#### APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE TO SIGN SUB-AWARD AGREEMENTS WITH DUCKS UNLIMITED AND WASHINGTON FARMLAND TRUST TO IMPLEMENT PORTIONS OF THE COMMUNITY FLOODPLAIN SOLUTIONS -PHASE III IMPLEMENTATION PROJECT

WHEREAS, Snohomish County was awarded grant funds from the Washington State Department of Ecology ("Ecology") Floodplains by Design (FbD) program in Ecology Grant Agreement #SEAFBD-2325-SnCoCN-00046 (the "County Grant") to implement the Community Floodplain Solutions - Phase III Implementation Project; and

WHEREAS, the County Grant from Ecology identifies Ducks Unlimited, Inc. (DU) and Washington Farmland Trust (WFT) as a sub-awardees and allows the County to enter into subaward agreements with those entities to pass through County Grant funds; and

WHEREAS, as a sub-awardee DU will receive One Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for the implementation of the Bear Creek Willow Planting, the High Bridge Integrated Drainage, and the Getchell Ranch (Farm #2) Integrated Drainage Projects through the sub-award agreement attached hereto as Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, as a sub-awardee PCC Farmland Trust, doing business as WFT, will receive Two Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$275,000) to develop a pipeline of potential conservation easement acquisitions on farmland in the Snohomish Basin, with an option to acquire a conservation easement identified in the course of developing the pipeline, through the sub-award agreement attached hereto as Exhibit B; and

WHEREAS, as part of the County Grant, the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources Surface Water Management Division will also conduct grant administration for the two sub-awardees;

NOW, THEREFORE, ON MOTION, the Snohomish County Council approves and authorizes the County Executive, or his designee, to execute the sub-award agreements with DU in the amount of \$175.000 (Exhibit A) and WFT in the amount of \$275.000 (Exhibit B) and any amendments thereto for the total amount of \$450,000.

GRANT SUB-AWARD AGREEMENT BETWEEN SNOHOMISH COUNTY AND DUCKS UNLIMITED INC TO IMPLEMENT PORTIONS OF THE COMMUNITY FLOODPLAINS SOLUTIONS- PHASE 3 IMPLEMENTATION PROJECT

#### GRANT SUB-AWARD AGREEMENT BETWEEN SNOHOMISH COUNTY AND DUCKS UNLIMITED, INC. TO IMPLEMENT PORTIONS OF THE COMMUNITY FLOODPLAIN SOLUTIONS – PHASE 3 IMPLEMENTATION PROJECT

From Date of Execution to June 30, 2027

This Grant Sub-Award Agreement Between Snohomish County and Ducks Unlimited, Inc. to Implement Portions of the Community Floodplain Solutions – Phase 3 Implementation Project (this "Agreement"), is made and entered into by and between Snohomish County, a political subdivision of the State of Washington (the "County"), and Ducks Unlimited, Inc. ("DU"), a District of Columbia nonprofit corporation.

### RECITALS

- A. Snohomish County was awarded grant funds from the Washington State Department of Ecology ("Ecology") Floodplains by Design (FbD) program in Ecology Grant Agreement #SEAFBD-2325-SnCoCN-00046 (the "County Grant") to implement the Community Floodplain Solutions – Phase 3 Implementation Project.
- B. The County Grant identifies DU as a sub-awardee and allows the County to enter into a sub-award agreement to pass through Grant funds in the amount of One Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) to DU for the implementation of the Bear Creek Willow Planting, High Bridge Integrated Drainage, and Getchell Ranch (Farm #2) Integrated Drainage Projects.
- C. As defined in Appendix A, DU staff and contracted representatives will undertake certain activities under the County Grant and will collaborate with project partners.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the respective agreements set forth below and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the County and DU agree as follows:

#### **1. PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT**

Community Floodplain Solutions is a program that advances implementation of integrated floodplain management in the Snohomish Watershed. The purpose of this Agreement is to sub-award a portion of the County Grant and to contract with DU for services associated with the implementation of the Bear Creek Willow Planting, High Bridge Integrated Drainage, and Getchell Ranch (Farm #2) Integrated Drainage Projects (the "Projects") described in Appendix A (the "Scope of Work"), attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. The source of funds for this Agreement is the County Grant, attached hereto as Appendix D and incorporated herein to the extent referenced by this Agreement.

### 2. DURATION OF AGREEMENT

- A. The term of this Agreement is the date of execution through June 30, 2027 (the "Term"), unless extended or terminated as provided herein. The County's obligations after December 31, 2024, are contingent upon local legislative appropriation of necessary funds in accordance with applicable laws and the Snohomish County Charter. In the event funding becomes unavailable for work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement, all work shall terminate in accordance with provisions of this Agreement upon the last day of funding.
- B. Notwithstanding the Term of this Agreement, all activities described in Appendix A to this Agreement that are performed after the County Grant award date of July 1, 2023, shall be eligible for funding under this Agreement.

### **3. SCOPE OF WORK**

- A. DU shall furnish the necessary personnel, equipment, material, parts, and/or services and otherwise to do all the things necessary for or incidental to the performance of work set forth in Appendix A.
- B. DU will not be required to perform work for the County in excess of work specified in Appendix A except by mutual agreement to a written amendment to this Agreement.

### 4. **PERFORMANCE**

DU agrees to complete all work described in Appendix A and satisfy all aspects of this Agreement in a timely and professional manner. If at any time DU cannot fulfill its responsibilities under this Agreement, DU shall notify the County thereof in writing, together with an explanation of why said responsibilities cannot be fulfilled. Failure to perform shall be cause for the County to terminate this Agreement under Section 13.C. A decision by the County not to terminate after a failure by DU to meet its responsibilities shall not constitute a waiver of the right to terminate based on such failed responsibility nor a forfeiture of the County's right to terminate in the future.

#### 5. SUBCONTRACTING

- A. DU is authorized to subcontract with Sound Salmon Solutions to assist with Task 1 (Bear Creek Willow Planting). Notwithstanding the foregoing, DU shall not enter into any additional subcontracts for any of the work contemplated under this Agreement without the prior written approval of the County. This clause does not include contracts of employment between DU and personnel assigned to work under this Agreement.
- B. DU is responsible for ensuring that all terms, conditions, assurances, and certifications set forth in this Agreement and the County Grant are carried forward to any

subcontracts. DU and its subcontractors agree not to release, divulge, publish, transfer, sell or otherwise make known to unauthorized persons personal information without the express written consent of the County or as provided by law.

C. If, at any time during the progress of the work, the County determines in its sole judgment that any subcontractor is incompetent, the County shall notify DU, and DU shall take immediate steps to terminate the subcontractor's involvement in the work. The rejection or approval by the County of any subcontractor or the termination of a subcontractor shall not relieve DU of any of its responsibilities under this Agreement, nor be the basis for additional charges to the County.

### 6. ADMINISTRATION OF AGREEMENT

Each party to this Agreement shall designate an individual who may be designated by title or position to oversee and administer such party's participation in this Agreement. The parties' initial Administrators shall be the following individuals:

Any notice required by a party to this Agreement shall be provided to the other party's Administrator.

#### 7. MONITORING

The County shall have responsibility for monitoring the performance of DU's work under this Agreement, consistent with the responsibilities set forth in Appendix A. Upon DU's submittal of any report, invoice or other information required by the Scope of Work in Appendix A, the County may accept, reject, request modifications to, or request additions to the work, as the County deems appropriate.

#### 8. COMPENSATION

A. The budget for work to be performed under this Agreement is \$175,000 as set forth in Appendix B, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. The County will compensate DU for costs necessary to perform the work described in Appendix A. Requests for compensation by DU shall include an invoice which itemizes DU's total work and personnel costs with an hourly rate apportioned amongst the various labor categories and tasks as detailed in Appendix B. The sum of work performed by DU

pursuant to this Agreement shall be invoiced as described in Section 9 of this Agreement.

- B. Compensation for work performed under this Agreement will not be made available until the work is accepted by the County and the Progress Reports described in Appendix A are uploaded to the SharePoint site at the "Quarterly Reporting" page of the CFS homepage <u>Community Floodplain Solutions Home (sharepoint.com)</u> or sent directly to Jessica Hamill at <u>Jessica.Hamill@snoco.org</u>. The County shall have the right to withhold payment of all or any portion of an invoice provided under Section 9 below if the County has a reasonable good faith basis to believe that the work performed by DU is not consistent with the Scope of Work defined in Appendix A.
- C. In no event shall the compensation to be provided under this Agreement exceed \$175,000 for the Term of this Agreement.
- D. The source of funds for this Agreement is the County Grant. Such funds shall be used only in fulfilling work specified in Appendix A. If a reduction of County Grant funds occurs, the County may unilaterally terminate all or part of this Agreement or may reduce the Scope of Work detailed in Appendix A.

### 9. INVOICING AND PAYMENT

A. DU shall submit all invoices quarterly to:

Invoices shall be submitted within thirty (30) days of the end of the quarter, and within ten (10) days of the end of the last quarter of the year. Said invoices shall accurately and completely document all labor costs, materials costs, equipment costs and other reimbursable costs for services that meet the requirements of this Agreement and the County Grant. Upon expiration of this Agreement, any claim for payment not already made shall be submitted within 30 days after the expiration date or the end of the fiscal year, whichever is earlier.

B. The County will provide reimbursement within thirty (30) days of accepting work detailed in a written invoice, provided the invoice clearly identifies work performed and costs incurred, and that the work as specified in Appendix A has been accomplished.

### **10. AUDIT AND INSPECTION**

DU shall maintain records pursuant to this Agreement in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and practices consistently applied. DU's records shall be available for inspection and audit by the County, the State Auditor, federal auditors, and any persons duly authorized by the parties. DU shall preserve and make such records available to said parties until expiration of six (6) years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.

### 11. ENTIRETY OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the County and DU and supersedes all proposals, oral and written, and all other communication between the parties in relation to the subject matter of this Agreement. No other agreement exists between the County and DU with regards to the instant subject matter except as expressly set forth in this instrument.

### **12. AGREEMENT ALTERATIONS AND AMENDMENTS**

This Agreement may be altered or amended by mutual agreement of both parties. Such alterations or amendments shall not be binding unless they are in writing and executed by personnel authorized to bind each of the parties.

#### **13. TERMINATION**

- A. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days' prior written notification to the other party. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred, including all non-cancellable expenses, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.
- B. In the event funding from state, federal, or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date of this Agreement and prior to normal completion, the County may, without advance notice and without liability for damages, terminate this Agreement by providing written notice to DU. The termination shall be effective on the date specified in the termination notice. DU shall continue to perform their obligations through the date of termination. The obligation of the County to make final payment shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- C. If for any cause, either party does not fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Agreement, or if either party violates any of these terms and conditions, the aggrieved party will give the other party written notice of such failure or violation. The responsible party will be given the opportunity to correct the violation or failure within fifteen (15) working days. If the failure or violation is not corrected,

this Agreement may be terminated immediately by written notice of the aggrieved party to the other.

### 14. **RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARTIES**

Each party to this Agreement hereby assumes responsibility for claims and/or damages to persons and/or property resulting from any act or omission on the part of itself, its employees, its officers, and its agents. Neither party assumes any responsibility to the other party for the consequences of any claim, act or omission of any person, agency, firm, or corporation not a party to this Agreement.

### **15. RIGHTS AND REMEDIES**

- A. In no event shall any payment by the County to DU constitute a waiver by the County of any breach of covenant or any default that may exist on the part of DU. The making of any such payment by the County while any such breach or default exists shall in no way impair or prejudice any of the County's rights and remedies, hereby expressly recognized, to recover payments or portions thereof, to which DU was not entitled under this Agreement, where any payments were made by mistake, or to pursue any other remedy available to the County with respect to breach or default of this Agreement.
- B. Performance pursuant to this Agreement may, where appropriate, be offered in satisfaction of an obligation, duty, or responsibility conveyed to the County or DU where allowed by law. The County, where legally authorized, may delegate any responsibility to DU where contemplated under an Appendix or included in the scope of work.
- C. In the event the County terminates this Agreement pursuant to Section 13, the County will not be held liable for any monetary loss incurred by DU due to termination.

### 16. HOLD HARMLESS

DU agrees to protect and hold harmless the County, its elected and appointed officials, employees and agents, from and against all claims, demands and causes of action of any kind or character arising out of any recklessness, grossly negligent acts or omissions, or intentional misconduct of DU, its officials, employees and agents in performing this Agreement.

### 17. RELATIONSHIP TO EXISTING LAWS AND VENUE

This Agreement is entered into pursuant to and under the authority granted by the laws of the State of Washington and any applicable federal laws. The provisions of this Agreement shall be construed to conform to those laws. In the event an inconsistency in the terms of this Agreement, or between its terms and any applicable statue or rule, the inconsistency shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order:

- 1. Applicable state and federal statues and rules;
- 2. Statement of Work (Appendix A); and
- 3. Any other provisions of the Agreement, including materials incorporated by reference.

The parties stipulate that any lawsuit regarding this Agreement must be brought in Snohomish County, Washington.

#### **18.** NON-ASSIGNMENT

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, DU shall not subcontract, assign or delegate any of the rights, duties or obligations covered by this Agreement without prior express written consent by the County.

### **19. SEVERABILITY**

If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby if such remainder would then continue to serve the purposes and objectives of the Agreement as determined by the County.

#### **20. INSURANCE**

DU shall carry for the duration of this Agreement, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by DU, its agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors. Annual proof of insurance will be submitted to the County. Such insurance shall name the County as an additional insured and shall not be reduced or canceled without prior written notice to the County as provided in the insurance policy.

No Limitation. DU's maintenance of insurance as required by the Agreement shall not be construed to limit the liability of DU to the coverage provided by such insurance, or otherwise limit the County's recourse to any remedy available at law or in equity.

The DU shall obtain insurance of the types described below:

- A. <u>Minimum Scope and Limits of Insurance.</u> The DU shall maintain coverage at least as broad as, and with limits no less than:
  - (i) <u>General Liability:</u> \$ 1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage, and for those policies with aggregate limits, a \$ 2,000,000 aggregate limit. CG 00 01 current edition, including Products and Completed Operations;

- (ii) <u>Automobile Liability:</u> \$ 1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage. CA 0001 current edition, Symbol 1;
- (iii)Workers' Compensation: Statutory requirements of the state of residency; and

(iv)Employers' Liability or "Stop Gap" coverage: \$1,000,000.

- B. <u>Other Insurance Provisions and Requirements.</u> The insurance coverages required in this Agreement for all liability policies except Workers Compensation are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
  - (i) The County, its officers, officials, employees and agents are to be covered as additional insureds as respects liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of DU in connection with this Agreement. Such coverage shall be primary and non-contributory insurance as respects the County, its officers, officials, employees and agents. Additional Insured Endorsement shall be included with the certificate of insurance, "CG 2026 11/85" or its equivalent is required. <u>The County</u> <u>requires this Endorsement to complete the Agreement.</u>
  - (ii) DU's insurance coverage shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made and/or lawsuit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
  - (iv)Coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits, until prior written notice, has been given to the County in accordance with the insurance policy.
  - (v) Insurance coverage is to be placed with insurers with a Bests' rating of no less than A: VIII, or, if not rated with Bests', with minimum surpluses the equivalent of Bests' surplus size VIII.

If at any time any of the foregoing policies fail to meet minimum requirements, DU shall, upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and shall submit the same to the County, with the appropriate certificates and endorsements, for approval.

### 22. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

DU will perform the services under this Agreement as an independent contractor and not as an agent, employee, or servant of the County. The parties agree that DU is not entitled to any benefits or rights enjoyed by employees of the County. DU specifically has the right to direct and control DU's own activities in providing the agreed services in accordance with the specifications set out in this Agreement. The County shall only have the right to ensure performance.

#### 23. PUBLIC RECORDS ACT

This Agreement and all public records associated with this Agreement shall be available from the County for inspection and copying by the public where required by the Public Records Act, Chapter 42.56 RCW.

#### 24. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY

The State of Washington is named as an express third-party beneficiary to this Agreement.

### Appendix A Scope of Work

This scope of work is intended to more specifically describe a portion of Task 4 of the County Grant. If there are any conflicts between this scope of work and the County Grant, the County Grant governs.

### **Purpose of the Project**

Snohomish County was awarded grant funds from the Washington State Department of Ecology ("Ecology") Floodplains by Design (FbD) program in Ecology Grant Agreement #SEAFBD-2325-SnCoCN-00046 (the "County Grant") to implement the Community Floodplain Solutions – Phase 3 Implementation Project.

As defined below, Ducks Unlimited (DU) staff and contracted representatives will undertake certain activities under the County Grant and will collaborate with project partners on these and other activities. Project partners include, but are not limited to, DU, the Tulalip Tribes, Snohomish County, Snohomish Project Implementation Team (IT), County Agricultural Coordinator, Snohomish Conservation District (SCD), Sustainable Lands Strategy (SLS), Farmland Conservation Working Group, and area landowners.

### **Activities**

### TASK 1 – Bear Creek Willow Planting [Portion of County Grant Task 4]

This action enhances 5 acres of floodplain wetlands and riparian habitat by planting scrub-shrub vegetation to enhance a beaver-maintained wetland complex. The Bear Creek Willow Planting project site [see Figure 1] is in the Wallace River natural area is just outside Sultan in Snohomish County, Washington. The Tulalip Tribes purchased the property to protect fish and wildlife habitat and promote natural geomorphic and faunal processes. The Bear Creek Willow Planting Project will create a plan for and plant live-stake trees and shrubs to outcompete the reed canary grass and improve riparian conditions. This action will plant tall willow, cottonwood, and dogwood live stakes to establish islands of densely spaced small trees. These islands of scrubshrub vegetation will jumpstart plant succession displacing reed canary grass and controlling it with shade. This project will be planted to site potential tree height.

### Task 1 – Expected Outcomes

- DU will create a planting plan for the Bear Creek Willow Planting project which enhances scrub-shrub wetland.
- DU will collaborate with the County to create a Monitoring, Maintenance and Adaptive Management Plan for the Bear Creek Willow Planting project. DU will implement the plan.
- DU will enhance scrub-shrub wetland at the 5-acre Bear Creek Willow Planting project site.
- DU will complete timely submittal of quarterly progress reports, billing, and recipient closeout report, and will properly maintain project documentation.
- DU will participate in no less than two and no more than four Snohomish Implementation Team (IT) meetings to provide project updates, collaborate on project elements, discuss any project issues, and further collaboration efforts with stakeholders across the Snohomish Basin. This requirement is identical to requirements in Tasks 2 and 3 and they may be accomplished by attendance at the same meetings.

### Task 1 – Deliverables by DU to the County

- [Portion of County Grant Deliverable 4.1] Planting plan, including species and quantity for plantings for Bear Creek project. **DUE to County: 6/30/2026**
- [Portion of County Grant Deliverable 4.2] Monitoring, Maintenance and Adaptive Management Plan for Bear Creek Planting. **DUE to County: 6/30/2027**

- [Portion of County Grant Deliverable 4.3] Annotated before and after photos of the planting phase for Bear Creek project. **DUE to County:** 6/30/2027
- [Portion of County Grant Deliverable 4.5] Cultural Resource Review documents, including Inadvertent Discovery Plan and survey (when required). DUE to County: 6/30/2026
- [County Grant Deliverable 1.1] Task progress report and billing will be submitted quarterly to Snohomish County on the following schedule, to allow for FbD Project Manager review, approval, and submittal to Ecology. Progress reports will communicate in memo style Task 1 activities completed and underway during the reporting quarter and issues encountered, activities anticipated for the next quarter, and lessons learned. This information will be included with County progress reporting to Ecology. **DUE to County: Quarterly through duration of Agreement (April 15th, July 15th, October 15th and January 7th)**

### Task 1 – FbD Grant - \$100,000

### TASK 2 – High Bridge Integrated Drainage Project [Portion of County Grant Task 4]

This planning and design project will enhance seasonal wetland functions, improve reliability in farming agricultural land affected by weather variability by allowing strategic drainage of fields while maintaining wetland functions, and improve water quality in the Snohomish River basin by planning: drainage improvements, riparian buffers, hedgerows, and farm management. This project is located near High Bridge on the Snoqualmie River. The High Bridge project site consists of approximately 41 acres and is depicted in Figure 2.

### Task 2 – Expected Outcomes

- DU will create an Implementation Plan for the High Bridge project that addresses: (1) drainage improvements, (2) riparian buffers, (3) hedgerows, and (4) farm management. The purpose of the plan is to enhance seasonal wetland functions, improve farm reliability, and improve water quality.
- DU will conduct a topographic survey of the High Bridge project site.
- DU will create a 60% design for the High Bridge project that, once constructed, will improve wetland functions, farm reliability, and water quality on working farmland. The design will include drainage improvements, road realignment, and planting plans.
- DU will complete timely submittal of quarterly progress reports, billing, and recipient closeout report, and will properly maintain project documentation.
- DU will participate in no less than two and no more than four Snohomish Implementation Team (IT) meetings to provide project updates, collaborate on project elements, and discuss any project issues, and further collaboration efforts with stakeholders across the Snohomish Basin. This requirement is identical to requirements in Tasks 1 and 3 and they may be accomplished by attendance at the same meetings.

### Task 2 – Deliverables by DU to the County

#### Project Short Description:

Community Floodplain Solutions (CFS) is a program that advances implementation of integrated floodplain management in the Snohomish Watershed. Snohomish County (RECIPIENT) will use CFS to increase ecological function, reduce impacts from flooding, and protect and enhance farmland productivity. Actions include design and construction of large-scale integrated floodplain projects, property acquisition, farmland conservation and efficiency enhancements, and project development.

#### Project Long Description:

Phase 3 of CFS is focused on implementing the projects that were designed and permitted as part of Floodplains by Design (FbD) funding for Phases 1 and 2, but also continue the development of a pipeline for new projects in the Snohomish Watershed. It is a cooperative effort between many partners aimed at working collaboratively to: increase ecological function; reduce impact to local infrastructure from flooding and sediment transport; protect and enhance

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farmland productivity; and, improve water quality and recreational opportunities in the community.

This agreement advances 13 capital actions aimed at improving emergency access during flood events, reducing flood risk, restoring habitat for federal Endangered Species Act (ESA) listed salmon, and enhancing agricultural resiliency.

Three of the 13 capital projects (Shinglebolt, Thomas' Eddy, Swans Trail Slough) are being advanced to construction.
Two projects (Tualco Valley, Sultan Reach Agriculture Resiliency) are being advanced from scoping and land use agreements through the final design and stakeholder engagement process.

•Two projects (Agriculture Landowner BMPs, Agriculture Conservation Easements) are continuing ongoing outreach and engagement with landowners to advance BMPs and conservation easements.

•One project (Chinook Marsh) is leveraging significant local and regional investments to complete 30% designs for feasibility analyses for restoration and water line or energy transmission line relocation activities.

•Seven projects (Bear Creek, Invasive Species Control and Riparian Plantings, IFM Framework and Program Initiative, High Bridge Project, Farm 2 Project, Advanced Farm Technology for Food Resiliency, and the Upland Agriculture Conservation study) are poised for implementation.

•Two projects (Tualco Valley, Woods Creek/Al Borlin Park) are advancing to feasibility and design.

This task is designed to permanently preserve habitat and agricultural land through property acquisition and easements, which is critical to preventing new development in areas known to be at risk from flooding, securing the land base for multi-benefit project implementation, and conserving agriculture. This task will be accomplished by performing the following actions:

A.The RECIPIENT shall acquire a minimum of 50 acres in the Tualco Valley area as well as develop a pipeline of farmland conservation easements in strategic locations in the watershed. Acquisitions shall be guided by the Lower Skykomish Floodplain Land Strategy that was completed in June 2021. The RECIPIENT will submit a full Acquisition Report for each fee-simple acquisition and conservation or agricultural easement purchased.

<sup>†</sup> When the estimated property value does not exceed \$25,000, and the acquisition is not complex, the RECIPIENT may be exempt from meeting appraisal and review appraisal standards. Such exemptions must be requested in writing and approved by the ECOLOGY Project Manager before the closing on the property. The RECIPIENT must follow the appraisal waiver standards in 44 C.F.R. § 24.102.

B. Escrow Process (if applicable): If the RECIPIENT requires funds to acquire a property prior to closing, the RECIPIENT can request an exception to ECOLOGY's reimbursement policy by going through the escrow process. This process allows ECOLOGY to pay a RECIPIENT's grant funds in advance for the property acquisition through the title / escrow company. E. The RECIPIENT will submit permits, preliminary and final designs and as-builts as listed in Deliverables 4.1 - 4.16 below.

F. The RECIPIENT will submit feasibility report, engagement results, and conceptual designs for the Woods Creek/Al Borlin project.

### SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Floodplains by Design and Flood Control Assistance Account Program - Special Terms and Conditions

1. Local Decision: This grant is made in response to a request for financial assistance from the RECIPIENT to undertake flood damage prevention projects. The choice of floodplain management activities addressed by this grant is a local decision made solely by the RECIPIENT. The RECIPIENT is not acting as an agent of the State of Washington.

2. Lawsuits: Ecology shall not be responsible for any non-contractual damage or inverse condemnation claims resulting from the structures or works constructed, repaired, restored, maintained, or improved pursuant to this grant.

3. Indemnification, Hold Harmless and Duty to Defend

a. Ecology shall in no way be held responsible for payment of salaries, consultant's fees, and other costs related to the project described herein, except as provided in the scope of work.

b. This paragraph applies to negligence based claims only. All other claims are governed by paragraph 4 of this section (item 3.d). To the extent the constitution and laws of the State of Washington permit, RECIPIENT shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the State, its agencies, officers and employees, from all claims, suits or actions brought for any or all injuries to persons or property arising from, or as a consequence of, negligent acts or omissions related to the construction, restoration, repair, maintenance, improvement or operation of the structures or works for which this grant is provided. If the structures or works for which this grant is received are a portion of an integrated flood protection system, RECIPIENT agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the State of Washington, its agencies, employees, and officers against any and all liability arising out of the operation, maintenance, or repair of that integrated flood protection system; PROVIDED, however, that this provision is not intended to and shall not be construed as a waiver by RECIPIENT of any immunities conferred upon the RECIPIENT by RCW 86.12.037 nor is it intended to, and it shall not be construed to, confer any rights upon third parties.

c. The RECIPIENT will not be required to indemnify, defend, or save harmless the State, its agencies, officers or employees as provided in the preceding paragraph of this section if the claim, suit, or action for injuries, death, or damages is caused by the sole negligence of the State. Where such claims, suits, or actions result from the concurrent negligence of (a) the State, or the State's agents or employees and (b) the RECIPIENT or the RECIPIENT's agents or employees, the indemnity provisions

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provided in the preceding paragraphs of this section shall be valid and enforceable only to the extent of the RECIPIENT's negligence or the negligence of its agents and employees.

d. To the extent that the constitution and laws of the State of Washington permit, RECIPIENT shall indemnify and hold harmless the State of Washington, its agencies, employees, and officers against any and all liability arising out of the continued operation, maintenance, or repair of the structures or works constructed, restored, repaired, maintained or improved as a result of this grant. If the structures or works for which this grant is received are portions of an integrated flood protection system, RECIPIENT agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the State of Washington, its agencies, employees, and officers against any and all liability arising out of the operation, maintenance, or repair of that integrated flood protection system; PROVIDED, however, that the indemnity provisions of this paragraph are not intended to and shall not be construed as a waiver by Recipient of any immunities conferred upon the Recipient by RCW 86.12.037 nor are they intended to, and they shall not be construed to, confer any rights upon third parties. This agreement applies to all non-negligent, non-contractually based claims including, but not limited to, inverse condemnation, contribution, indemnification, trespass and/or nuisance.

4. Any development activity funded by this grant which occurs in the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)-mapped regulatory floodplain, also known as the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), may trigger the need for a floodplain development permit from the local agency with floodplain management jurisdiction. "Development" is defined at 44 CFR 59.1 as " ... any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations or storage of equipment or materials." Further, any activity funded by this grant may change the base flood elevations from physical changes affecting the floodplain. Communities are required by 44 CFR 65.3 to submit new data to FEMA in the event their actions affect the base flood elevation and the regulatory map (the SFHA).

5. ECOLOGY waives property acquisition report appraisal requirements for properties valued at \$25,000 or less. When the estimated property value does not exceed \$25,000, and the acquisition is not complex, the RECIPIENT may be exempt from meeting appraisal and review appraisal standards. Such exemptions must be requested in writing and approved by the ECOLOGY Project Manager before the closing on the property. The RECIPIENT must follow the appraisal waiver standards in 44 C.F.R. § 24.102.

6. Some RECIPIENTS are required to provide grant match. Match is made up of three different types of contributions: cash expenditures, in kind other, and in kind interlocal. Cash match expenditures are eligible costs paid by the RECIPIENT and are not reimbursed by ECOLOGY. In kind contributions are property or services that benefit a project and are contributed to the RECIPIENT by a third party without direct monetary compensation. In kind other is a type of contribution where the third party making the contribution is not a government entity. In kind interlocal is a type of contribution where both the grant RECIPIENT and the third party making the contribution are both government entities and have a signed Inter-local agreement between them.

7. RECIPIENTS are required to submit a copy of the original invoice in the Payment Request backup documentation if an invoice number is referenced on a primary or subcontractor invoice.

8. To be eligible for reimbursement, RECIPIENTS must provide documentation of how an expenditure is directly related to the project. Ecology will not reimburse any expenditure that is already included in the indirect rate. At Ecology's sole discretion, ECOLOGY may approve reimbursement for the percentage of an expenditure that is directly related to the project.

e) Comply with RCW 27.53, RCW 27.44, and RCW 68.50.645, and all other applicable local, state, and federal laws protecting Cultural Resources and human remains.

### 5. ASSIGNMENT

No right or claim of the RECIPIENT arising under this Agreement shall be transferred or assigned by the RECIPIENT.

### 6. COMMUNICATION

RECIPIENT shall make every effort to maintain effective communications with the RECIPIENT's designees, ECOLOGY, all affected local, state, or federal jurisdictions, and any interested individuals or groups.

### 7. COMPENSATION

a) Any work performed prior to effective date of this Agreement will be at the sole expense and risk of the RECIPIENT. ECOLOGY must sign the Agreement before any payment requests can be submitted.

b) Payments will be made on a reimbursable basis for approved and completed work as specified in this Agreement.

c) RECIPIENT is responsible to determine if costs are eligible. Any questions regarding eligibility should be clarified with ECOLOGY prior to incurring costs. If any provision of this Agreement violates any statute or rule of law of the state of Washington, it is considered modified to conform to that statute or rule of law.

### 9. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

RECIPIENT and ECOLOGY agree that any officer, member, agent, or employee, who exercises any function or responsibility in the review, approval, or carrying out of this Agreement, shall not have any personal or financial interest, direct or indirect, nor affect the interest of any corporation, partnership, or association in which he/she is a part, in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof.

### 10. CONTRACTING FOR GOODS AND SERVICES

RECIPIENT may contract to buy goods or services related to its performance under this Agreement. RECIPIENT shall award all contracts for construction, purchase of goods, equipment, services, and professional architectural and engineering services through a competitive process, if required by State law. RECIPIENT is required to follow procurement procedures that ensure legal, fair, and open competition.

RECIPIENT must have a standard procurement process or follow current state procurement procedures. RECIPIENT may be required to provide written certification that they have followed their standard procurement procedures and applicable state law in awarding contracts under this Agreement.

ECOLOGY reserves the right to inspect and request copies of all procurement documentation, and review procurement practices related to this Agreement. Any costs incurred as a result of procurement practices not in compliance with state procurement law or the RECIPIENT's normal procedures may be disallowed at ECOLOGY's sole discretion.

### 11. DISPUTES

When there is a dispute with regard to the extent and character of the work, or any other matter related to this Agreement the determination of ECOLOGY will govern, although the RECIPIENT shall have the right to appeal decisions as provided for below:

- a) RECIPIENT notifies the funding program of an appeal request.
- b) Appeal request must be in writing and state the disputed issue(s).
- c) RECIPIENT has the opportunity to be heard and offer evidence in support of its appeal.
- d) ECOLOGY reviews the RECIPIENT's appeal.
- e) ECOLOGY sends a written answer within ten (10) business days, unless more time is needed, after concluding the review. Template Version 12/10/2020

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The decision of ECOLOGY from an appeal will be final and conclusive, unless within thirty (30) days from the date of such decision, the RECIPIENT furnishes to the Director of ECOLOGY a written appeal. The decision of the Director or duly authorized representative will be final and conclusive.

The parties agree that this dispute process will precede any action in a judicial or quasi-judicial tribunal.

Appeals of the Director's decision will be brought in the Superior Court of Thurston County. Review of the Director's decision will not be taken to Environmental and Land Use Hearings Office.

Pending final decision of a dispute, the RECIPIENT agrees to proceed diligently with the performance of this Agreement and in accordance with the decision rendered.

Nothing in this Agreement will be construed to limit the parties' choice of another mutually acceptable method, in addition to the dispute resolution procedure outlined above.

### 12. ENVIRONMENTAL DATA STANDARDS

a) RECIPIENT shall prepare a Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP) for a project that collects or uses environmental measurement data. RECIPIENTS unsure about whether a QAPP is required for their project shall contact the ECOLOGY Program issuing the grant or loan. If a QAPP is required, the RECIPIENT shall:

• Use ECOLOGY's QAPP Template/Checklist provided by the ECOLOGY, unless ECOLOGY Quality Assurance (QA) officer or the Program QA coordinator instructs otherwise.

• Follow ECOLOGY's Guidelines for Preparing Quality Assurance Project Plans for Environmental Studies, July 2004 (Ecology Publication No. 04-03-030).

• Submit the QAPP to ECOLOGY for review and approval before the start of the work.

b) RECIPIENT shall submit environmental data that was collected on a project to ECOLOGY using the Environmental Information Management system (EIM), unless the ECOLOGY Program instructs otherwise. The RECIPIENT must confirm with ECOLOGY that complete and correct data was successfully loaded into EIM, find instructions at: http://www.ecy.wa.gov/eim.

c) RECIPIENT shall follow ECOLOGY's data standards when Geographic Information System (GIS) data is collected and processed. Guidelines for Creating and Accessing GIS Data are available at:

https://ecology.wa.gov/Research-Data/Data-resources/Geographic-Information-Systems-GIS/Standards. RECIPIENT, when requested by ECOLOGY, shall provide copies to ECOLOGY of all final GIS data layers, imagery, related tables, raw data collection files, map products, and all metadata and project documentation.

### 13. GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement will be governed by the laws of the State of Washington, and the venue of any action brought hereunder will be in the Superior Court of Thurston County.

### 14. INDEMNIFICATION

ECOLOGY will in no way be held responsible for payment of salaries, consultant's fees, and other costs related to the project described herein, except as provided in the Scope of Work.

To the extent that the Constitution and laws of the State of Washington permit, each party will indemnify and hold the other harmless from and against any liability for any or all injuries to persons or property arising from the negligent act or omission of that party or that party's agents or employees arising out of this Agreement.

#### 15. INDEPENDENT STATUS

The employees, volunteers, or agents of each party who are engaged in the performance of this Agreement will continue to be employees, volunteers, or agents of that party and will not for any purpose be employees, volunteers, or agents of the other party.

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### 16. KICKBACKS

RECIPIENT is prohibited from inducing by any means any person employed or otherwise involved in this Agreement to give up any part of the compensation to which he/she is otherwise entitled to or receive any fee, commission, or gift in return for award of a subcontract hereunder.

### 17. MINORITY AND WOMEN'S BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (MWBE)

RECIPIENT is encouraged to solicit and recruit, to the extent possible, certified minority-owned (MBE) and women-owned (WBE) businesses in purchases and contracts initiated under this Agreement.

Contract awards or rejections cannot be made based on MWBE participation; however, the RECIPIENT is encouraged to take the following actions, when possible, in any procurement under this Agreement:

a) Include qualified minority and women's businesses on solicitation lists whenever they are potential sources of goods or services.

b) Divide the total requirements, when economically feasible, into smaller tasks or quantities, to permit maximum participation by qualified minority and women's businesses.

c) Establish delivery schedules, where work requirements permit, which will encourage participation of qualified minority and women's businesses.

d) Use the services and assistance of the Washington State Office of Minority and Women's Business Enterprises (OMWBE) (866-208-1064) and the Office of Minority Business Enterprises of the U.S. Department of Commerce, as appropriate.

### 18. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

In the event of inconsistency in this Agreement, unless otherwise provided herein, the inconsistency shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order: (a) applicable federal and state statutes and regulations; (b) The Agreement; (c) Scope of Work; (d) Special Terms and Conditions; (e) Any provisions or terms incorporated herein by reference, including the "Administrative Requirements for Recipients of Ecology Grants and Loans"; (f) Ecology Funding Program Guidelines; and (g) General Terms and Conditions.

### 19. PRESENTATION AND PROMOTIONAL MATERIALS

ECOLOGY reserves the right to approve RECIPIENT's communication documents and materials related to the fulfillment of this Agreement:

a) If requested, RECIPIENT shall provide a draft copy to ECOLOGY for review and approval ten (10) business days prior to production and distribution.

b) RECIPIENT shall include time for ECOLOGY's review and approval process in their project timeline.

c) If requested, RECIPIENT shall provide ECOLOGY two (2) final copies and an electronic copy of any tangible products developed.

Copies include any printed materials, and all tangible products developed such as brochures, manuals, pamphlets, videos, audio tapes, CDs, curriculum, posters, media announcements, or gadgets with a message, such as a refrigerator magnet, and any online communications, such as web pages, blogs, and twitter campaigns. If it is not practical to provide a copy, then the RECIPIENT shall provide a description (photographs, drawings, printouts, etc.) that best represents the item.

Any communications intended for public distribution that uses ECOLOGY's logo shall comply with ECOLOGY's graphic requirements and any additional requirements specified in this Agreement. Before the use of ECOLOGY's logo contact ECOLOGY for guidelines.

RECIPIENT shall acknowledge in the communications that funding was provided by ECOLOGY.

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a) RECIPIENT must satisfactorily demonstrate the timely use of funds by submitting payment requests and progress reports to ECOLOGY. ECOLOGY reserves the right to amend or terminate this Agreement if the RECIPIENT does not document timely use of funds.

b) RECIPIENT must submit a progress report with each payment request. Payment requests will not be processed without a progress report. ECOLOGY will define the elements and frequency of progress reports.

c) RECIPIENT shall use ECOLOGY's provided progress report format.

d) Quarterly progress reports will cover the periods from January 1 through March 31, April 1 through June 30, July 1 through September 30, and October 1 through December 31. Reports shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after the end of the quarter being reported.

e) RECIPIENT must submit within thirty (30) days of the expiration date of the project, unless an extension has been approved by ECOLOGY, all financial, performance, and other reports required by the Agreement and funding program guidelines. RECIPIENT shall use the ECOLOGY provided closeout report format.

### 21. PROPERTY RIGHTS

a) Copyrights and Patents. When the RECIPIENT creates any copyrightable materials or invents any patentable property under this Agreement, the RECIPIENT may copyright or patent the same but ECOLOGY retains a royalty free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, recover, or otherwise use the material(s) or property, and to authorize others to use the same for federal, state, or local government purposes.

b) Publications. When the RECIPIENT or persons employed by the RECIPIENT use or publish ECOLOGY information; present papers, lectures, or seminars involving information supplied by ECOLOGY; or use logos, reports, maps, or other data in printed reports, signs, brochures, pamphlets, etc., appropriate credit shall be given to ECOLOGY.

c) Presentation and Promotional Materials. ECOLOGY shall have the right to use or reproduce any printed or graphic materials produced in fulfillment of this Agreement, in any manner ECOLOGY deems appropriate. ECOLOGY shall acknowledge the RECIPIENT as the sole copyright owner in every use or reproduction of the materials.

d) Tangible Property Rights. ECOLOGY's current edition of "Administrative Requirements for Recipients of Ecology Grants and Loans," shall control the use and disposition of all real and personal property purchased wholly or in part with funds furnished by ECOLOGY in the absence of state and federal statutes, regulations, or policies to the contrary, or upon specific instructions with respect thereto in this Agreement.

e) Personal Property Furnished by ECOLOGY. When ECOLOGY provides personal property directly to the RECIPIENT for use in performance of the project, it shall be returned to ECOLOGY prior to final payment by ECOLOGY. If said property is lost, stolen, or damaged while in the RECIPIENT's possession, then ECOLOGY shall be reimbursed in cash or by setoff by the RECIPIENT for the fair market value of such property.

f) Acquisition Projects. The following provisions shall apply if the project covered by this Agreement includes funds for the acquisition of land or facilities:

1. RECIPIENT shall establish that the cost is fair value and reasonable prior to disbursement of funds provided for in this Agreement.

2. RECIPIENT shall provide satisfactory evidence of title or ability to acquire title for each parcel prior to disbursement of funds provided by this Agreement. Such evidence may include title insurance policies, Torrens certificates, or abstracts, and attorney's opinions establishing that the land is free from any impediment, lien, or claim which would impair the uses intended by this Agreement.

g) Conversions. Regardless of the Agreement expiration date, the RECIPIENT shall not at any time convert any equipment, property, or facility acquired or developed under this Agreement to uses other than those for which assistance was originally approved without prior written approval of ECOLOGY. Such approval may be conditioned upon payment to ECOLOGY of that portion of the proceeds of the sale, lease, or other conversion or encumbrance which monies granted pursuant to this Agreement bear to the total acquisition, purchase, or construction costs of such property.

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## 22. RECORDS, AUDITS, AND INSPECTIONS

RECIPIENT shall maintain complete program and financial records relating to this Agreement, including any engineering documentation and field inspection reports of all construction work accomplished.

All records shall:

a) Be kept in a manner which provides an audit trail for all expenditures.

b) Be kept in a common file to facilitate audits and inspections.

c) Clearly indicate total receipts and expenditures related to this Agreement.

d) Be open for audit or inspection by ECOLOGY, or by any duly authorized audit representative of the State of Washington, for a period of at least three (3) years after the final grant payment or loan repayment, or any dispute resolution hereunder. RECIPIENT shall provide clarification and make necessary adjustments if any audits or inspections identify discrepancies in the records.

ECOLOGY reserves the right to audit, or have a designated third party audit, applicable records to ensure that the state has been properly invoiced. Any remedies and penalties allowed by law to recover monies determined owed will be enforced. Repetitive instances of incorrect invoicing or inadequate records may be considered cause for termination.

All work performed under this Agreement and any property and equipment purchased shall be made available to ECOLOGY and to any authorized state, federal or local representative for inspection at any time during the course of this Agreement and for at least three (3) years following grant or loan termination or dispute resolution hereunder.

RECIPIENT shall provide right of access to ECOLOGY, or any other authorized representative, at all reasonable times, in order to monitor and evaluate performance, compliance, and any other conditions under this Agreement.

## 23. RECOVERY OF FUNDS

The right of the RECIPIENT to retain monies received as reimbursement payments is contingent upon satisfactory performance of this Agreement and completion of the work described in the Scope of Work.

All payments to the RECIPIENT are subject to approval and audit by ECOLOGY, and any unauthorized expenditure(s) or unallowable cost charged to this Agreement shall be refunded to ECOLOGY by the RECIPIENT.

RECIPIENT shall refund to ECOLOGY the full amount of any erroneous payment or overpayment under this Agreement. RECIPIENT shall refund by check payable to ECOLOGY the amount of any such reduction of payments or repayments within thirty (30) days of a written notice. Interest will accrue at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per year from the time ECOLOGY demands repayment of funds.

Any property acquired under this Agreement, at the option of ECOLOGY, may become ECOLOGY's property and the RECIPIENT's liability to repay monies will be reduced by an amount reflecting the fair value of such property.

## 24. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement or any provision of any document incorporated by reference shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.

25. STATE ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY ACT (SEPA)

RECIPIENT must demonstrate to ECOLOGY's satisfaction that compliance with the requirements of the State Environmental Policy Act (Chapter 43.21C RCW and Chapter 197-11 WAC) have been or will be met. Any reimbursements are subject to this provision.

### 26. SUSPENSION

When in the best interest of ECOLOGY, ECOLOGY may at any time, and without cause, suspend this Agreement or any portion thereof for a temporary period by written notice from ECOLOGY to the RECIPIENT. RECIPIENT shall resume performance on the next business day following the suspension period unless another day is specified by ECOLOGY. Template Version 12/10/2020

#### 27. SUSTAINABLE PRACTICES

#### 28. TERMINATION

#### a) For Cause

ECOLOGY may terminate for cause this Agreement with a seven (7) calendar days prior written notification to the RECIPIENT, at the sole discretion of ECOLOGY, for failing to perform an Agreement requirement or for a material breach of any term or condition. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.

Failure to Commence Work. ECOLOGY reserves the right to terminate this Agreement if RECIPIENT fails to commence work on the project funded within four (4) months after the effective date of this Agreement, or by any date mutually agreed upon in writing for commencement of work, or the time period defined within the Scope of Work.

Non-Performance. The obligation of ECOLOGY to the RECIPIENT is contingent upon satisfactory performance by the RECIPIENT of all of its obligations under this Agreement. In the event the RECIPIENT unjustifiably fails, in the opinion of ECOLOGY, to perform any obligation required of it by this Agreement, ECOLOGY may refuse to pay any further funds, terminate in whole or in part this Agreement, and exercise any other rights under this Agreement.

Despite the above, the RECIPIENT shall not be relieved of any liability to ECOLOGY for damages sustained by ECOLOGY and the State of Washington because of any breach of this Agreement by the RECIPIENT. ECOLOGY may withhold payments for the purpose of setoff until such time as the exact amount of damages due ECOLOGY from the RECIPIENT is determined.

#### b) For Convenience

ECOLOGY may terminate for convenience this Agreement, in whole or in part, for any reason when it is the best interest of ECOLOGY, with a thirty (30) calendar days prior written notification to the RECIPIENT, except as noted below. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.

Non-Allocation of Funds. ECOLOGY's ability to make payments is contingent on availability of funding. In the event funding from state, federal or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date and prior to the completion or expiration date of this Agreement, ECOLOGY, at its sole discretion, may elect to terminate the Agreement, in whole or part, or renegotiate the Agreement, subject to new funding limitations or conditions. ECOLOGY may also elect to suspend performance of the Agreement until ECOLOGY determines the funding insufficiency is resolved. ECOLOGY may exercise any of these options with no notification or restrictions, although ECOLOGY will make a reasonable attempt to provide notice.

In the event of termination or suspension, ECOLOGY will reimburse eligible costs incurred by the RECIPIENT through the effective date of termination or suspension. Reimbursed costs must be agreed to by ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT. In no Template Version 12/10/2020

event shall ECOLOGY's reimbursement exceed ECOLOGY's total responsibility under the Agreement and any amendments. If payments have been discontinued by ECOLOGY due to unavailable funds, the RECIPIENT shall not be obligated to repay monies which had been paid to the RECIPIENT prior to such termination.

RECIPIENT's obligation to continue or complete the work described in this Agreement shall be contingent upon availability of funds by the RECIPIENT's governing body.

#### c) By Mutual Agreement

ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, at any time, by mutual written agreement.

### d) In Event of Termination

All finished or unfinished documents, data studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, photographs, reports or other materials prepared by the RECIPIENT under this Agreement, at the option of ECOLOGY, will become property of ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed on such documents and other materials.

Nothing contained herein shall preclude ECOLOGY from demanding repayment of all funds paid to the RECIPIENT in accordance with Recovery of Funds, identified herein.

### 29. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY

RECIPIENT shall ensure that in all subcontracts entered into by the RECIPIENT pursuant to this Agreement, the state of Washington is named as an express third party beneficiary of such subcontracts with full rights as such.

#### 30. WAIVER

Waiver of a default or breach of any provision of this Agreement is not a waiver of any subsequent default or breach, and will not be construed as a modification of the terms of this Agreement unless stated as such in writing by the authorized representative of ECOLOGY.

## GRANT SUB-AWARD AGREEMENT BETWEEN SNOHOMISH COUNTY AND WASHINGTON FARMLAND TRUST TO IMPLEMENT PORTIONS OF THE COMMUNITY FLOODPLAIN SOLUTIONS – PHASE 3 IMPLEMENTATION PROJECT

From Date of Execution to June 30, 2027

This Grant Sub-Award Agreement Between Snohomish County and Washington Farmland Trust to Implement Portions of the Community Floodplain Solutions – Phase 3 Implementation Project (this "Agreement"), is made and entered into by and between Snohomish County, a political subdivision of the State of Washington (the "County"), and PCC Farmland Trust dba Washington Farmland Trust (WFT), a Washington nonprofit corporation.

## RECITALS

- A. Snohomish County was awarded grant funds from the Washington State Department of Ecology ("Ecology") Floodplains by Design (FbD) program in Ecology Grant Agreement #SEAFBD-2325-SnCoCN-00046 (the "County Grant") to implement the Community Floodplain Solutions – Phase 3 Implementation Project.
- B. The County Grant identifies WFT as a sub-awardee and allows the County to enter into a sub-award agreement to pass through Grant funds in the amount of Two Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$275,000) to WFT to develop a pipeline of potential conservation easement acquisitions on farmland in the Snohomish Basin, with an option to acquire a conservation easement identified in the course of developing the pipeline.
- C. This pipeline of acquisitions will employ a reach-scale approach to help advance habitat restoration and flood risk reduction goals while promoting the viability of continued low-impact agricultural activities.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the respective agreements set forth below and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the County and WFT agree as follows:

## 1. PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT

Community Floodplain Solutions is a program that advances implementation of integrated floodplain management in the Snohomish Watershed. The purpose of this Agreement is to sub-award a portion of the County Grant and to contract with WFT to develop a pipeline of potential conservation easement acquisitions on farmland in the Snohomish Basin with an option to acquire a conservation easement identified in the course of developing the pipeline (the "Project"), as described in Appendix A (the "Scope of Services"), attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. The source of funds for this Agreement

is the County Grant, attached hereto as Appendix D and incorporated herein to the extent referenced by this Agreement.

## 2. DURATION OF AGREEMENT

The term of this Agreement is date of execution through June 30, 2027 (the "Term"), unless extended or terminated as provided herein. The County's obligations after December 31, 2024, are contingent upon local legislative appropriation of necessary funds in accordance with applicable laws and the Snohomish County Charter. In the event funding becomes unavailable for work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement, all work shall terminate in accordance with provisions of this Agreement upon the last day of funding.

## **3. SCOPE OF WORK**

- A. WFT shall furnish the necessary personnel, equipment, material, parts, and/or services and otherwise to do all the things necessary for or incidental to the performance of work set forth in Appendix A.
- B. WFT will not be required to perform work for the County in excess of work specified in Appendix A except by mutual agreement to a written amendment to this Agreement.

### 4. **PERFORMANCE**

WFT agrees to complete all work described in Appendix A and satisfy all aspects of this Agreement in a timely and professional manner. If at any time WFT cannot fulfill its responsibilities under this Agreement, WFT shall notify the County thereof in writing, together with an explanation of why said responsibilities cannot be fulfilled. Failure to perform shall be cause for the County to terminate this Agreement under Section 13.C. A decision by the County not to terminate after a failure by WFT to meet its responsibilities shall not constitute a waiver of the right to terminate based on such failed responsibility nor a forfeiture of the County's right to terminate in the future.

### 5. SUBCONTRACTING

- A. WFT shall not enter into any subcontracts for any of the work contemplated under this Agreement without the prior written approval of the County. In no event shall the existence of a subcontract operate to release or reduce the liability of WFT to the County for any breach in the performance of WFT duties. This clause does not include contracts of employment between WFT and personnel assigned to work under this Agreement.
- B. WFT is responsible for ensuring that all terms, conditions, assurances and certifications set forth in this Agreement and the County Grant are carried forward to any

subcontracts. WFT and its subcontractors agree not to release, divulge, publish, transfer, sell or otherwise make known to unauthorized persons personal information without the express written consent of the County or as provided by law.

C. If, at any time during the progress of the work, the County determines in its sole judgment that any subcontractor is incompetent, the County shall notify WFT, and WFT shall take immediate steps to terminate the subcontractor's involvement in the work. The rejection or approval by the County of any subcontractor or the termination of a subcontractor shall not relieve WFT of any of its responsibilities under this Agreement, nor be the basis for additional charges to the County.

## 6. ADMINISTRATION OF AGREEMENT

Each party to this Agreement shall designate an individual who may be designated by title or position to oversee and administer such party's participation in this Agreement. The parties' initial Administrators shall be the following individuals:

<u>County's Initial Administrator:</u> Surface Water Management Director Snohomish County Dept of Conservation and Natural Resources 3000 Rockefeller Ave, M/S 303 Everett, WA 98201 WFT's Initial Administrator: Conservation Director Washington Farmland Trust PO Box 2206 Seattle, WA 98111

Any notice required by a party to this Agreement shall be provided to the other party's Administrator.

## 7. MONITORING

The County shall have responsibility for monitoring the performance of WFT's work under this Agreement, consistent with the responsibilities set forth in Appendix A. Upon WFT's submittal of any report, invoice or other information required by the Scope of Work in Appendix A, the County may accept, reject, request modifications to, or request additions to the work, as the County deems appropriate.

## 8. COMPENSATION

A. The budget for work to be performed under this Agreement is \$275,000 as set forth in Appendix B, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. The County will compensate WFT for costs necessary to perform the work described in Appendix A. Requests for compensation by WFT shall include an invoice which itemizes WFT total work and personnel costs with an hourly rate apportioned amongst the various labor categories and tasks as detailed in Appendix B. The hourly rate for personnel

shall include salary and benefits only. The sum of work performed by WFT pursuant to this Agreement shall be invoiced as described in Section 9 of this Agreement.

- B. Compensation for work performed under this Agreement will not be made until the work is accepted by the County. The County shall have the right to withhold payment of all or any portion of an invoice provided under Section 9 below if the County has a reasonable good faith basis to believe that the work performed by WFT is not consistent with the Scope of Work defined in Appendix A.
- C. Budget deviations are allowed between budget tasks, meaning WFT may spend less money on one task and more on another, but under no circumstances may WFT exceed \$275,000 for the Term of the Agreement. Approval of the County project manager is required in advance of any budget deviation.
- D. The source of funds for this Agreement is the County Grant. Such funds shall be used only in fulfilling work specified in Appendix A. If a reduction of County Grant funds occurs, the County may unilaterally terminate all or part of this Agreement or may reduce the Scope of Work detailed in Appendix A.

## 9. INVOICING AND PAYMENT

A. WFT shall submit all invoices quarterly to:

Invoices shall be submitted within thirty (30) days of the end of the quarter, and within ten (10) days of the end of the last quarter of the year. Said invoices shall accurately and completely document all labor costs, materials costs, equipment costs and other reimbursable costs for services that meet the requirements of this Agreement and the County Grant. Upon expiration of this Agreement, any claim for payment not already made shall be submitted within 30 days after the expiration date or the end of the fiscal year, whichever is earlier.

B. The County will provide reimbursement within thirty (30) days of accepting work detailed in a written invoice, provided the invoice clearly identifies work performed and costs incurred, and that the work as specified in Appendix A has been accomplished.

## **10. AUDIT AND INSPECTION**

WFT shall maintain records pursuant to this Agreement in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and practices consistently applied. WFT's records shall be available for inspection and audit by the County, the State Auditor, federal auditors, and any persons duly authorized by the parties. WFT shall preserve and make such records available to said parties until expiration of six (6) years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.

## **11. ENTIRETY OF AGREEMENT**

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the County and WFT and supersedes all proposals, oral and written, and all other communication between the parties in relation to the subject matter of this Agreement. No other agreement exists between the County and WFT with regards to the instant subject matter except as expressly set forth in this instrument.

## **12. AGREEMENT ALTERATIONS AND AMENDMENTS**

This Agreement may be altered or amended by mutual agreement of both parties. Such alterations or amendments shall not be binding unless they are in writing and executed by personnel authorized to bind each of the parties.

### **13. TERMINATION**

- A. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days' prior written notification to the other party. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.
- B. In the event funding from state, federal, or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date of this Agreement and prior to normal completion, the County may, without advance notice and without liability for damages, terminate this Agreement by providing written notice to WFT. The termination shall be effective on the date specified in the termination notice. WFT shall continue to perform their obligations through the date of termination. The obligation of the County to make final payment shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- C. If for any cause, either party does not fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Agreement, or if either party violates any of these terms and conditions, the aggrieved party will give the other party written notice of such failure or violation. The responsible party will be given the opportunity to correct the violation or failure within fifteen (15) working days. If failure or violation is not corrected, this Agreement may be terminated immediately by written notice of the aggrieved party to the other.

## 14. **RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARTIES**

Each party to this Agreement hereby assumes responsibility for claims and/or damages to persons and/or property resulting from any act or omission on the part of itself, its employees, its officers, and its agents. Neither party assumes any responsibility to the other party for the consequences of any claim, act or omission of any person, agency, firm, or corporation not a party to this Agreement.

## **15. RIGHTS AND REMEDIES**

- A. In no event shall any payment by the County to WFT constitute a waiver by the County of any breach of covenant or any default that may exist on the part of WFT. The making of any such payment by the County while any such breach or default exists shall in no way impair or prejudice any of the County's rights and remedies, hereby expressly recognized, to recover payments or portions thereof, to which WFT was not entitled under this Agreement, where any payments were made by mistake, or to pursue any other remedy available to the County with respect to breach or default of this Agreement.
- B. Performance pursuant to this Agreement may, where appropriate, be offered in satisfaction of an obligation, duty, or responsibility conveyed to the County or WFT where allowed by law. The County, where legally authorized, may delegate any responsibility to WFT where contemplated under an Appendix or included in the scope of work.
- C. In the event the County terminates this Agreement pursuant to Section 13, the County will not be held liable for any monetary loss incurred by WFT due to termination.

### 16. HOLD HARMLESS

WFT agrees to protect, defend and hold harmless the County, its elected and appointed officials, employees and agents, from and against all claims, demands and causes of action of any kind or character, including any cost of defense and attorney's fees, arising out of any actions, errors or omissions of WFT, its officials, employees and agents in performing this Agreement except for those arising out of the negligence of the County.

## 17. RELATIONSHIP TO EXISTING LAWS AND VENUE

This Agreement is entered into pursuant to and under the authority granted by the laws of the State of Washington and any applicable federal laws. The provisions of this Agreement shall be construed to conform to those laws. In the event an inconsistency in the terms of this Agreement, or between its terms and any applicable statue or rule, the inconsistency shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order:

- 1. Applicable state and federal statues and rules;
- 2. Scope of Services (Appendix A); and
- 3. Any other provisions of the Agreement, including materials incorporated by reference.

The parties stipulate that any lawsuit regarding this Agreement must be brought in Snohomish County, Washington.

## **18.** NON-ASSIGNMENT

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, WFT shall not subcontract, assign or delegate any of the rights, duties or obligations covered by this Agreement without prior express written consent by the County.

### **19. SEVERABILITY**

If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby if such remainder would then continue to serve the purposes and objectives of the Agreement as determined by the County.

### **20. INSURANCE**

WFT shall carry for the duration of this Agreement, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by WFT, its agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors. Annual proof of insurance will be submitted to the County. Such insurance shall name the County as an additional insured and shall not be reduced or canceled without thirty days prior written notice to the County.

No Limitation. WFT's maintenance of insurance as required by the Agreement shall not be construed to limit the liability of WFT to the coverage provided by such insurance, or otherwise limit the County's recourse to any remedy available at law or in equity.

The WFT shall obtain insurance of the types described below:

- A. <u>Minimum Scope and Limits of Insurance</u>. The WFT shall maintain coverage at least as broad as, and with limits no less than:
  - (i) <u>General Liability:</u> \$ 1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage, and for those policies with aggregate limits, a \$ 2,000,000 aggregate limit. CG 00 01 current edition, including Products and Completed Operations;
  - (ii) <u>Automobile Liability:</u> \$ 1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage. CA 0001 current edition, Symbol 1;

(iii)Workers' Compensation: Statutory requirements of the state of residency; and

(iv)Employers' Liability or "Stop Gap" coverage: \$ 1,000,000.

- B. <u>Other Insurance Provisions and Requirements.</u> The insurance coverages required in this Agreement for all liability policies except Workers Compensation are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
  - (i) The County, its officers, officials, employees and agents are to be covered as additional insureds as respects liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of WFT in connection with this Agreement. Such coverage shall be primary and non-contributory insurance as respects the County, its officers, officials, employees and agents. Additional Insured Endorsement shall be included with the certificate of insurance, "CG 2026 11/85" or its equivalent is required. <u>The County</u> <u>requires this Endorsement to complete the Agreement.</u>
  - (ii) WFT's insurance coverage shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made and/or lawsuit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
  - (iii)Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to, and approved by, the County. The deductible and/or self-insured retention of the policies shall not limit or apply to WFT's liability to the County and shall be the sole responsibility of the WFT.
  - (iv)Coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits, until after forty-five (45) calendar days' prior written notice, has been given to the County.
  - (v) Insurance coverage is to be placed with insurers with a Bests' rating of no less than A: VIII, or, if not rated with Bests', with minimum surpluses the equivalent of Bests' surplus size VIII.

If at any time any of the foregoing policies fail to meet minimum requirements, WFT shall, upon notice to that effect from the County, promptly obtain a new policy, and shall submit the same to the County, with the appropriate certificates and endorsements, for approval.

## 21. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

WFT will perform the services under this Agreement as an independent contractor and not as an agent, employee, or servant of the County. The parties agree that WFT is not entitled to any benefits or rights enjoyed by employees of the County. WFT specifically has the right to direct and control WFT's own activities in providing the agreed services in accordance with the specifications set out in this Agreement. The County shall only have the right to ensure performance.

## 22. PUBLIC RECORDS ACT

This Agreement and all public records associated with this Agreement shall be available from the County for inspection and copying by the public where required by the Public Records Act, Chapter 42.56 RCW.

## 23. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY

The State of Washington is named as an express third-party beneficiary to this Agreement.

## Appendix A Scope of Services

This scope of work is intended to more specifically describe a portion of Task 3 of the County Grant. Task 3 consists of two parts: (1) acquisition of a minimum of 50 acres in the Tualco Valley area; and (2) developing a pipeline of conservation easements on farmland for future acquisition in strategic locations in the Snohomish Basin. This Agreement between the County and Washington Farmland Trust (WFT) concerns the second part, developing a pipeline of conservation easements on farmland for future acquisition. If there are any conflicts between this scope of work and the County Grant, the County Grant governs.

## **Purpose of the Project**

Snohomish County was awarded grant funds from the Washington State Department of Ecology ("Ecology") Floodplains by Design (FbD) program in Ecology Grant Agreement #SEAFBD-2325-SnCoCN-00046 (the "County Grant") to implement the Community Floodplain Solutions – Phase 3 Implementation Project.

As defined below, Washington Farmland Trust (WFT) staff and contracted representatives will undertake certain activities under the County Grant and will collaborate with project partners on these and other activities. Project partners include, but are not limited to, WFT, the Tulalip Tribes, Snohomish County, Snohomish Project Implementation Team (IT), County Agricultural Coordinator, Snohomish Conservation District (SCD), Sustainable Lands Strategy (SLS), Farmland Conservation Working Group, and area landowners.

The purpose of this project is to develop a pipeline of potential conservation easement acquisitions on farmland in the Snohomish Basin that can be purchased in future phases of the FbD program or with other funding sources. Acquisitions will employ a reach-scale approach to help advance habitat restoration and flood risk reduction goals while promoting the viability of continued low-impact agricultural activities.

## **Activities**

## **TASK 1 – Develop Tualco Valley Conservation Easement Pipeline**

- A. WFT will conduct landowner outreach to identify potential conservation easement acquisitions on farmland and secure landowner acknowledgements where feasible. This task shall be guided by the Lower Skykomish Floodplain Land Strategy that was completed in June 2021. This portion of Task 1 includes the following activities:
  - Outreach to and engagement with landowners, including, but not limited to, meetings, phone calls, and site visits, and working with landowners to negotiate conservation easement terms and conditions.
  - Conduct due diligence for potential conservation easement acquisitions, including, but not limited to, working with appraisers, review appraisers, surveyors, and title and escrow companies.
  - Where feasible, obtain acknowledgements from landowners to enter into formal acquisition process. Although not required, a goal of this Agreement is to obtain at least one executed landowner acknowledgement.

- B. WFT will administer Task 1 which includes, but is not limited to: maintenance of project records; submittal of requests for reimbursement and corresponding backup documentation; progress reports and recipient closeout report (including photos); compliance with applicable procurement, contracting, and professional services agreement requirements; application of, receipt of, and compliance with all required permits, licenses, easements, or property rights necessary for the project.
- C. WFT will manage Task 1 which includes, but is not limited to: conducting, coordinating, and scheduling project activities and assuring quality control. WFT will carry out this project in accordance with any completion dates outlined in this agreement.

## Task 1 – Expected Outcomes

- WFT will complete timely submittal of quarterly progress reports, billing, and recipient closeout report, and will properly maintain project documentation.
- WFT will develop a pipeline of potential conservation easement acquisitions that can be purchased in future phases of the FbD program or with other funding sources.
- WFT will obtain at least one executed landowner acknowledgement. This is a goal and not a requirement.
- WFT will attend meetings with the County every 1-2 months (at the County's discretion) to provide project updates, collaborate on project elements, and discuss any project issues.
- WFT will participate in the Snohomish Implementation Team (IT) meetings to further collaboration efforts with stakeholders across the Snohomish Basin.

## Task 1 – Deliverables by WFT to the County

- Signed landowner acknowledgement form for each potential easement acquisition. **DUE** to County: upon landowner signature.
- [County Grant Deliverable 3.4] Provide a Position Description for Washington Farmland Trust Conservation Manager. **DUE to County: 6/30/2024**
- [County Grant Deliverable 1.1] Task progress report and billing will be submitted quarterly to Snohomish County on the following schedule to allow for FbD Project Manager review, approval, and submittal to Ecology. Progress reports will communicate in memo style Task 1 activities completed and underway during the reporting quarter and issues encountered, activities anticipated for the next quarter, and lessons learned. This information will be included with County progress reporting to Ecology. **DUE to County: Quarterly through duration of Agreement (April 15th, July 15th, October 15th and January 7th)**
- Final written report that identifies secured landowner acknowledgements and briefly summarizes status of pipeline of potential future conservation easement acquisitions on farmland in the Snohomish Basin. **DUE to the County: 6/30/2027.**

## Task 1 – FbD Grant - \$75,000

## TASK 2 – Optional Tualco Valley Conservation Easement Acquisition

Task 2 is optional. WFT may proceed to acquire a conservation easement identified in the course of performing Task 1. The conservation easement may be purchased fully or in part with Agreement funds. If such an easement is acquired, WFT must provide the deliverables below.

## Task 2 – Deliverables by WFT to the County

- FOR ACQUISITIONS REQUIRING REIMBURSEMENT: WFT will submit a complete Acquisition Face Sheet for a Conservation Easement (Schedule D) and provide that document, plus all other required documents listed on the Face Sheet, to the County for uploading to EAGL prior to the reimbursement request of the acquisition. **DUE to County: upon completion of easement acquisition.**
- FOR ACQUISITIONS THROUGH ESCROW: If WFT requires funds to acquire an easement prior to closing, WFT can request an exception to Ecology's reimbursement policy by going through the escrow process. This process allows Ecology to pay WFT's grant funds in advance for the easement acquisition through a title/escrow company. Working through an established title company, WFT will provide the County and Ecology with a complete Acquisition Face Sheet for a Conservation Easement; Title company's "Wire Transfer Request" with routing number, and wiring instructions for specific property referenced; Settlement Statement; and Closing date of transaction. The County will work with WFT and Ecology to generate a Payment Request/Progress Report for the payment of grant funds to escrow. **DUE to County: at least three weeks prior to closing to allow sufficient time for Ecology and the Office of the State Treasurer to process documentation**.
- [Portion of County Grant Deliverable 3.5] Project area GIS shapefiles showing the location of acquisitions and easements. Save the shapefiles in a .zip file. **DUE to County: upon completion of easement acquisition.**

Task 2 – FbD Grant - \$200,000

### Appendix B Compensation

The budget for work to be performed under the Agreement is two hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$275,000). No match funding is required to be provided by WFT. The County shall have no obligation to pay any invoice from WFT that would cause the total payments made to WFT by the County under this Agreement to exceed two hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$275,000).

Budget deviations are allowed between budget tasks, meaning WFT may spend less money on one task and more on another, but under no circumstances may WFT exceed the total project cost. Approval of the County Project Manager is required in advance of any budget deviation.

### Project Short Description:

Community Floodplain Solutions (CFS) is a program that advances implementation of integrated floodplain management in the Snohomish Watershed. Snohomish County (RECIPIENT) will use CFS to increase ecological function, reduce impacts from flooding, and protect and enhance farmland productivity. Actions include design and construction of large-scale integrated floodplain projects, property acquisition, farmland conservation and efficiency enhancements, and project development.

### Project Long Description:

Phase 3 of CFS is focused on implementing the projects that were designed and permitted as part of Floodplains by Design (FbD) funding for Phases 1 and 2, but also continue the development of a pipeline for new projects in the Snohomish Watershed. It is a cooperative effort between many partners aimed at working collaboratively to: increase ecological function; reduce impact to local infrastructure from flooding and sediment transport; protect and enhance

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farmland productivity; and, improve water quality and recreational opportunities in the community.

This agreement advances 13 capital actions aimed at improving emergency access during flood events, reducing flood risk, restoring habitat for federal Endangered Species Act (ESA) listed salmon, and enhancing agricultural resiliency.

Three of the 13 capital projects (Shinglebolt, Thomas' Eddy, Swans Trail Slough) are being advanced to construction.
Two projects (Tualco Valley, Sultan Reach Agriculture Resiliency) are being advanced from scoping and land use agreements through the final design and stakeholder engagement process.

•Two projects (Agriculture Landowner BMPs, Agriculture Conservation Easements) are continuing ongoing outreach and engagement with landowners to advance BMPs and conservation easements.

•One project (Chinook Marsh) is leveraging significant local and regional investments to complete 30% designs for feasibility analyses for restoration and water line or energy transmission line relocation activities.

•Seven projects (Bear Creek, Invasive Species Control and Riparian Plantings, IFM Framework and Program Initiative, High Bridge Project, Farm 2 Project, Advanced Farm Technology for Food Resiliency, and the Upland Agriculture Conservation study) are poised for implementation.

•Two projects (Tualco Valley, Woods Creek/Al Borlin Park) are advancing to feasibility and design.

#### Overall Goal:

To advance Integrated Flood Management (IFM) with actions that support flood risk reduction, salmon recovery, and agricultural viability in the Snohomish Watershed.

• Continue to implement and advance projects funded by the 2019-2021 and 2021-2023 FbD grants for the Community Floodplain Solutions Program in the Snohomish Watershed, including advancing projects to construction, continuing projects in feasibility and design, implementing agricultural resilience projects, and protecting floodplain habitat in alignment with the Acquisition Strategy collaboratively developed.

• Develop a pipeline of integrated floodplain management projects in the Snohomish Watershed to accelerate implementation of priority habitat, flood reduction, and agricultural projects.

• Support the enabling conditions at the Snohomish Watershed scale by supporting a countywide IFM program and the Snohomish Integration Team, and enabling projects for new partners engaged through collaborative processes.

## Task Description:

This task is designed to permanently preserve habitat and agricultural land through property acquisition and easements, which is critical to preventing new development in areas known to be at risk from flooding, securing the land base for multi-benefit project implementation, and conserving agriculture. This task will be accomplished by performing the following actions:

A.The RECIPIENT shall acquire a minimum of 50 acres in the Tualco Valley area as well as develop a pipeline of farmland conservation easements in strategic locations in the watershed. Acquisitions shall be guided by the Lower Skykomish Floodplain Land Strategy that was completed in June 2021. The RECIPIENT will submit a full Acquisition Report for each fee-simple acquisition and conservation or agricultural easement purchased.

<sup>†</sup> When the estimated property value does not exceed \$25,000, and the acquisition is not complex, the RECIPIENT may be exempt from meeting appraisal and review appraisal standards. Such exemptions must be requested in writing and approved by the ECOLOGY Project Manager before the closing on the property. The RECIPIENT must follow the appraisal waiver standards in 44 C.F.R. § 24.102.

B. Escrow Process (if applicable): If the RECIPIENT requires funds to acquire a property prior to closing, the RECIPIENT can request an exception to ECOLOGY's reimbursement policy by going through the escrow process. This process allows ECOLOGY to pay a RECIPIENT's grant funds in advance for the property acquisition through the title / escrow company. #### Task Goal Statement:

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The goal of this task is to continue advancement in permanently protecting land for flood risk reduction, future restoration of natural river processes, water quality benefits, and habitat restoration; as well as permanently protecting agricultural land, and preventing development in high-risk floodplain areas. ## SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Floodplains by Design and Flood Control Assistance Account Program - Special Terms and Conditions

1. Local Decision: This grant is made in response to a request for financial assistance from the RECIPIENT to undertake flood damage prevention projects. The choice of floodplain management activities addressed by this grant is a local decision made solely by the RECIPIENT. The RECIPIENT is not acting as an agent of the State of Washington.

2. Lawsuits: Ecology shall not be responsible for any non-contractual damage or inverse condemnation claims resulting from the structures or works constructed, repaired, restored, maintained, or improved pursuant to this grant.

3. Indemnification, Hold Harmless and Duty to Defend

a. Ecology shall in no way be held responsible for payment of salaries, consultant's fees, and other costs related to the project described herein, except as provided in the scope of work.

b. This paragraph applies to negligence based claims only. All other claims are governed by paragraph 4 of this section (item 3.d). To the extent the constitution and laws of the State of Washington permit, RECIPIENT shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the State, its agencies, officers and employees, from all claims, suits or actions brought for any or all injuries to persons or property arising from, or as a consequence of, negligent acts or omissions related to the construction, restoration, repair, maintenance, improvement or operation of the structures or works for which this grant is provided. If the structures or works for which this grant is received are a portion of an integrated flood protection system, RECIPIENT agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the State of Washington, its agencies, employees, and officers against any and all liability arising out of the operation, maintenance, or repair of that integrated flood protection system; PROVIDED, however, that this provision is not intended to and shall not be construed as a waiver by RECIPIENT of any immunities conferred upon the RECIPIENT by RCW 86.12.037 nor is it intended to, and it shall not be construed to, confer any rights upon third parties.

c. The RECIPIENT will not be required to indemnify, defend, or save harmless the State, its agencies, officers or employees as provided in the preceding paragraph of this section if the claim, suit, or action for injuries, death, or damages is caused by the sole negligence of the State. Where such claims, suits, or actions result from the concurrent negligence of (a) the State, or the State's agents or employees and (b) the RECIPIENT or the RECIPIENT's agents or employees, the indemnity provisions

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provided in the preceding paragraphs of this section shall be valid and enforceable only to the extent of the RECIPIENT's negligence or the negligence of its agents and employees.

d. To the extent that the constitution and laws of the State of Washington permit, RECIPIENT shall indemnify and hold harmless the State of Washington, its agencies, employees, and officers against any and all liability arising out of the continued operation, maintenance, or repair of the structures or works constructed, restored, repaired, maintained or improved as a result of this grant. If the structures or works for which this grant is received are portions of an integrated flood protection system, RECIPIENT agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the State of Washington, its agencies, employees, and officers against any and all liability arising out of the operation, maintenance, or repair of that integrated flood protection system; PROVIDED, however, that the indemnity provisions of this paragraph are not intended to and shall not be construed as a waiver by Recipient of any immunities conferred upon the Recipient by RCW 86.12.037 nor are they intended to, and they shall not be construed to, confer any rights upon third parties. This agreement applies to all non-negligent, non-contractually based claims including, but not limited to, inverse condemnation, contribution, indemnification, trespass and/or nuisance.

4. Any development activity funded by this grant which occurs in the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)-mapped regulatory floodplain, also known as the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), may trigger the need for a floodplain development permit from the local agency with floodplain management jurisdiction. "Development" is defined at 44 CFR 59.1 as " ... any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations or storage of equipment or materials." Further, any activity funded by this grant may change the base flood elevations from physical changes affecting the floodplain. Communities are required by 44 CFR 65.3 to submit new data to FEMA in the event their actions affect the base flood elevation and the regulatory map (the SFHA).

5. ECOLOGY waives property acquisition report appraisal requirements for properties valued at \$25,000 or less. When the estimated property value does not exceed \$25,000, and the acquisition is not complex, the RECIPIENT may be exempt from meeting appraisal and review appraisal standards. Such exemptions must be requested in writing and approved by the ECOLOGY Project Manager before the closing on the property. The RECIPIENT must follow the appraisal waiver standards in 44 C.F.R. § 24.102.

6. Some RECIPIENTS are required to provide grant match. Match is made up of three different types of contributions: cash expenditures, in kind other, and in kind interlocal. Cash match expenditures are eligible costs paid by the RECIPIENT and are not reimbursed by ECOLOGY. In kind contributions are property or services that benefit a project and are contributed to the RECIPIENT by a third party without direct monetary compensation. In kind other is a type of contribution where the third party making the contribution is not a government entity. In kind interlocal is a type of contribution where both the grant RECIPIENT and the third party making the contribution are both government entities and have a signed Inter-local agreement between them.

7. RECIPIENTS are required to submit a copy of the original invoice in the Payment Request backup documentation if an invoice number is referenced on a primary or subcontractor invoice.

8. To be eligible for reimbursement, RECIPIENTS must provide documentation of how an expenditure is directly related to the project. Ecology will not reimburse any expenditure that is already included in the indirect rate. At Ecology's sole discretion, ECOLOGY may approve reimbursement for the percentage of an expenditure that is directly related to the project.

b) RECIPIENT shall complete all activities funded by this Agreement and be fully responsible for the proper management of all funds and resources made available under this Agreement.

c) RECIPIENT agrees to take complete responsibility for all actions taken under this Agreement, including ensuring all subgrantees and contractors comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. ECOLOGY reserves the right to request proof of compliance by subgrantees and contractors.

d) RECIPIENT's activities under this Agreement shall be subject to the review and approval by ECOLOGY for the extent and character of all work and services.

## 2. AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATIONS

This Agreement may be altered, amended, or waived only by a written amendment executed by both parties. No subsequent modification(s) or amendment(s) of this Agreement will be of any force or effect unless in writing and signed by authorized representatives of both parties. ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT may change their respective staff contacts and administrative information without the concurrence of either party.

## 3. ACCESSIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR COVERED TECHNOLOGY

The RECIPIENT must comply with the Washington State Office of the Chief Information Officer, OCIO Policy no. 188, Accessibility (https://ocio.wa.gov/policy/accessibility) as it relates to "covered technology." This requirement applies to all products supplied under the Agreement, providing equal access to information technology by individuals with disabilities, including and not limited to web sites/pages, web-based applications, software systems, video and audio content, and electronic documents intended for publishing on Ecology's public web site.

## 4. ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND CULTURAL RESOURCES

RECIPIENT shall take all reasonable action to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects to archaeological and historic archaeological sites, historic buildings/structures, traditional cultural places, sacred sites, or other cultural resources, hereby referred to as Cultural Resources.

c) If any Cultural Resources are found while conducting work under this Agreement, follow the protocol outlined in the project IDP.

• Immediately stop work and notify the ECOLOGY Program, who will notify the Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation at (360) 586-3065, any affected Tribe, and the local government.

d) If any human remains are found while conducting work under this Agreement, follow the protocol outlined in the project IDP.

• Immediately stop work and notify the local Law Enforcement Agency or Medical Examiner/Coroner's Office, the Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation at (360) 790-1633, and then the ECOLOGY Program.

e) Comply with RCW 27.53, RCW 27.44, and RCW 68.50.645, and all other applicable local, state, and federal laws protecting Cultural Resources and human remains.

## 5. ASSIGNMENT

No right or claim of the RECIPIENT arising under this Agreement shall be transferred or assigned by the RECIPIENT.

## 6. COMMUNICATION

RECIPIENT shall make every effort to maintain effective communications with the RECIPIENT's designees, ECOLOGY, all affected local, state, or federal jurisdictions, and any interested individuals or groups.

## 7. COMPENSATION

a) Any work performed prior to effective date of this Agreement will be at the sole expense and risk of the RECIPIENT. ECOLOGY must sign the Agreement before any payment requests can be submitted.

b) Payments will be made on a reimbursable basis for approved and completed work as specified in this Agreement.

c) RECIPIENT is responsible to determine if costs are eligible. Any questions regarding eligibility should be clarified with ECOLOGY prior to incurring costs. Costs that are conditionally eligible require approval by ECOLOGY prior to expenditure.d) RECIPIENT shall not invoice more than once per month unless agreed on by ECOLOGY.

e) ECOLOGY will not process payment requests without the proper reimbursement forms, Progress Report and supporting documentation. ECOLOGY will provide instructions for submitting payment requests.

f) ECOLOGY will pay the RECIPIENT thirty (30) days after receipt of a properly completed request for payment.

g) RECIPIENT will receive payment through Washington State's Office of Financial Management's Statewide Payee Desk.

h) ECOLOGY may, at its sole discretion, withhold payments claimed by the RECIPIENT if the RECIPIENT fails to satisfactorily comply with any term or condition of this Agreement.

i) Monies withheld by ECOLOGY may be paid to the RECIPIENT when the work described herein, or a portion thereof, has been completed if, at ECOLOGY's sole discretion, such payment is reasonable and approved according to this Agreement, as appropriate, or upon completion of an audit as specified herein.

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j) RECIPIENT must submit within thirty (30) days after the expiration date of this Agreement, all financial, performance, and other reports required by this Agreement. Failure to comply may result in delayed reimbursement.

## 8. COMPLIANCE WITH ALL LAWS

RECIPIENT agrees to comply fully with all applicable federal, state and local laws, orders, regulations, and permits related to this Agreement, including but not limited to:

a) RECIPIENT agrees to comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and policies of the United States and the State of Washington which affect wages and job safety.

b) RECIPIENT agrees to be bound by all applicable federal and state laws, regulations, and policies against discrimination.

c) RECIPIENT certifies full compliance with all applicable state industrial insurance requirements.

d) RECIPIENT agrees to secure and provide assurance to ECOLOGY that all the necessary approvals and permits required by authorities having jurisdiction over the project are obtained. RECIPIENT must include time in their project timeline for the permit and approval processes.

ECOLOGY shall have the right to immediately terminate for cause this Agreement as provided herein if the RECIPIENT fails to comply with above requirements.

If any provision of this Agreement violates any statute or rule of law of the state of Washington, it is considered modified to conform to that statute or rule of law.

## 9. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

RECIPIENT and ECOLOGY agree that any officer, member, agent, or employee, who exercises any function or responsibility in the review, approval, or carrying out of this Agreement, shall not have any personal or financial interest, direct or indirect, nor affect the interest of any corporation, partnership, or association in which he/she is a part, in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof.

## 10. CONTRACTING FOR GOODS AND SERVICES

RECIPIENT may contract to buy goods or services related to its performance under this Agreement. RECIPIENT shall award all contracts for construction, purchase of goods, equipment, services, and professional architectural and engineering services through a competitive process, if required by State law. RECIPIENT is required to follow procurement procedures that ensure legal, fair, and open competition.

RECIPIENT must have a standard procurement process or follow current state procurement procedures. RECIPIENT may be required to provide written certification that they have followed their standard procurement procedures and applicable state law in awarding contracts under this Agreement.

ECOLOGY reserves the right to inspect and request copies of all procurement documentation, and review procurement practices related to this Agreement. Any costs incurred as a result of procurement practices not in compliance with state procurement law or the RECIPIENT's normal procedures may be disallowed at ECOLOGY's sole discretion.

## 11. DISPUTES

When there is a dispute with regard to the extent and character of the work, or any other matter related to this Agreement the determination of ECOLOGY will govern, although the RECIPIENT shall have the right to appeal decisions as provided for below:

- a) RECIPIENT notifies the funding program of an appeal request.
- b) Appeal request must be in writing and state the disputed issue(s).
- c) RECIPIENT has the opportunity to be heard and offer evidence in support of its appeal.
- d) ECOLOGY reviews the RECIPIENT's appeal.
- e) ECOLOGY sends a written answer within ten (10) business days, unless more time is needed, after concluding the review. Template Version 12/10/2020

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The decision of ECOLOGY from an appeal will be final and conclusive, unless within thirty (30) days from the date of such decision, the RECIPIENT furnishes to the Director of ECOLOGY a written appeal. The decision of the Director or duly authorized representative will be final and conclusive.

The parties agree that this dispute process will precede any action in a judicial or quasi-judicial tribunal.

Appeals of the Director's decision will be brought in the Superior Court of Thurston County. Review of the Director's decision will not be taken to Environmental and Land Use Hearings Office.

Pending final decision of a dispute, the RECIPIENT agrees to proceed diligently with the performance of this Agreement and in accordance with the decision rendered.

Nothing in this Agreement will be construed to limit the parties' choice of another mutually acceptable method, in addition to the dispute resolution procedure outlined above.

## 12. ENVIRONMENTAL DATA STANDARDS

a) RECIPIENT shall prepare a Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP) for a project that collects or uses environmental measurement data. RECIPIENTS unsure about whether a QAPP is required for their project shall contact the ECOLOGY Program issuing the grant or loan. If a QAPP is required, the RECIPIENT shall:

• Use ECOLOGY's QAPP Template/Checklist provided by the ECOLOGY, unless ECOLOGY Quality Assurance (QA) officer or the Program QA coordinator instructs otherwise.

• Submit the QAPP to ECOLOGY for review and approval before the start of the work.

b) RECIPIENT shall submit environmental data that was collected on a project to ECOLOGY using the Environmental Information Management system (EIM), unless the ECOLOGY Program instructs otherwise. The RECIPIENT must confirm with ECOLOGY that complete and correct data was successfully loaded into EIM, find instructions at: http://www.ecy.wa.gov/eim.

c) RECIPIENT shall follow ECOLOGY's data standards when Geographic Information System (GIS) data is collected and processed. Guidelines for Creating and Accessing GIS Data are available at:

https://ecology.wa.gov/Research-Data/Data-resources/Geographic-Information-Systems-GIS/Standards. RECIPIENT, when requested by ECOLOGY, shall provide copies to ECOLOGY of all final GIS data layers, imagery, related tables, raw data collection files, map products, and all metadata and project documentation.

## 13. GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement will be governed by the laws of the State of Washington, and the venue of any action brought hereunder will be in the Superior Court of Thurston County.

## 14. INDEMNIFICATION

ECOLOGY will in no way be held responsible for payment of salaries, consultant's fees, and other costs related to the project described herein, except as provided in the Scope of Work.

To the extent that the Constitution and laws of the State of Washington permit, each party will indemnify and hold the other harmless from and against any liability for any or all injuries to persons or property arising from the negligent act or omission of that party or that party's agents or employees arising out of this Agreement.

## 15. INDEPENDENT STATUS

The employees, volunteers, or agents of each party who are engaged in the performance of this Agreement will continue to be employees, volunteers, or agents of that party and will not for any purpose be employees, volunteers, or agents of the other party.

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## 16. KICKBACKS

RECIPIENT is prohibited from inducing by any means any person employed or otherwise involved in this Agreement to give up any part of the compensation to which he/she is otherwise entitled to or receive any fee, commission, or gift in return for award of a subcontract hereunder.

## 17. MINORITY AND WOMEN'S BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (MWBE)

RECIPIENT is encouraged to solicit and recruit, to the extent possible, certified minority-owned (MBE) and women-owned (WBE) businesses in purchases and contracts initiated under this Agreement.

Contract awards or rejections cannot be made based on MWBE participation; however, the RECIPIENT is encouraged to take the following actions, when possible, in any procurement under this Agreement:

a) Include qualified minority and women's businesses on solicitation lists whenever they are potential sources of goods or services.

b) Divide the total requirements, when economically feasible, into smaller tasks or quantities, to permit maximum participation by qualified minority and women's businesses.

## 19. PRESENTATION AND PROMOTIONAL MATERIALS

ECOLOGY reserves the right to approve RECIPIENT's communication documents and materials related to the fulfillment of this Agreement:

a) If requested, RECIPIENT shall provide a draft copy to ECOLOGY for review and approval ten (10) business days prior to production and distribution.

b) RECIPIENT shall include time for ECOLOGY's review and approval process in their project timeline.

c) If requested, RECIPIENT shall provide ECOLOGY two (2) final copies and an electronic copy of any tangible products developed.

Copies include any printed materials, and all tangible products developed such as brochures, manuals, pamphlets, videos, audio tapes, CDs, curriculum, posters, media announcements, or gadgets with a message, such as a refrigerator magnet, and any online communications, such as web pages, blogs, and twitter campaigns. If it is not practical to provide a copy, then the RECIPIENT shall provide a description (photographs, drawings, printouts, etc.) that best represents the item.

Any communications intended for public distribution that uses ECOLOGY's logo shall comply with ECOLOGY's graphic requirements and any additional requirements specified in this Agreement. Before the use of ECOLOGY's logo contact ECOLOGY for guidelines.

RECIPIENT shall acknowledge in the communications that funding was provided by ECOLOGY.

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a) RECIPIENT must satisfactorily demonstrate the timely use of funds by submitting payment requests and progress reports to ECOLOGY. ECOLOGY reserves the right to amend or terminate this Agreement if the RECIPIENT does not document timely use of funds.

b) RECIPIENT must submit a progress report with each payment request. Payment requests will not be processed without a progress report. ECOLOGY will define the elements and frequency of progress reports.

c) RECIPIENT shall use ECOLOGY's provided progress report format.

d) Quarterly progress reports will cover the periods from January 1 through March 31, April 1 through June 30, July 1 through September 30, and October 1 through December 31. Reports shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after the end of the quarter being reported.

e) RECIPIENT must submit within thirty (30) days of the expiration date of the project, unless an extension has been approved by ECOLOGY, all financial, performance, and other reports required by the Agreement and funding program guidelines. RECIPIENT shall use the ECOLOGY provided closeout report format.

## 21. PROPERTY RIGHTS

a) Copyrights and Patents. When the RECIPIENT creates any copyrightable materials or invents any patentable property under this Agreement, the RECIPIENT may copyright or patent the same but ECOLOGY retains a royalty free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, recover, or otherwise use the material(s) or property, and to authorize others to use the same for federal, state, or local government purposes.

b) Publications. When the RECIPIENT or persons employed by the RECIPIENT use or publish ECOLOGY information; present papers, lectures, or seminars involving information supplied by ECOLOGY; or use logos, reports, maps, or other data in printed reports, signs, brochures, pamphlets, etc., appropriate credit shall be given to ECOLOGY.

c) Presentation and Promotional Materials. ECOLOGY shall have the right to use or reproduce any printed or graphic materials produced in fulfillment of this Agreement, in any manner ECOLOGY deems appropriate. ECOLOGY shall acknowledge the RECIPIENT as the sole copyright owner in every use or reproduction of the materials.

d) Tangible Property Rights. ECOLOGY's current edition of "Administrative Requirements for Recipients of Ecology Grants and Loans," shall control the use and disposition of all real and personal property purchased wholly or in part with funds furnished by ECOLOGY in the absence of state and federal statutes, regulations, or policies to the contrary, or upon specific instructions with respect thereto in this Agreement.

e) Personal Property Furnished by ECOLOGY. When ECOLOGY provides personal property directly to the RECIPIENT for use in performance of the project, it shall be returned to ECOLOGY prior to final payment by ECOLOGY. If said property is lost, stolen, or damaged while in the RECIPIENT's possession, then ECOLOGY shall be reimbursed in cash or by setoff by the RECIPIENT for the fair market value of such property.

f) Acquisition Projects. The following provisions shall apply if the project covered by this Agreement includes funds for the acquisition of land or facilities:

1. RECIPIENT shall establish that the cost is fair value and reasonable prior to disbursement of funds provided for in this Agreement.

2. RECIPIENT shall provide satisfactory evidence of title or ability to acquire title for each parcel prior to disbursement of funds provided by this Agreement. Such evidence may include title insurance policies, Torrens certificates, or abstracts, and attorney's opinions establishing that the land is free from any impediment, lien, or claim which would impair the uses intended by this Agreement.

g) Conversions. Regardless of the Agreement expiration date, the RECIPIENT shall not at any time convert any equipment, property, or facility acquired or developed under this Agreement to uses other than those for which assistance was originally approved without prior written approval of ECOLOGY. Such approval may be conditioned upon payment to ECOLOGY of that portion of the proceeds of the sale, lease, or other conversion or encumbrance which monies granted pursuant to this Agreement bear to the total acquisition, purchase, or construction costs of such property.

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## 22. RECORDS, AUDITS, AND INSPECTIONS

RECIPIENT shall maintain complete program and financial records relating to this Agreement, including any engineering documentation and field inspection reports of all construction work accomplished.

All records shall:

a) Be kept in a manner which provides an audit trail for all expenditures.

b) Be kept in a common file to facilitate audits and inspections.

c) Clearly indicate total receipts and expenditures related to this Agreement.

d) Be open for audit or inspection by ECOLOGY, or by any duly authorized audit representative of the State of Washington, for a period of at least three (3) years after the final grant payment or loan repayment, or any dispute resolution hereunder. RECIPIENT shall provide clarification and make necessary adjustments if any audits or inspections identify discrepancies in the records.

ECOLOGY reserves the right to audit, or have a designated third party audit, applicable records to ensure that the state has been properly invoiced. Any remedies and penalties allowed by law to recover monies determined owed will be enforced. Repetitive instances of incorrect invoicing or inadequate records may be considered cause for termination.

All work performed under this Agreement and any property and equipment purchased shall be made available to ECOLOGY and to any authorized state, federal or local representative for inspection at any time during the course of this Agreement and for at least three (3) years following grant or loan termination or dispute resolution hereunder.

RECIPIENT shall provide right of access to ECOLOGY, or any other authorized representative, at all reasonable times, in order to monitor and evaluate performance, compliance, and any other conditions under this Agreement.

## 23. RECOVERY OF FUNDS

The right of the RECIPIENT to retain monies received as reimbursement payments is contingent upon satisfactory performance of this Agreement and completion of the work described in the Scope of Work.

All payments to the RECIPIENT are subject to approval and audit by ECOLOGY, and any unauthorized expenditure(s) or unallowable cost charged to this Agreement shall be refunded to ECOLOGY by the RECIPIENT.

RECIPIENT shall refund to ECOLOGY the full amount of any erroneous payment or overpayment under this Agreement. RECIPIENT shall refund by check payable to ECOLOGY the amount of any such reduction of payments or repayments within thirty (30) days of a written notice. Interest will accrue at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per year from the time ECOLOGY demands repayment of funds.

Any property acquired under this Agreement, at the option of ECOLOGY, may become ECOLOGY's property and the RECIPIENT's liability to repay monies will be reduced by an amount reflecting the fair value of such property.

## 24. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement or any provision of any document incorporated by reference shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.

25. STATE ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY ACT (SEPA)

RECIPIENT must demonstrate to ECOLOGY's satisfaction that compliance with the requirements of the State Environmental Policy Act (Chapter 43.21C RCW and Chapter 197-11 WAC) have been or will be met. Any reimbursements are subject to this provision.

## 26. SUSPENSION

When in the best interest of ECOLOGY, ECOLOGY may at any time, and without cause, suspend this Agreement or any portion thereof for a temporary period by written notice from ECOLOGY to the RECIPIENT. RECIPIENT shall resume performance on the next business day following the suspension period unless another day is specified by ECOLOGY. Template Version 12/10/2020

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#### 27. SUSTAINABLE PRACTICES

In order to sustain Washington's natural resources and ecosystems, the RECIPIENT is fully encouraged to implement sustainable practices and to purchase environmentally preferable products under this Agreement.

a) Sustainable practices may include such activities as: use of clean energy, use of double-sided printing, hosting low impact meetings, and setting up recycling and composting programs.

b) Purchasing may include such items as: sustainably produced products and services, EPEAT registered computers and imaging equipment, independently certified green cleaning products, remanufactured toner cartridges, products with reduced packaging, office products that are refillable, rechargeable, and recyclable, 100% post-consumer recycled paper, and toxic free products.

#### 28. TERMINATION

#### a) For Cause

ECOLOGY may terminate for cause this Agreement with a seven (7) calendar days prior written notification to the RECIPIENT, at the sole discretion of ECOLOGY, for failing to perform an Agreement requirement or for a material breach of any term or condition. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.

Failure to Commence Work. ECOLOGY reserves the right to terminate this Agreement if RECIPIENT fails to commence work on the project funded within four (4) months after the effective date of this Agreement, or by any date mutually agreed upon in writing for commencement of work, or the time period defined within the Scope of Work.

Non-Performance. The obligation of ECOLOGY to the RECIPIENT is contingent upon satisfactory performance by the RECIPIENT of all of its obligations under this Agreement. In the event the RECIPIENT unjustifiably fails, in the opinion of ECOLOGY, to perform any obligation required of it by this Agreement, ECOLOGY may refuse to pay any further funds, terminate in whole or in part this Agreement, and exercise any other rights under this Agreement.

Despite the above, the RECIPIENT shall not be relieved of any liability to ECOLOGY for damages sustained by ECOLOGY and the State of Washington because of any breach of this Agreement by the RECIPIENT. ECOLOGY may withhold payments for the purpose of setoff until such time as the exact amount of damages due ECOLOGY from the RECIPIENT is determined.

#### b) For Convenience

ECOLOGY may terminate for convenience this Agreement, in whole or in part, for any reason when it is the best interest of ECOLOGY, with a thirty (30) calendar days prior written notification to the RECIPIENT, except as noted below. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.

Non-Allocation of Funds. ECOLOGY's ability to make payments is contingent on availability of funding. In the event funding from state, federal or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date and prior to the completion or expiration date of this Agreement, ECOLOGY, at its sole discretion, may elect to terminate the Agreement, in whole or part, or renegotiate the Agreement, subject to new funding limitations or conditions. ECOLOGY may also elect to suspend performance of the Agreement until ECOLOGY determines the funding insufficiency is resolved. ECOLOGY may exercise any of these options with no notification or restrictions, although ECOLOGY will make a reasonable attempt to provide notice.

In the event of termination or suspension, ECOLOGY will reimburse eligible costs incurred by the RECIPIENT through the effective date of termination or suspension. Reimbursed costs must be agreed to by ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT. In no Template Version 12/10/2020

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event shall ECOLOGY's reimbursement exceed ECOLOGY's total responsibility under the Agreement and any amendments. If payments have been discontinued by ECOLOGY due to unavailable funds, the RECIPIENT shall not be obligated to repay monies which had been paid to the RECIPIENT prior to such termination.

RECIPIENT's obligation to continue or complete the work described in this Agreement shall be contingent upon availability of funds by the RECIPIENT's governing body.

## c) By Mutual Agreement

ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, at any time, by mutual written agreement.

## d) In Event of Termination

All finished or unfinished documents, data studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, photographs, reports or other materials prepared by the RECIPIENT under this Agreement, at the option of ECOLOGY, will become property of ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed on such documents and other materials.

Nothing contained herein shall preclude ECOLOGY from demanding repayment of all funds paid to the RECIPIENT in accordance with Recovery of Funds, identified herein.

## 29. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY

RECIPIENT shall ensure that in all subcontracts entered into by the RECIPIENT pursuant to this Agreement, the state of Washington is named as an express third party beneficiary of such subcontracts with full rights as such.

#### 30. WAIVER

Waiver of a default or breach of any provision of this Agreement is not a waiver of any subsequent default or breach, and will not be construed as a modification of the terms of this Agreement unless stated as such in writing by the authorized representative of ECOLOGY.
