


How We Got Here: Community-Informed Budgeting

Review: Past ARPA Appropriations

- First tranche of ARPA was appropriated during the 2022 budget process.
- All remaining ARPA funding was appropriated during the 2023 budget process.
 - There is no more funding to appropriate, and expenditure of funds is ongoing.
- Primary focus during last year's budget process was the spending plan for the remaining \$85 million in un-allocated ARPA dollars.
- Per budget note, throughout the year, ORR has submitted spending plan memos to the Council for the larger appropriation categories.
 - Housing & Behavioral Health
 - Workforce Development
 - Child Care
 - Broadband Expansion

Minor 2024 Budget Adjustments

- In the 2024 budget, funding has been requested for carryforward for all programs that are not completed.
- ORR recommends three new projects based on savings. See table below.

Department	Project	Budget
Human Services	Senior Supportive Programs	\$700,000
Surface Water Management	Smith Island Pond	\$500,000
Finance/IT	ERP System	\$1,600,000

ARPA Timeline



Sep. 30 2024

Spending deadline for most programs and internal salaries.



Jan. 2025

All unobligated funds must be reported to Treasury and returned.



Apr. 2027

Closeout of the grant. Unexpended funds returned to Treasury.

Obligation deadline. All grant funds must be in contract by December 31.



Completion of all capital projects (e.g., broadband, child care and behavioral health facilities).

Project Highlight: Behavioral Health Facilities NOFA

- \$8 million awarded to five projects that increase behavioral health capacity.
- Funded projects will allow a minimum of 440 new individuals to be served each year.
 - Evergreen Manor Family Center
 - Lynnwood Neighborhood Center
 - Edmonds School District School-Based Health Centers
 - New Tomorrow's Child Development Center
 - North Sound Behavioral Health Facility

Project Highlight: Camp Killoqua Child Care Center

- Awarding \$1 million to Camp Fire Snohomish County for the Camp Killoqua Child Care Center.
 - Part of Child Care Facilities Notice of Funding Availability
- Will renovate and transform an existing large open conference room into child care classrooms.
 - Will also create a fenced play area.
- Will create 32 additional child care slots.





Project Highlight: SBIA

- Full toolkit of support: Trainings,
 1:1 coaching, grant opportunities.
- Industry-specific support for child care and food businesses.
- Graduates of Business Basics Course will have access to ongoing support through all Ventures programming.
- Forty-four total graduates of the first cohort (English and Spanish)
 - Nearly half speak Spanish as their primary language
 - Businesses ranging from catering, to retail, to construction

Project Highlight: Digital Equity

- \$1.5 million investment in Sno-Isle Libraries digital equity efforts.
- Will increase their loanable computer with hotspots inventory by 750 devices.
- Add capacity to their digital navigator program. Helps patrons:
 - Connect to the internet
 - Understand how to access the federal Affordable Connectivity Program.
 - Troubleshoot tech issues
 - Learn about online safety



Focus Going Forward

- ORR and County departments core focus going forward is executing contracts as quickly as possible to ensure the County meets the obligation deadline.
- Examples of upcoming projects in FY 2024:
 - Early childhood education training/workforce development programs
 - Marysville Regional Apprenticeship Program
 - Broadband infrastructure expansion
- COVID-19 Recovery Dashboard updated quarterly to track budget, expenditures, impacts, and outcomes of ARPA programming.



Snohomish County | COVID-19 Recovery Plan






