Subject: Agreement between Snohomish County and Ziply Fiber Northwest, LLC

for the Verlot Broadband Project.

**Scope:** The proposed contract with Ziply Fiber Northwest, LLC is to construct a

Fiber to the Premise (FttP) network, that will replace an existing low-capacity network with fiber optics capable of delivering a minimum of symmetrical 1/1 Gigabit per second. This project will provide service to one or more Community Anchor Institutions and to approximately 234

underserved addresses.

<u>Authority Granted:</u> Approves and authorizes the Executive to execute the agreement with Ziply Fiber Northwest, LLC for the Verlot Broadband Project, under SCC 3.04.140.

Background: Snohomish County secured Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery (CLFR) grant funds under the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The County created the Office of Recovery & Resilience (ORR) through the budget to aid in the distribution of the ARPA funds. The County Council appropriated \$10 million of the County's ARPA CLFR funds to expand broadband access through the county. On August 8, 2023, ORR presented <a href="the 2023 ARPA Broadband Spending Plan">the 2023 ARPA Broadband Spending Plan</a> to Council, which demonstrated the crucial need for county-wide, reliable high-speed internet. Of the \$10 million, \$8,200,000 was recommended for funding broadband access projects throughout Snohomish County. Snohomish County submitted five project applications to the Washington State Department of Commerce, Broadband Office (WSBO). All five projects were determined to be eligible for funding by WSBO but did not receive funding. The Verlot project was selected to be funded with the appropriated funds to provide service to one or more Community Anchor Institution.
