Thank you for reaching out to share your concerns about the Executive's proposed 8% property tax increase. I agree—an 8% tax increase at this time is unreasonable, and I will continue to advocate strongly against this proposal. Instead, I am demanding fiscal accountability and responsible use of available resources. To that end, I have introduced amendments that I believe provide a better approach than what the Executive has proposed. These amendments were discussed during our November 13th council meeting and will be officially considered for a vote at the budget adoption hearing on November 25th.

One amendment I want to highlight is <u>Amendment 14</u>, which proposes the elimination of four management-level positions within the Executive's Office and a significant reduction to a discretionary spending account partially tied to the Office of Social Justice (OSJ). Amendment 14 would result in \$1.3 million in savings—precisely the kind of cuts we need to make before asking residents to pay more in taxes.

Last week, the council received an independent audit report that revealed several

duplicative and unnecessary positions in the Executive's Office:

- · Office of Social Justice Positions: The audit identified two positions in OSJ as duplicative. According to the report, OSJ's duties are primarily related to Human Resources policies and micro-grant writing—functions already handled by staff in the HR and Human Services departments. Reducing OSJ staff from three full-time equivalents (FTEs) to one would save approximately \$400,000 per year.
- · Office of Recovery and Resilience Position: Another identified position, created during the COVID-19 pandemic to share grant funding information, is no longer necessary now that grant funding is unavailable. Reducing this office from three FTEs to two would save an additional \$200,000 per year.
- · Unclear Communications Position: The audit also highlighted a position in the Executive's Office that has operated without a job description for three years. While it has recently been described as a communications role, the Executive's Office already has multiple communications positions with clear and appropriate job descriptions. Removing this redundant position would save another \$200,000 annually.
- \cdot Discretionary Spending: Lastly, the discretionary spending account tied to OSJ would be reduced from \$650,000 to \$150,000, resulting in a \$500,000 savings.

By addressing redundancies and improving efficiencies, Amendment 14 would generate \$1.3 million in annual savings within the Executive's Department alone, demonstrating our commitment to responsible fiscal management.

If you are interested in learning more, I encourage you to watch the auditor's presentation to the council <u>here</u>. His presentation begins at the 15:50 mark. You can also watch our council's discussion regarding Amendment 14 <u>here</u> starting at 3:47:45.

As Chair of your County Council, a lifelong Snohomish County resident, and a father raising four young children here, I take my responsibility to spend your tax dollars wisely very seriously. My goal is to ensure that Snohomish County remains an affordable and vibrant place to live, work, and raise a family.

We will vote on Amendment 14 and the rest of the budget on November 25th. Until then, I encourage you to continue advocating for these priorities by using the council's contact service and Public Comment opportunities. Your opinion matters! I urge you to call your councilmembers and express your support for Amendment 14 and responsible fiscal policies. Let them know that you believe in prioritizing efficient use of taxpayer dollars and rejecting unnecessary spending. The council needs to hear from you!

I am adamantly opposed to the last minute drop of Senate Bill 5770 that would TRIPLE PROPERTY TAX INCREASES. I implore you to not take away the current property tax cap (passed by 58% of voters in 2001 and reenacted and passed by 89% of legislators in 2007 and signed into law by Democrat Governor Chris Gregoire). Even with the cap, it has become unaffordable to rent, purchase, or own a home in Washington state. If this session's top priority is making housing more affordable, SB 5770 goes in exactly the opposite direction. As Democrat House member Amy Walen admitted: 'Folks in my district find it very hard to stay in their homes as it is.' She's right ... but not just in her district. Renters, home buyers, and homeowners are

already facing skyrocketing property tax increases EVEN WITH THE CAP. I write to you today to express my opposition to the county executive's proposed tax hike. This proposal is, in my opinion, unacceptable for several reasons.

First, we have heard repeatedly over the past few years about the impact of inflation on the basics, such as food, rent, utilities, and fuel throughout the country and especially in an expensive places to live such as Western Washington. In July of this year, Forbes ranked Washington with the eight highest cost of living in general, 5th in transportation costs and 4th in home prices (which directly impacts both mortgage payments and rent). Now you are asking these financially burdened citizens to pay even more. I suggest you look at what happened at the federal level when the government did not take inflation's impact on the average citizen seriously, it behooves the council and the executive to learn from this.

Secondly, I have seen no real effort to scale back and trim expenditures at a county level before asking for more money. Dear County Council Members -

My husband and I have lived AND served in Snohomish County our entire lives. We raised our kids here and when our kids were in school I went to work for a non-profit serving adults with developmental disAbilities. I've worked (and continue to work) for Eagle Wings for the past 21 years. My husband just retired from teaching and coaching at Arlington High School for the past 37 years. He soon will be a Chaplain with the Marysville Fire and Police Departments.

Because I work for a non-profit, I have no retirement and over the years we have invested in real estate. Slowly...and as we could afford it.

One house (in Marysville) holds 10 men (each with their own bedroom) for clean and sober living. We have been running a 98% success rate for the men living there since 2019. One home is used for a respite for a free getaway for those suffering from trauma. Our other homes are rented to the elderly and a single mom. We intentionally keep our rents LOW so that they can afford to stay there. When you increase our property taxes, we are forced to raise their rents and the ripple effect goes on and on.

My line of work exposes me to many other housing situations that are ESSENTIAL for adult family homes for individuals who are developmentally disabled. These are NOT elderly individuals who are able to privately pay their caregivers, but they are adults who rely on caregivers and Federal DDA services. The government only pays those caregivers a fraction of what they should be paid...imagine in addition the homeowners overhead being so high (due to mortgage, interest rates, taxes and insurance. This is making it nearly impossible for these adult family homes to meet the needs of those they are caring for. No one can afford to buy a house and put 6-8 people with Down's Syndrome in it...they cannot afford the overhead. High property taxes contribute to this problem.

This has become personal for me as my mom (also a Snohomish County Resident since 1944) is now at home in hospice and cannot afford her taxes. We had to purchase her home for her because her SSI doesn't allow her enough to pay her taxes. Additionally we are having to pay for her 24/7 care.

I would like to respectfully request on behalf of the most vulnerable citizens of Snohomish County that you NOT increase our property taxes. It's come to my attention that Nate Nehring has proposed a perfectly equitable plan which provides a stability to spending...protecting those who are most vulnerable.

If you want a serious way to acquire funding, please consider taking away all of the DSHS benefits and FOOD STAMPS from all of those who really ARE ABLE TO WORK and allow Food Banks and faith communities to step in, vet individuals thoroughly and send people back to work.

I can tell you about a 4 month old baby boy who received \$340 per month in food stamps in

his name, his own card, while his mother continues to not work and receive all the benefits and get even more by having more children. She's NURSING!! Her other kids get cards too! She's been working the system for the past 18 years!

When I grew up in Monroe, the men from the reformatory had to do so many jobs to help the community. Clean up litter, keep our parks clean, and learn to operate machinery that would make them employable. Where are your creative ideas like that??

It is preposterous that your Council would increase property taxes (the hard-working Americans who are homeowners) rather than come up with other creative ideas to cut back. In my world of nonprofit, we have to do it all the time and it CAN be done.

Please accept this challenge to find other ways to decrease spending, without raising property taxes. Please reach across the aisles and find ways to make things happen without increasing property taxes.

Hi Michael,

Thank you for reaching out to share your concerns about the Executive's proposed 8% property tax increase. I agree—an 8% tax increase at this time is unreasonable, and I will continue to advocate strongly against this proposal. Instead, I am demanding fiscal accountability and responsible use of available resources. To that end, I have introduced amendments that I believe provide a better approach than what the Executive has proposed. These amendments were discussed during our November 13th council meeting and will be officially considered for a vote at the budget adoption hearing on November 25th.

One amendment I want to highlight is <u>Amendment 14</u>, which proposes the elimination of four management-level positions within the Executive's Office and a significant reduction to a discretionary spending account partially tied to the Office of Social Justice (OSJ). Amendment 14 would result in \$1.3 million in savings—precisely the kind of cuts we need to make before asking residents to pay more in taxes.

Last week, the council received an independent audit report that revealed several duplicative and unnecessary positions in the Executive's Office:

· Office of Social Justice Positions: The audit identified two positions in OSJ as duplicative. According to the report, OSJ's duties are primarily related to Human Resources policies and micro-grant writing—functions already handled by staff in the HR and Human Services departments. Reducing OSJ staff from three full-time equivalents (FTEs) to one would save

approximately \$400,000 per year.

- · Office of Recovery and Resilience Position: Another identified position, created during the COVID-19 pandemic to share grant funding information, is no longer necessary now that grant funding is unavailable. Reducing this office from three FTEs to two would save an additional \$200,000 per year.
- · Unclear Communications Position: The audit also highlighted a position in the Executive's Office that has operated without a job description for three years. While it has recently been described as a communications role, the Executive's Office already has multiple communications positions with clear and appropriate job descriptions. Removing this redundant position would save another \$200,000 annually.
- · Discretionary Spending: Lastly, the discretionary spending account tied to OSJ would be reduced from \$650,000 to \$150,000, resulting in a \$500,000 savings.

By addressing redundancies and improving efficiencies, Amendment 14 would generate \$1.3 million in annual savings within the Executive's Department alone, demonstrating our commitment to responsible fiscal management.

If you are interested in learning more, I encourage you to watch the auditor's presentation to the council <u>here</u>. His presentation begins at the 15:50 mark. You can also watch our council's discussion regarding Amendment 14 <u>here</u> starting at 3:47:45.

As Chair of your County Council, a lifelong Snohomish County resident, and a father raising four young children here, I take my responsibility to spend your tax dollars wisely very seriously. My goal is to ensure that Snohomish County remains an affordable and vibrant place to live, work, and raise a family.

We will vote on Amendment 14 and the rest of the budget on November 25th. Until then, I encourage you to continue advocating for these priorities by using the council's contact service and Public Comment opportunities. Your opinion matters! I urge you to call your councilmembers and express your support for Amendment 14 and responsible fiscal policies. Let them know that you believe in prioritizing efficient use of taxpayer dollars and rejecting unnecessary spending. The council needs to hear from you!

I'm writing this email in regards to the proposed 8% tax increase coming to the table.

Like many in this county, my partner and myself are on fixed disability incomes. His is a state disability pension that comes with zero medical insurance. Mine is Social Security with only Medicare coverage. My income alone is only \$1400/mo. Out of that, I'm expected to pay 20% of my medical bills, 100% of my prescriptions and then groceries, fuel, etc. In case you haven't noticed, the prices for all of these have increased to the point where we have to pick and choose what we can pay for. Because he has no medical coverage, my partner is 100% responsible for all of his visits and prescriptions. Because of that, he's been avoiding going in for physician visits or preventative care. I know you're thinking "Then apply for assistance". I had brain surgery earlier this year. I did apply for DSHS, but they said I was too far above the property level as if I'm expected to live on \$1400/mo. Now facing a 3rd surgery, I'm going to be in debt until I die.

An increase on property taxes will effectively price an even larger portion of the county's residents out of any housing. We're ALL barely scraping by. The current economy is making it more and more difficult to buy healthy food, make healthy choices and keep a roof over our heads.

I didn't ask to get hit by a police officer in an auto accident. My partner didn't ask to fall from a ladder and break 2 vertebrae. Washington and Snohomish County has been our lifelong homes. We can't afford to pick up and just move. Where would even go, anyway?

I realize you can look and say 8% isn't much. Right now, ANYTHING really is a lot. Just because it's "only 8%", landlords pass that on to at least a 20% increase, stores raise prices because of property tax increases. Of course, you already know this. Obviously, you can afford to pay these increases. I'm not even a senior citizen, yet, so I don't qualify for any cuts.

When people start making choices between groceries, medical care and/or housing because there's no light at the end of the tunnel, they suffer. They suffer physically which leads to increased suffering mentally and emotionally. Sadly, despair sets in and suicide rates increase. Personally, any of our citizens in despair due to affordability issues is too many to me. It should be for you, too.

If our economy were in a better state and I noticed that the taxes we're already paying were actually being used to help our citizens or infrastructure, I'd say go for it. The county has received large amounts of money in post-COVID relief and the pharmaceutical settlement, but where has it gone? We already pay the highest sales taxes in the state. What's being done with that money? The increased gas prices are supposed to help our roads. Yeah right.

I ask, have any of you taken pay cuts or at very least refused any raises these last few years you have been "saving up" these 1% non-voter-needed increases? I can tell you that I'm lucky if I get 3% from SSI, but then everything else goes up much more than that. "Cost of living"

increases are a fallacy.

I appreciate the time you're taking to read and hear the concerns of our residents.

I beg, PLEASE take our concerns to heart. We are in a recession and can't afford for everything to keep climbing. Many of us are already scared of what will happen when the new Predsidential administration comes into office. Especially people like me that depend on assistance.

Thank you for sharing your comments on the budget, here's my statement:

Hello:

Thank you for taking the time to email me regarding the 2025-2026 County Budget. I am thankful for the time that you took to write in and share your thoughts and perspective. Please know that I thoroughly read your email – it's important to me to understand how any vote that I make at our county will affect community members like you. Deliberating and deciding the county budget each year is the most important decision that our county council makes. Our county budget should be a reflection of the values within our community and I take this responsibility seriously. An equally important top priority is to ensure that we as a county are being a good steward of your taxpayer dollars, especially during these difficult times of inflation that we are all experiencing, while still providing the

community with critical services through our sheriff's department, corrections, elections office, court system, human services, parks departments, and more.

Since September when the proposed budget was presented to council there has unfortunately been an onslaught of misinformation about the proposed budget and impacts it would have on households in the county. This misinformation has only muddied conversations and unnecessarily brought fear and uncertainty to residents in our county. As elected leaders, it's our duty to provide accurate and transparent information to residents, and I'm hopeful that this email today can help provide clearer information about what is being deliberated in our county budget, its impacts to a household in Snohomish County, and what's at stake. As you may already know, since 2001 our county's general fund budget is limited by state law to grow by only 1% per year, however expenses tend to grow by 4% per year because government also experiences the pressures of inflation like the rest of the community. There have been times when previous budgets did not implement the 1% increase, but instead banked it to use at a later date – a term called "banked capacity" - and at this point, the county has 6% in banked capacity. State law expressly allows for this practice. For the past decade or so, this imbalance between allowed budget growth and increases to the cost of doing business has been felt strongly as costs have far outpaced the 1% cap. Despite this imbalance, the county has worked diligently to tighten our belts, and this year is no exception.

In order to preserve services and avoid layoffs the proposed biennial budget includes 1.5% in cuts to general fund departments, and departments are asked to underspend their budgets by 1.5%, for a total of 3% in cuts already imbedded in this 2025-2026 budget. These cuts aren't enough to preserve services.

The current proposed biennial budget from the County Executive includes an increase in our county's levy rate which draws down our full banked capacity. This would be the 1% allowed increase, plus 3% of our banked capacity, for a total of 4% for 2025, and again in 2026. It's important to remember that this proposed increase only applies to the county portion of your property taxes which is about 6% of your overall tax bill, and is not an increase in your overall property tax bill. The current levy rate of \$0.4956 per \$1,000 of assessed value would increase to \$0.5178 - a \$0.0222 increase per \$1,000 of assessed value, so a little over \$0.02 cents per \$1000 of a house value. For a house valued at \$650,000 the increase would be a modest increase of \$14-15 of property taxes for the year.

In short, the proposed 8% property tax increase only applies to the county's portion of your property tax bill, which is about 6% of your overall bill which comes out to about \$14-\$15 per year and would preserve public safety and services in the county.

During budget deliberations, we have heard from councilmembers who claim that there are ways to balance the budget without activating our banked capacity, but in my analysis of the budget and consultation with department directors, this simply isn't possible. For starters, an amendment that would cut millions from the budget instead of moving forward with the proposed budget includes \$1M in cuts to our sheriff's department, which I oppose. Now is not the time to defund our sheriff's department when public safety is a top concern from community members. Other cuts to our parks department, courts, elections office, public health and other general fund departments would hamper our quality of life. Without this modest increase to the county budget, there will be cuts to personnel and services which directly impacts the county's ability to provide basic services.

Knowing that there are pressures that property taxes can place on low-income and fixed-income people in the community, I wanted to make sure that you were aware of tax relief programs that are available at the county for people who qualify. They are listed here: https://www.snohomishcountywa.gov/328/Property-Tax-Exemptions.

I will continue to work on this important matter and look for ways that we can exercise savings and efficiencies without eliminating programs that benefit our community or county

staff who work hard every day to serve the residents of our county.

Council is scheduled to make a final vote on the county's 2025-2026 budget on Monday, November 25 at the 9am Public Hearing meeting. Please know that I will be keeping your comments in mind during deliberations.

Hi there.

Thank you for reaching out to share your concerns about the Executive's proposed 8% general fund property tax levy increase. I agree—an 8% tax increase at this time is unreasonable, and I will continue to advocate strongly against this proposal. Instead, I am demanding fiscal accountability and responsible use of available resources. To that end, I have introduced amendments that I believe provide a better approach

than what the Executive has proposed. These amendments were discussed during our November 13th council meeting and will be officially considered for a vote at the budget adoption hearing on November 25th.

One amendment I want to highlight is <u>Amendment 14</u>, which proposes the elimination of four management-level positions within the Executive's Office and a significant reduction to a discretionary spending account partially tied to the Office of Social Justice (OSJ). Amendment 14 would result in \$1.3 million in savings—precisely the kind of cuts we need to make before asking residents to pay more in taxes.

Last week, the council received an independent audit report that revealed several duplicative and unnecessary positions in the Executive's Office:

- · Office of Social Justice Positions: The audit identified two positions in OSJ as duplicative. According to the report, OSJ's duties are primarily related to Human Resources policies and micro-grant writing—functions already handled by staff in the HR and Human Services departments. Reducing OSJ staff from three full-time equivalents (FTEs) to one would save approximately \$400,000 per year.
- · Office of Recovery and Resilience Position: Another identified position, created during the COVID-19 pandemic to share grant funding information, is no longer necessary now that grant funding is unavailable. Reducing this office from three FTEs to two would save an additional \$200,000 per year.
- · Unclear Communications Position: The audit also highlighted a position in the Executive's Office that has operated without a job description for three years. While it has recently been described as a communications role, the Executive's Office already has multiple communications positions with clear and appropriate job descriptions. Removing this redundant position would save another \$200,000 annually.
- Discretionary Spending: Lastly, the discretionary spending account tied to OSJ would be reduced from \$650,000 to \$150,000, resulting in a \$500,000 savings.

By addressing redundancies and improving efficiencies, Amendment 14 would generate \$1.3 million in annual savings within the Executive's Department alone, demonstrating our commitment to responsible fiscal management.

If you are interested in learning more, I encourage you to watch the auditor's presentation to the council <u>here</u>. His presentation begins at the 15:50 mark. You can also watch our council's discussion regarding Amendment 14 <u>here</u> starting at 3:47:45.

As Chair of your County Council, a lifelong Snohomish County resident, and a father raising four young children here, I take my responsibility to spend your tax dollars wisely very seriously. My goal is to ensure that Snohomish County remains an affordable and vibrant place to live, work, and raise a family.

We will vote on Amendment 14 and the rest of the budget on November 25th. Until then, I encourage you to continue advocating for these priorities by using the council's contact service and Public Comment opportunities. Your opinion matters! I urge you to call your councilmembers and express your support for Amendment 14 and responsible fiscal policies. My financial situation has not improved over the years, as I would have hoped. If this tax increase happens, I will have no other choice than to leave WA state.
