RE: Legislative Report – Week 2

The Washington State Legislature convened the 2022 60-day session on Monday, January 10. Each biennium is comprised of a long session (105-days) and a short session (60-days) in which bills may be enacted into law. All bills that do not pass during the long session are automatically reintroduced for consideration during the short session. One of the primary tasks of legislators during a long session is to pass the state's biennial budgets: Operating, Capital and Transportation. During a short session, the legislature adopts supplemental budgets that are generally minor adjustments to the biennial budgets based on updated spending and revenue information.

Once again, legislators will meet in a mostly virtual format with the potential for a hybrid or in-person format in the future.

The first week of the legislative session was action packed as usual, with the [Governor's State of the State Address](#), public hearings on the [Governor's proposed budgets](#), and the Legislature taking early action to advance top priority issues such as clarifying police reforms and delaying the Long-Term Care Act.

As the majority in both the House and Senate, Democrats continue to control much of the legislative agenda. The current ratio in the Senate and House are as follows:

- Senate: Democrats hold the majority in the Senate (28 -20 -1) with one Democrat who caucuses with the Republicans
- House: Democrats hold the majority in the House (57-41)
- Governor/Executive Branch: Governor Jay Inslee (D)

Cutoff Deadlines

The legislative process has key deadlines that bills need to meet to remain under consideration. Bills currently under consideration by a committee will need to be approved by that committee by February 3. Below is an outline of the deadlines for this year's legislative process:

Legislative Priorities

Increase Counties' Share of Marijuana Revenue for Behavioral Health and SUD Treatment

Snohomish County requests that the legislature increase counties' share of marijuana revenue to be used for behavioral health and substance use disorder treatment programs. As reported last week, Rep. Emily Wicks (D- Everett) indicated that utilizing marijuana revenue to advance social equity initiatives would be a topic of discussion this legislative session. This week, Sen. Rebecca Saldana (D- Seattle) and Sen. Derek Stanford (D- Bothell) introduced [Senate Bill 5796](#), restructuring cannabis revenue appropriations. Among other adjustments to cannabis appropriations, the bill establishes and diverts un-appropriated funds into the Community Reinvestment Account. Funds from this account are intended to increase equity for historically marginalized communities. Funds may be used for economic development purposes that address wealth disparities, civil and criminal legal assistance, community-based violence intervention and prevention, re-entry services, and tobacco and cannabis education efforts among medically underserved communities.

Notably, the bill also increases cannabis revenue appropriations to cities and counties, providing an extra \$7.8 million annually. GTHGA will be testifying in support of this proposal at the hearing on Wednesday, January 19. Our messaging will be focused on supporting the increase in county marijuana revenue share but pointing out that this amount must be increased to make a meaningful dent in substance use disorder and behavioral health treatment. GTHGA will be meeting with bill sponsors Sen. Stanford and Sen. Marko Liias (D- Lynnwood) early next week to ensure messaging is appropriate for the hearing.

Support the Lynnwood Recovery Center

The City of Lynnwood is putting forward a capital budget request to establish a Community Recovery Center, expanding behavioral health capacity to both inmates and the public. The County will look for opportunities to support the City's request. This week, representatives from the City of Lynnwood spoke at the County's delegation meeting to provide additional information on the project concept and request. For those who were not able to attend, GTHGA sent the City's materials out following the call. Rep. Lauren Davis (D- Shoreline) spoke at the end of the event and indicated that a request



amount has not been finalized for the project; she will be pitching the request to capital budget writers and staff in the next few weeks.

Regional Apprenticeship Pathways Program

Snohomish County's Regional Apprenticeship Pathways Program (RAP) received \$1.5 million in both the 2019 – 21 biennium and in the 2021-23 biennium; however, the County has not been successful at securing ongoing investment of \$1.5 million/biennium to support the program. The Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) agreed to include ongoing funding for RAP in their 2023 agency decision package. Meanwhile, GTHGA will be looking for potential opportunities to advance our goal this legislative session. We will also be looking for chances to support expansion of apprenticeship programs statewide.

Last week, Sen. Karen Keiser (D- Kent), Chair of the Senate Labor, Commerce, & Tribal Affairs Committee, heard legislation to expand registered apprenticeships statewide: [Senate Bill 5600](#). The bill received mixed feedback at the hearing, receiving general support for apprenticeship expansion statewide but concerns with the mechanisms used to support this goal. We have flagged this bill as a possible vehicle to house ongoing funding for RAP. Staff at Workforce Snohomish has reviewed the bill and indicated that there are some concerns with the current draft. Their comments are below:

1. Sec.2., regarding the apprenticeship council establishment of economic or industry sector-based subcommittees, including subcommittees to encourage development of apprenticeship programs. State run committees can be helpful in driving policy change; however, the bill should provision for inclusivity and representation from local areas. When we look at the overall intent of this bill – to expand apprenticeship programs and maintain quality standards, accomplishing this is dependent upon inclusion of different perspectives and voices, including community small businesses.
2. There is a tremendous amount of data available on the value created through degree attainment (2 and 4-year). By this I mean, workers with degrees are more resilient to economic downturns and retain their jobs at higher rates, and earn higher wages. Provided that the bill (Sec. 9) provisions for research on retention, I strongly suggest an additional layer of research, to longitudinally understand the impact on workers entering apprenticeships – both in wages and employment retention. This research is essential to increasing the number of individuals entering apprenticeship programs and diversifying opportunities.
3. Sec. 4 and 5 are excellent addition to the existing RCW, supporting sustainability of programs, access to high quality, family-sustaining jobs and support for adaptation of programs to accommodate remote learning and continuity of apprenticeship learning.
4. Sec 6. I agree that additional resources are indeed needed to remove barriers to entering and retaining apprentices. With that said, I am concerned about standing up a separate system to provide wrap-around and supportive services for apprentices. I would strongly encourage consultation with the public workforce development system to determine how existing programs that provide these services may be leveraged to support effective and efficient access to these grants in coordination with non-profits and JATCs. At a minimum, it would be beneficial to provision for access to and utilization of the state's efforts to outcomes system (or its replacement) to track these services in a central database along with other federal funds that provide this same support.



5. Sec. 9 pertaining to retention study and early alert. An excellent investment and much needed in the system. I will note that there are many unions and JATCs that track this data (per recent discussions under Good Jobs Challenge), so in many respects we know what the barriers are, but lack coordination of and availability of flexible resources to systematically invest in addressing these issues (including trained mentors).
6. Sec. 10 – I support incentivization of apprenticeship utilization but will circle back to my prior comment on the importance of longitudinal data on the resiliency of apprentices juxtaposed to traditional degrees. It is important that as we diversify pathways that we ensure that the outcomes for worker wages, career progression and resiliency for workers and businesses alike are comparable.

This bill is likely to change as it advances.

[House Bill 1536](#), introduced in the 2021 legislative session and sponsored by Rep. Jacquelin Maycumber (R- Republic), will be heard this week in the House Education Committee. This bill establishes regional apprenticeship programs through Education Service Districts. Snohomish County's ESD encompasses 5 counties. RAP staff are assessing this bill for potential impacts, including diffusion of existing funding. Councilmember Nehring also reached out to the bill sponsor to express possible concerns with the legislation.

Senate Bill 5575 – Adding Superior Court Judges

Snohomish County supports [Senate Bill 5575](#), funding 2 additional superior court judges in Snohomish County. This bill is brought forward by the Administrative Office of the Courts on the County's behalf and is sponsored by Sen. John Lovick (D- Mill Creek) and Sen. June Robinson (D- Everett). The bill was heard on Thursday, January 13, in the Senate Law and Justice Committee. At the hearing on Thursday, Judge Millie Judge testified on behalf of Snohomish County Superior Court in support of the legislation, explaining the need for the additional positions to address the County's growing population and significant backlog of cases. Transportation

Keep Washington Rolling Letter

GTHGA attends weekly "Keep Washington Rolling" stakeholder meetings, a coalition of various interests including labor, local governments, transit, business, ports, and more, advocating for passage of a transportation revenue package that includes additive transportation investments. As we've reported, transportation budget writers have shifted focus to passing a smaller package this legislative session providing maintenance and preservation funding, addressing ferry operational and capital needs, allocating Climate Commitment Act funding, and keeping existing investments, including mega-projects, on track. The coalition is asking for entities to [sign on to a letter](#) supporting



the passage of a smaller package that supports these goals. Many councilmembers have added their names to the letter; please let Ms. Harper know if you would like to be included.

Other Items

Chronic Homelessness Coalition

The Executive's Office is participating in a coalition urging legislative efforts to address homelessness, including significant investments this legislative session. The coalition is called [House Washington: A Coalition to End Chronic Homelessness](#). Last week, the group distributed [a letter](#) supporting the Governor's approach to bolstering the Rapid Housing Acquisition Fund, Housing Emergency Trust Fund, and increasing funding for behavioral health and mental health services. Executive's Office staff will be participating in weekly meetings; we will report out relevant updates on this effort.

Senate Bill 5528 – Sound Transit Authority

[Senate Bill 5528](#), sponsored by Sen. Jamie Pedersen (D- Seattle) and Sen. Marko Liias (D- Lynnwood), would allow Sound Transit to establish "enhanced service zones" within certain parts of the RTA, allowing for additional financial investment to fund additional system improvements. The bill was heard in the Senate Transportation Committee on Thursday, January 13, at 4:00 p.m. Proponents supported the concept of being able to speed up implementation of light rail in certain areas, namely Ballard and West Seattle, should they choose to pay for it. Ranking Member Sen. Curtis King (R- Yakima) expressed concerns that this funding mechanism will draw funding and efforts away from completing the spine. Sen. Pederson explained that he believed the bill structure protected from funding diversion by keeping the governance structure whole, requiring consensus on the timing and funding allocation from the entire Sound Transit governance structure. County staff would like to include language that would explicitly prevent these improvements from impacting the funding for the spine. We intend to discuss this concept further with Sen. Liias at our meeting on Tuesday.

House Bill 1770 – Optional Statewide Energy Reach Code

[House Bill 1770](#), sponsored by Rep. Davina Duerr (D- Bothell), would allow counties to adopt optional energy reach codes for residential buildings. County staff is reviewing this bill for any potential concerns.

House Bill 1700/Senate Bill 5598 – Derelict Vessel Removal Program

[House Bill 1700](#), sponsored by Rep. Dave Paul (D- Oak Harbor) and companion [Senate Bill 5598](#), sponsored by Sen. Liz Lovelett (D- Anacortes), increases funding to the Department of Natural Resources' Derelict Vessel Program. The bill would amount to an additional \$5 million/biennium for the program. Both versions of the bill are being heard next week. County staff are reviewing the legislation for any potential concerns but we are anticipating supporting this legislation at the hearings.

House Bill 1663 – Methane Emissions from Landfills

[House Bill 1663](#), sponsored by Rep. Davina Duerr (D- Bothell), would require entities with landfills over 450,000 tons of waste in place to do a variety of actions to reduce methane emissions. Currently, the bill does not provide funding to implement the legislation. County staff has reviewed this bill for potential impacts and has assembled a list of questions on the legislation for the bill sponsor to



review. We will send these questions to Rep. Duerr once we receive them from staff. WSAC is opposed to the legislation as currently written.

Clarifying Police Reform Proposals

The House Public Safety Committee held public hearings on three bills further refining police reform bills enacted during the 2021 legislative session. Below is a synopsis of what occurred at each hearing:

- [House Bill 1719](#), sponsored by Rep. Dan Bronoske (D- Lakewood), clarifies that bean bags can be used as a de-escalation tactic. Nearly unanimous support was expressed for allowing the use of a 'military' weapon (i.e., rifle of .50 caliber or higher) with the capacity to shoot non-penetrating impact rounds such as bean bags, or rubber munition. Committee members indicated that this provision was unintentionally missed by all when the bill was discussed and passed in 2021. The Public Safety Committee is scheduled to vote on this bill January 20.
- [House Bill 1735](#), sponsored by Rep. Jesse Johnson (D- Federal Way), clarifies that deadly force may be used in the face of an immediate threat of serious injury against the officer or another individual, and that physical force would be allowed under limited circumstances to ensure the safety of officers when taking a person into custody for civil or forensic commitment, taking a minor into protective custody, and executing and enforcing court orders. At the public hearing, law enforcement, community members, non-profit leaders, and more expressed general support for the bill while identifying several areas for minor improvement, such as how broadly court orders are defined. The ACLU warned that the bill as drafted may be too broad. The House Public Safety Committee indicated it will work on amendments to the bill and is scheduled to vote on those amendments on January 20.
- [House Bill 1726](#), sponsored by Rep. Roger Goodman (D- Kirkland), allows an officer to use physical force when there is reasonable suspicion that the person has committed, or is committing a violent offense including: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th degree assault, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th degree assault of a child, or domestic violence. Over two dozen people signed in to testify on this bill, however, due to time constraints, not everyone was able to testify. The overwhelming majority signed in opposed to the bill. Law enforcement opposed the bill, stating that two different standards will cause confusion and a desire for reasonable suspicion to be restored for all crimes, and indicated that a statewide definition of physical force is needed. Community members, ACLU, disability rights advocates, and the Coalition for Police Accountability opposed the bill, articulating several scenarios where deadly use of police force was used where there was reasonable suspicion for a non-violent crime. Before the Committee makes a final decision regarding support or opposition, they would like to see what the Washington State Attorney General's office policy regarding de-escalation and use of force standard. The policy may not be available before the end of session, as it is due by July 1, 2022. The Committee is not scheduled to take further action on the bill at this time.

Additional police reform issues were also heard this week:

- The House Civil Rights and Judiciary Committee held a public hearing on [House Bill 1202](#), sponsored by Rep. My-Linh Thai (D- Bellevue), which creates a civil cause of action for



persons injured by a law enforcement officer. The Association of Washington Cities (AWC) and Washington State Association of Counties (WSAC) opposed this proposal because of the increased liability cities would incur if it were law. Additionally, the Washington City Insurance Authority indicated the bill would increase insurance costs for cities and counties. Thirteen supporters argued that financial compensation is one mechanism for accountability and breaks down the barriers that victims, their families, and the community face when trying to change the culture of policing. The House Civil Rights and Judiciary Committee is not scheduled to take further action on the bill at this time.

- [House Bill 1507](#), sponsored by Rep. Debra Entenman (D- Covington), builds on legislation enacted during the 2021 legislative session to establish an Office of Independent Investigations for instances of police use of force that result in serious bodily injury or death. House Bill 1507 would establish independent prosecutorial authority within the Attorney General's Office that would apply concurrently to local prosecutorial authority. The Washington Association of Prosecuting Attorneys testified against the bill, indicating that they believe constitutional issues remain with the proposal.

GTHGA is monitoring the following priority items on the County's behalf. We will provide updates on these items as legislative action occurs. We will continue to be in contact with you on legislative proposals relevant to these items.
