintenance funds, currently available Lord Hill project dollars, grants, and/or other funding sources.

Reconfiguring the upper lot would accommodate more cars. Or creating parking for bikers near bike trails would eliminate bike traffic through the lower lot and reduce it on a section of the main trail.

Shifting some of this funding and accelerating construction of a dedicated mountain bike park would help to eventually reduce high-speed bike conflicts at Lord Hill.

Dear Council,

We are neighbors who moved to Lord Hill to have access to the park for our horse, hiking, and biking. It is a treasure and we am so glad to live here.

There are three concerns I hope you address as you consider the budget moving forward:

1. Park Safety and Traffic:

I am in the park almost every day and see most people behaving in a courteous manner. However, we could really benefit from increased Ranger presence and traffic safety.

There are **drivers I have clocked @ 60 mph on the way down the hill**. There is no shoulder and we have been almost hit at least 5 times. I know of at least 4 incidents where drivers turned around to drive aggressively into riders and horses, in one cause causing the horse to have an injury which resulted in expensive vet bills and 6 months of time off. We need more enforcement or someone will die. I understand there was a preventable accident two years ago where a rider was hit and killed. We cannot risk this happening again. Enforcement could greatly help the safety of all.

2. Parking Access:

Moving the parking lot will be a major problem as large horse trailers cannot make or turn around on the top of the hill. There are regularly 5-7 large trailers at a time in the Equestrian parking lot, and none of these can manage the hill. Many of the drivers are seniors, including neighbors who do not feel safe riding up the hill. Changing the lot will block their access and they have no where else to ride. This money would be better spent on a Ranger present and Police being more present in our neighborhood.

3. Park Education & Trail Access:

Some bikers from out of the area do not understand that a bike coming up fast on a horse can result in a serious, even fatal injury. We need more signs and education.

The provision to change the trails limits equestrians especially in winter conditions. We ride all year round as do many people in the area, and keeping our access on a loop with good footing is essential to an enjoyable experience.

Scheduling a ranger patrol at high-peak times would significantly reduce the incidents of high-speed mountain bikers, e-bikes and off-leash dogs.

Reconfiguring the upper lot would accommodate more cars. Or creating parking for bikers near bike trails would eliminate bike traffic through the lower lot and reduce it on a section of the main trail.

Shifting some of this funding and accelerating construction of a dedicated mountain bike park would help to eventually reduce high-speed bike conflicts at Lord Hill.

Council Members,

Thank you for addressing safety concerns on the Lord Hill lot swap. I'm grateful for your unanimous support of the amendment.

It's widely known that rangers are not scheduled in Lord Hill Regional Park, creating a bit of a Wild West atmosphere where high-speed bikers ignore trail etiquette on posted signs and many park users let their dogs run loose.

I encountered both types of users last Friday, Oct. 27 when I was in the park from 9:30 till 11 a.m. with my horse, dog and a friend.

We were heading south on the pipeline near the lower Temple Loop entrance and encountered a high speed biker flying through the intersection -- without slowing or looking up and down the pipeline — and into the lower Temple Loop. We were only about 20 feet away and he never saw us. Luckily, my horse is calm and saw him before he crossed our path and didn't spook.

When we got to the top of the pipeline, a biker was off his bike and on his phone in the trail we were headed for. We called out to him to let him know we were behind him in case he was going to ride off. But he was wearing earbuds and couldn't hear us. So we circled around in front of him so he could see us. He was startled but extremely nice. We explained we were going to head into the upper Temple Loop and he said he was going that way so he went first.

On our way back from the lower Temple Loop, we crossed the pipeline into the cutoff trail. As we were about to step out onto the main trail, we were charged by 5 large off-leash dogs. There were four women who tried to call off their dogs with no luck. The dogs swarmed our dog who was on a leash. They then charged my young horse who is training and was being led by my friend. She used her crop to try to keep the dogs back as they tried to reach for his legs. The dog owners finally leashed up the dogs. We were so lucky our horse handled the incident so well because it could have ended badly.

My friend had also encountered the same off-leash dogs and the women at a distance at about 8:30 a.m. when she was in the park with another horse. That horse tensed up at the noisy dogs running toward him, as he had been attacked on the pipeline trail by an off-leash pitbull in 2022. Luckily she was far enough away and was able to change her route to avoid a close encounter with the dogs.

All of this happened during non peak hours. This is why we don't take our horses in the park on weekends when traffic is much higher. Children are always thrilled to get a chance to see and pet a horse. Unfortunately, we don't get to offer that experience when most of the kids are in the park.

Word would spread quickly if a ranger were spotted in the park periodically. Things have gotten out of control throughout the park because of some park users who don't want to follow trail etiquette. The county needs to take responsibility for solving this problem they have been aware of for years.

While I am relieved to hear of the unanimous decision to amend the current proposal temporarily, I was very disappointed to hear that council member Megan Dunn blocked councilmember Sam Low's proposed solution to employ park rangers at Lord Hill. The conflicts happen mostly on the trails and not in the parking lot. While the occasional biker flying through the Equestrian parking lot screaming obscenities at equestrians is unpleasant, the majority respectfully walk their bikes through the Equestrian parking lot they are not supposed to be using.

The equestrian parking lot was just purchased in 2009 with much input, planning and money spent into creating this space for equestrians. Tom Teigen arranged for the purchase of the lot for equestrians and promised it would always be an equestrian lot the day of the ribbon cutting ceremony.

From the long driveway to keep horses a safe distance from roads and traffic, the complete circle- drive to avoid complicated parking and backing up of horse trailers. The equestrian hitching posts and mounting rocks. The Equestrian kiosk paid for and placed by the Back Country Horsemen. The parking lot is already ideal for equestrians. On Friday 11/3 there were 10 trailers filling every spot and yet nobody was at risk of hitting each other or backing themselves into an impossible situation. The short distance from the lot to the trail is hard footing with no mud to avoid slipping accidents. As someone who has slid down a trail on mud I am very grateful for this. The proposed trail you want us to use in the future is not safe for horse and rider or healthy for horse hooves.

It makes no sense to spend 2 million dollars undoing and re-creating what has already been done. What does make sense is to have 2 rangers in the park Friday through Sunday, the busiest days. I am thinking their salary would not reach an accumulative 2 million dollars in my lifetime and be most effective as keeping the park safe and slow.

Swapping parking lots:

- :will not improve the conduct of the minority of rowdy disrespectful mountain bikers.
- :will not slow bikers down on the trail or keep them from skidding out in front of hikers and horses. (which I have experienced multiple times)
- :will not enforce that dogs be on leashes
- :will not keep bikers from driving trucks into the park and stealing more multi-purpose trails to make bike only trails. (which I have seen multiple times and reported)
- :will not stop bikers from creating different exits on popular trails so they don't have to slow down when coming back onto the main road in the park.
- : will not keep equestrians from riding on bike-only trails when they get fed up with losing yet another trail that accessed them to the river because it was stolen without permission.

With a 2 million dollar budget you can really improve the bikers parking lot and even create an off leash area for dogs while supplying rangers in the park. I can not think of any good reason to spend 2 million dollars to relocate equestrians when they have the ideal parking lot that is barely 14 years old.

Jail now has separate sober cells critical for inmates to get clean. They can't if their dealers and user friends are in the same cell. Many talk incessantly about things to steal and drugs they'll take when they get out.

We need daily medical attention in jail that includes diagnoses for mental illness and addiction. In the past jail could only fill existing prescriptions which most didn't have. This is their chance to get well. Healthy people commit less crime.

We want transparency and accountability that Fortney implemented, on day one, now he's mastered it. We want to see mistakes fixed and understand what they changed to trust.

Presenting a perfect department is closing the blue curtain on us again leading to antagonism and mistrust. We've come a ways now. Let's keep it.

Trust is the most important thing law enforcement needs nationally and it takes intense community engagement and action on their ideas to achieve it.

Sheriff Fortney has answered any questions to any community member with an open mind to hear them too. We must continue this. Only working with the community input can change law enforcement culture in the safest effective ways for Deputies, victims, and suspects.

Professional behavior by law enforcement even encouraging health talking about possibilities increases our safety and gets more people healthy and working again. Everett PD hired MATRIX who stated that's one of the biggest results they found ... it was from me.

Any questions let me know. I bring field feedback when I can to help you. I hope you use the information to make more law enforcement progress in our county.

As long as we continue to create long term low barrier shelters allowing permanent drug use - drug related crimes will stay high. There's a way to get people in treatment, housing and jobs fast with the same budget. That would lover crime, increase our tax income, and improve our quality of life.

I placed around 35 people in 2021 and 35 people in 2022 and 6 in 2023. Your Pallet shelter placed 2 people in two years. Mine was 81. Can we make a few changes I made that helps people get their lives back? I'm here to help. It's a couple of changes. Double results possibly. Interested?

By the way, Clares place could use my help too. They've tried to place 2 people in a whole year they can't. They keep reapplying. They're stuck. Their two healthy clients health and life is at stake if they don't get to a sober house.

Swap of lots is a waste of money

The Snohomish County executive's 2024 budget has recommended \$2 million to swap parking lots at Lord Hill Regional Park.

The upper parking lot at Lord Hill Regional Park will need extensive regrading to reconfigure it for horse trailers. Even though right next door is the equestrian parking lot that was created for horse trailers in 2009 when they were moved from the upper lot. It has easy access on a level road and adequate space for up to 12 trailers.

Equestrians were promised many times by the former park director that it would "always be an equestrian lot."

As a taxpayer, I am appalled at this waste of funds that could better be used elsewhere, hire more park personnel or develop other park property or build a more suitable mountain bike park.

As a long time user of the equestrian parking lot and a longer time user of Lord Hill (50-plus years of riding my horses there starting when it was state land), I am angered by the broken promise. Every time I would share with former Park Director Tom Teigen that an equestrian was told by a biker

that "they would get our parking lot," he assured me repeatedly that it would never happen.

I read that the purpose of changing lots is to separate out user groups, horses and mountain bikers. However, the "plan" routes all equestrian use to a multi-use trail (including bikes) that has steep hills (think speeding bikes) and blind corners. Horses are flight animals, and the sudden appearance of a bike can cause them to spook and possibly whirl and run. I know several riders who have had mountain bikes nearly run into their horses.

Fortunately, there are opportunities to voice concerns about the budget in person and on Zoom. There is a hearing set for 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 8.

The hearing will be held in the Henry H. Jackson Board Room, eighth floor, Administration Building at 3000 Rockefeller Ave, in Everett. Zoom meeting link: https://zoom.us/j/94846850772

Good morning friends and colleagues!

I just wanted to chime in and offer support for Councilmember Nehring's effort to bring a Ricky's Law facility to Snohomish County. Civil commitment / involuntary treatment is a highly effective, last resort intervention for individuals with severe and debilitating substance use disorder (SUD). We have seen very positive outcomes for those who have received services under Ricky's Law, though the law remains wildly underutilized statewide. At the Ricky's Law facility in King County, 95% of patients transition to continued SUD treatment.

If the jail were to be converted into a secure withdrawal management and stabilization (SWMS) aka a Ricky's Law facility, it would require significant retrofitting such that it in no way resembles a correctional facility and instead is a highly therapeutic setting. I know the county has successfully transitioned the former Denney juvenile detention facility into voluntary adult SUD treatment, so there is some precedent here.

If I may, I would also recommend the county consider a small allocation (even \$50K) to cover ambulance transportation for Snohomish County Ricky's Law patients to existing SWMS facilities around the state. We should not wait to treat Snohomish County residents with profound and life-threatening SUD until we have our own facility some years from now.
