I live in Stanwood. Im a home owner, business owner and community volunteer. I'm a former public school teacher who now homeschools and I co-lead a low cost homeschool co-op. I'm married and have 4 wonderful teenagers.

I understand a tax increase for the county has been proposed.

This is so deflating.

We've had personal loses because of the Covid mandates. I closed my small business teaching children art lessons for several months because our family had Covid the entire month of August and students' parents have been weary of exposing kids to others during the holidays.

My husband works internationally with microsoft & Lenovo and they had to move an international dinner meeting to our county because King county wouldn't allow them to have unvaccinated people in the restaurants. I share this to highlight that there are multiple stressors in every aspect of life in our state and increased taxes will just add to that.

Our church just had a deacon resign yesterday. It boils down to the fact that his wife wants to go to a church that mandates masks. There is division everywhere, even in family units. We've had 2 elders leave our church because they had different opinions on how the mandates should be followed. Our church attendance is half of what it was. The programs we've always had to help people in the community are struggling. I share this to give you a glimpse of the health of organizations who typically care for the public, we need those who remain in good spirits to be able to persevere.

Please don't add to the stress of the holidays and the two year pandemic stress.

Haven't those who need housing had quite a lot of support? Weren't they given free rent for months at the expense/loss of their landlords? And people aren't working because they make more money by not working?

If there is a tax increase we will add this to our personal list of reasons to leave Washington due to the increased costs of living here and the stressors of the mandates.

We have 3 families who we are close to who will move to Texas between December and February because they are tired of the mandates, taxes, lack of opportunity to vote (advisory votes are a mean joke), etc.

We've been helping a mom whose husband died of Covid and running to the store for those in quarantine.

Our friend who is a father of 4 lost his job as a Seattle fireman because he wouldn't get vaccinated. They are in shock.

My teens are sad they can't have a Christmas swing dance again. The local hall won't allow it.

So much sadness and disappointment.

Please don't tax us more. Please have compassion on hard working families & business owners.

Dear Council Member Nehring,

My names is James Harrigan and I currently reside in the City of Monroe. I have been a long time resident of SnoCo and am a nurse who works at Providence Hospital in Everett. I have personal, professional, and volunteer experience related to housing instability and mental healthcare.

I appreciated your comments regarding the implementation of HB 1590 during today's council meeting. You emphasized two things: the fast tracking of this item and the bypassing of a vote of the people. I would encourage you to consider the following.

- 1) A vote of the people is not fully representative of all citizens of our county, particularly of those most affected by mental health challenges and housing instability. This includes those experiencing homelessness or acute mental health conditions, and really can't vote, but also many people who are facing housing instability or other circumstances that inhibit their ability to participate in the process, such as public hearings or even to vote (for example, those experiencing frequent address changes or who must work excessive numbers of hours to make ends meet, and do not engage the voting system). A traditional public ballot vote fails to incorporate these citizens in the process.
- 2) As far as the fast tracking of this item, it depends on your perspective. On one hand, it reduces the time for input and deliberation regarding this important topic. On the other hand, it acknowledges the urgency of the need we are facing, as well as the fact that affordable housing and behavior health support are needs that have been woefully underfunded for decades, which have now been exasperated by the pandemic. Fast tracking makes sense when trying to address an emergency.

I can understand if you disagree with the method of a sales tax to address affordable housing and mental healthcare, but I would

3) encourage you to be prepared to offer an alternative recommendation to quickly secure long-term funding for these two areas at the local or county level. The most significant barrier to progress in these areas is the lack of on-going funding.

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed 0.1% sales tax increase. Snohomish County residents are already paying some of the highest sales taxes in the country. With rapidly rising property values, we are also paying much more in property taxes than before. A tax increase, especially in light of the ongoing economic struggles, seems irresponsible and regressive. The County should appropriate funds it already has to address issues such as homelessness instead of imposing a higher tax rate on already financially strained citizens. The taxes imposed by government have driven some of our friends and family out of Snohomish County, some even out of Washington State. My mother, who has lived in the same home for nearly 30 years, will soon have a difficult time affording her exorbitant property taxes. I have heard the argument that this is such a miniscule tax that most families will hardly notice. We have seen so many miniscule tax increases that our pocketbooks are bleeding a death of a thousand papercuts. Snohomish County needs to prioritize the money it already has instead of taxing more.

In the Seattle Times article regarding this tax, it was compared to the similar King County tax. Why would Snohomish County base our model for reducing homelessness on something that King County has done? If King County was reducing homelessness at all I might understand following its lead. However, King County's solution has proven to be an abject failure. Perhaps Snohomish County should step up and lead in this regard instead of following a failing model set forth by our neighbors to the south.

My wife and I grew up in Snohomish County and we were extremely fortunate to have purchased our first home here, after months of searching and stress. The search for a home in Snohomish County was infuriating. We were frequently outbid, had houses sell before we had the chance to view them, and we had to pay a significant amount over asking price in order to purchase the home we live in now. My wife and I, along with many (if not most) of the buyers we spoke with were moving from King County specifically because the taxes are so high there. King County and the cities within are taxing exorbitantly, spending irresponsibly, and problems like homelessness and crimes related to homeless encampments are getting continually worse. I work for a company which has employees all over the country. Recently on a company forum I saw somebody mention he was thinking of moving to the Seattle area with his family and was looking for recommendations on areas to look at. Not one person of this diverse workgroup recommended King County. Some recommended avoiding Snohomish

County because it is turning into the next King County, with high and increasing taxes, among other issues.

I am also concerned by the speed at which this proposed tax is working through the system. I did not know about it until today, and I understand it is to be voted on very soon. I am taking time out of a busy schedule to write this email. Unfortunately, most people do not have time to express opposition, or even support, for something like this. There should be an adequate window for citizens to be heard so we may be properly represented in all matters. If that cannot be achieved, perhaps the issue should be voted on by the citizens.

In conclusion, I admire the Council's desire to help those in need and reduce homelessness in Snohomish County. Dear Council Member Wright,

I read the article posted on Facebook on My Edmonds News about the proposed sales tax increase. I live in Lynnwood. I am writing to you because it sounds like you are the originator of this idea. George Hurst made a good point in this article about the previous sales tax increase for mental health and addiction issues that was instituted in 2009. This is the quote from that article: "In 2009, the county approved a 0.1% chemical dependency and mental health sales tax that Hurst estimated has generated more than \$150 million but the city hasn't benefited much from. Between 2017-21, the city received just over \$37,000 from the tax for the Lynnwood Senior Center and First Responder Flex Funds. "They (the county) haven't built detox beds, they haven't built mental health facilities," he said. "So, my concern is what are they going to do with this money that is supposedly for housing?"

There doesn't seem to be any accountability to the people for how our sales tax dollars and other tax dollars are being spent. I moved here in 2017 and it's been a constant struggle to find detailed information on how my city, county, and state tax dollars are being used. The amount of the sales tax might sound like a very small percentage, but it's just one more tax on top of all the other new taxes and increased property taxes. I remember a sales tax increase we voted on to replace the emergency radio equipment that police and fire departments use. I voted yes at the time but thought to myself, how in the world did the county get in this situation where they don't have the money in the budget to update this critical system? What a lack of planning! And I still feel this way. With the increased costs of the pandemic, the council should be looking for ways to cut out every unnecessary expense from the county budget. And the Council should be looking at critical capital infrastructure expenses and ensuring you are planning for those future needs and setting aside funding for them. Then, when you see a need for a new program that you can't fund any other way, then you do your research, plan it all out with detailed cost information and revenue forecasts and present it to the voters. People in Snohomish County do care about affordable housing, but they also feel like they have had way too many tax increases in the past few years!

What you should NOT do is try to sneak in a sales tax increase for "affordable housing" when you have not spelled out exactly how that money would be used and given the voters a chance to say whether that's a program they actually want initiated. Then on any sales tax increase that is actually voted in, the council should ensure the voters can see how those tax dollars are being spent on an ongoing basis. And make it easy for us to see this information online, in email newsletters we can sign up for (like the City of Lynnwood does), etc. It's extremely frustrating to not be able to understand where your tax dollars are actually being spent.

Dear Councilmembers,

I have heard various numbers as to how much Ordinance 21-098 would cost the average taxpayer in Snohomish County.

Here are some numbers you may find useful:

The median household income in Snohomish County is \$89,260. On average, 80.4% (\$71,765) is spent on items in five categories: Housing, transportation, personal insurance and pensions, food and healthcare. Very little, if any of this is subject to sales tax. This leaves the median income household with \$17,495 per year in disposable income. If all of that was used for taxable purchases, the 0.001 increase would cost the average taxpayer \$17.50 per year.

Using the same data and calculations, an extremely low income household (<30%AMI) would spend an additional \$5.25 per year. A very high income household (\$250,000 and above) would spend an additional \$49 per year.

I've attached a spreadsheet with the calculations and links to the data sources, US Census Bureau and Bureau of Labor Statistics.

I've tried to be as fair and as accurate as possible with the numbers. Like all data, there are exceptions and variations. For example, most personal medical devices are not subject to sales tax but some are. It is impossible to ferret out the exact percentage of each so they are all included in the Healthcare category. Since the vast majority of healthcare spending is not subject to sales tax I have assumed that the impact of including that amount that is subject to sales tax is diminimus. Internet service is not subject to sales tax but it falls into the Entertainment category which by and large is taxable. Again, there is no way to separate out just internet service so that remains as a taxable expense for the purposes of these calculations.

Dear Snohomish County Council Members,

I am concerned that there seems to be a question about the rationale for this ordinance. You have been elected to represent the best interests of *ALL* Snohomish County residents--not just those who contributed financially to your campaign; or who live in a house they bought more than thirty years ago; or who have been blessed to have no physical or mental impairments that restrict one or more of life's major activities. In fact, it is especially important that you consider those of our neighbors who may not be able to advocate for themselves! The proceeds of this tax are expected to add \$23M to our housing construction coffers per year! That goes a long way toward solving our housing problems!

This small added sales tax, known as 1590, will give us a local source of funding for additional housing. This is vitally important when SnoCo housing nonprofits compete for state and federal funds; applicants from jurisdictions with locally-sourced funds are able to leverage those funds for more construction/maintenance/operation awards. "Skin in the Game" is a traditional evaluation metric when comparing the worthiness of side-by-side applications, so many of our proposed housing developments have to wait for two or more funding cycles to be able to move forward. These delays only increase the projected costs, which in turn can reduce the proposed scale. I am eager to see Snohomish County begin to win some of the competitive awards, so that we can build more housing faster and for less cost! Each local housing \$1 is typically leveraged for an additional \$10 in funding—why would we leave that kind of money on the table?

More and more lately, I am hearing tales of talented community members moving to other counties and even states in order to be able to live and work in the same community. A husband and wife ministry team moved this summer from Edmonds to Tacoma to be able to buy a home near their church; the son and family of a local housing employee moved to Idaho to be able to buy a home near his job; a family with a teenager in high school is now bunked in with a friend in Federal Way because their rent went up drastically at the end of the eviction moratorium, but their income was the same; school districts are having difficulty getting and keeping sufficient staff to support the teachers and students because they can't find adequate housing that is affordable. Medical workers often work multiple jobs to cover their housing costs. Rents in SnoCo now require more than \$100,000 in annual income to fit the standard definition of affordable-- less than one-third of income on housing; ownership is even higher. None of us want to live in a community where all the young people have to leave, and where our faith communities, hospitals and schools have job postings go unfilled because the cost of housing is prohibitive.

Please, do the job you said you wanted to do, and vote to support a source of local funding for housing, so that more of our neighbors, especially those with disabilities, will have access to housing that is safe and affordable. It is no longer in our collective best interests to not implement this local funding source for more housing! Sales tax is regressive, but the actual cost of this tax to low income families will be less than \$1 per month, and nothing is more regressive than homelessness. Please Vote YES on SnoCo Ordinance #21-098!!

Greetings Snohomish County Council,

I am writing in strong support of the county's 0.1% Sales Tax proposal authorized by House Bill 1590 to fund more emergency shelter and permanent affordable housing. It is a rare opportunity to be able to usher in new resources that respond to our homelessness crisis, and we should pursue every opportunity.

The Low Income Housing Institute is one of the Pacific Northwest's largest non-profit affordable housing providers with over 3,000 low-income housing units, and we are eager to respond to the housing needs of Snohomish County. We currently own and operate multiple properties in the area, such as the Meadowdale Apartments in Lynnwood and Cedarwood II Apartments in Lake Stevens. These properties prioritize very low income and formerly homeless households. We need more properties like this to get homeless people inside.

The sales tax rate across Snohomish County currently ranges from 7.8-10.5%; this 0.1% proposal will have a minor fiscal impact but yield enormous results in addressing homelessnes in our community.

The last annual Point-in-Time count in Snohomish County showed that 1,132 people were homeless, and it is likely an undercount. This ordinance is estimated to bring in \$23.2 million per year and would create 100 units of emergency bridge and permanent supportive housing and 300 affordable housing units in the first five years. The funding would be allocated in the following way:

- 82% for acquisition, rehabilitation, construction, operation, and maintenance of newly acquired and created affordable, emergency bridge, and permanent supportive housing.
- 18% on delivery of services and the creation of a local reserve fund for the construction of behavioral health facilities.

LIHI is ready to step up to the challenge to build more affordable housing in order to address our homelessness crisis; but we must have the resources available to do so. Please pass this proposal, the only permanent cure to homelessness is housing.

Dear Council Members:

One penny; that is all the additional tax you will pay on a \$10 purchase in Snohomish County if you vote to impose a sales tax. This 1/10th of 1% tax would fund affordable housing, a problem that has grown worse and worse over the last decade. As housing costs have risen, more and more of our friends, neighbors, sons, and daughters, have struggled with the ever increasing costs of living here. Just today, I received an email from an elderly gentleman who lives on a fixed income of \$983 a month in Social Security and \$194 in food stamps, who cannot find a place to live he can afford. No one could. All I could do was refer him to our wait list.

More than anything else, the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the stark income inequality within the region and throughout our country. A McKinsey Institute study estimated that 75% of all COVID-19 related job losses were for people earning \$40,000 a year or less. These were already the people that struggled the most. The irony is that during the pandemic many low-wage workers, such as daycare, grocery, and agriculture workers, were deemed essential and were forced to work in unsafe conditions just to make rent. All while struggling to live in the communities they put their health and safety on the line to serve.

Even before the pandemic, many households struggled to afford rent, and it was not for lack of trying. The unemployment rate in the County in 2019 was approximately 2.5%. That is beyond full employment, with just too many people working for low wages. It is a math problem. The average rent for a two-bedroom apartment in the County exceeds \$1,800. To afford that, a low-wage household is spending over 50% of their take home pay on rent and making difficult choices between basic needs. We have an acute emergency, amplified by COVID-19: thousands of Snohomish County residents, working full-time, are in extreme economic distress.

The solution is simple, and it is not a question of whether you like paying a tax. It is a question of morality; it is simply the right thing to do. Those of us who have weathered the pandemic, who still have money to spend, should pay an extra penny, 10 cents, or 1 dollar in additional tax. This amount is inconsequential to our daily lives, yet cumulatively, so impactful and meaningful to others who struggle for stability in their living situations.

You have heard people saying, "sales taxes are so regressive", or "now is not the time to raise taxes" and businesses will claim "my customers can't afford this". Hogwash! No one who ever spent \$100 changed their mind because of an extra 10 cents in sales tax! Furthermore, businesses don't pay this, they update their point-of-sale systems for a very minor increase, collect the money, and remit it to the State. And what is more regressive than homelessness?

The federal government approved trillions of dollars in stimulus funding to help get us through the immediate crisis. How many County residents and businesses received stimulus money and were grateful? How can we now refuse to do our part to help our friends and neighbors? How can we expect the federal government to do more if locally we refuse to do anything?

Snohomish County issued the Housing Affordability Regional Taskforce (HART) report in January of 2020, that highlighted the all too familiar reasons for the housing affordability crisis with the commitment to study funding mechanisms in the future. Well, here it is.

This County is the 3^{rd} most populous in the State. We must start acting like it and take a meaningful role in contributing to solving our part of the regional problems. The Council should unanimously support the vote to impose this $1/10^{th}$ of 1% tax. We needed local investment in housing before COVID-19, we need it now, and we cannot wait any longer.

We've seen a dramatic increase in the number of households struggling to make ends meet, as well as in the number of people who have lost the roof over their head and are now without safe and stable housing.

Federal and state funded assistance has helped to provide short-term housing for some of these individuals, but what we really need is a more holistic and longer-term plan to provide a broader range of options to address our housing challenges. This includes emergency shelter, bridge housing, affordable housing, and a continuum of care to help those struggling with mental or behavioral health issues, or substance use disorder.

County Council's approval of this proposal would generate the revenue desperately needed to create more housing and shelter options, as well as expand support services to help those in need.

I wholeheartedly support this proposal and urge you to authorize this request.

The Alliance for Housing Affordability (AHA), a collaboration of local municipal governments, was formed in 2013 to address the issue of our housing affordability crisis in Snohomish County. One of the major needs in housing affordability is the commitment of local policy and funding. RCW 82.14.530, amended by HB1590 in the 2020 Legislative Session, provides the opportunity for legislative bodies like the Snohomish County Council to address the need for local funding for affordable housing.

Today, the AHA Joint Board writes to encourage Council action on this issue as an important and needed step to address the County's growing housing affordability crisis.

Data that shows the need for affordable housing is exhaustive and widely available, notably in the Snohomish County HART report. That data clearly and strongly speaks to the need for increased affordability across the socio-economic spectrum. Instead of retreading that ground, AHA would like to draw attention to three perspectives that we believe makes clear the need to support adoption of a 0.1% sales tax for affordable housing.

Housing Affordability Deserves a Response Like Any Disaster

The first perspective is best framed through this question: "What response would we expect if the Cascadia earthquake happened tomorrow and thousands of Snohomish County residents were suddenly in need of assistance?" One would hope that funding from all levels of government- local, state, and federal - would flow to the region to assist those suddenly displaced by the disaster. This need would be both immediate (emergency shelter) and long-term (as the region's economy would suffer for years after). Wouldn't it be appropriate to raise funds from the public to render assistance to those in need in that case? We hope the answer to that question is, "It would be appropriate, and expected, for that aid to be rendered."

If help would be appropriate in event of an earthquake, what do we say to the thousands of households struggling despite their 40+ hours of work a week? The thousands who are currently homeless, or soon to be made so by COVID-19's economic impacts? A common refrain, heard for many years, is to "Pull yourself up by your bootstraps," or simply "Go live somewhere else." Would we say that to residents displaced by an earthquake? Is this difference in response because of the slow-motion nature of the current housing crisis compared to the immediacy of an earthquake? Is it because we simply view the growing number of our affected friends, neighbors, and coworkers as undeserving? Or is it something else? This question bears discussion.

If Not Now, When?

Setting disaster aside, consider one common reason to reject tax measures: "Now is not the time for a tax increase." If not now, when? When would be the appropriate time for the County Council to use its councilmanic authority to raise taxes? Is the answer, "When times are better, and the economy is stronger"? If that is the case, we would like to encourage the County Council to consider the 8% 'banking' of councilmanic property taxes (last done in Ordinance No. 19-065). There were surely good

reasons at the time to bank that taxing authority despite a strong economy, just as there are good arguments today. Putting it all together, it appears that no time will feel *right* to raise taxes, and in that case, then today is as good as any other time to adopt this measure.

Using the Tools We Have

Third and finally, it is indeed unfortunate that a sales tax is the option that we must take in support of funding affordable housing creation. Property taxes are the only other funding mechanism of significance, and as discussed above, have been left unused for eight years with no sign of change in the future. In the case of a sales tax, it is notable that as we stood on the precipice of a deep economic recession in 2008 we still passed the 0.1% Chemical Dependency and Mental Health (CDMH) sales tax. We can look back to see what negative impacts were experienced in the wake of its passage. Notably, CDMH has done great work in assisting providers in the work they do to serve Snohomish County residents. Further, like CDMH, this measure for affordable housing would assist in making Snohomish County more competitive in applications for state and federal dollars, which often require or incentivize local funding commitments. These state and local funds are often granted in much larger values than the local funding commitment, so in addition to making Snohomish County more competitive, this measure would leverage funds at a greater than 1:1 ratio from state and federal sources.

While the COVID-19 pandemic creates challenging circumstances to adoption of this tax, it also provides a greater imperative to do so. A year from now, whether the pandemic itself has been overcome or not, its impact on the economy and thus the housing market will surely still be with us. At that time and beyond, the lack of a source of local funding to support those affected will be sorely felt, and even more urgently needed.

Looking ahead to that future, AHA's members strongly urge the County Council to make it clear that those who work hard, but still make below 60% of the County's median income, deserve as much support as would be expected in the wake of any other disaster. It is understood that taxation is difficult, uniquely so during this pandemic. However, we often do not consider that the impacts of failing to adequately address the shortage of housing will have outsized financial impacts that we will all ultimately pay. Those costs will manifest themselves in the form of charity hospital care, emergency treatment and intervention, law enforcement and incarceration, lowered educational attainment, and more. Worse yet, a lack of action on this will contribute to an ever-thinning social fabric that holds us together in common purpose of decency to one another and the dream of a prosperous future for all. AHA's mission is to keep that dream alive for Snohomish County residents of today and tomorrow, and we thank you for continued support of that work.

This letter was approved by a vote of 8-1, with 4 abstentions and 2 absent, by the AHA Joint Board on October 28, 2020.

Dear Council Members,

We are reaching out regarding the Snohomish County Ordinance 21-098, the sales tax for affordable housing and behavioral health, also referred as 1590. We believe that not approving this bill will significantly damage our community. Please consider the following:

Snohomish County is experiencing an acute shortage of decent, safe, and sanitary dwellings for families of lower income. We are continually losing affordable units through sales and demolition, forcing families with children, seniors, and people with disabilities to overcrowded, substandard housing, temporary solutions, or pushing them to the streets.

The Coronavirus pandemic has brought this already risky situation to the level of deep crisis. Financial hardship has caused thousands of households to seek rental assistance in order to avoid homelessness. Our rental assistance program has served over 15,000 households distributing over \$50M of federal and state funding to prevent homelessness. These funds are temporary and these services will unfortunately be discontinued to vulnerable Snohomish County residents who will be without support and viable solutions to stay housed or obtain new housing. The stress creates a mental health crisis for many low-income families with children, veterans, elderly, and other disadvantaged community members who are already experiencing depression and anxiety.

In our county, a two-bedroom apartment costs nearly \$2,000 per month to rent and to afford it a household needs a total annual income of \$83,960. There are more than 20,000 households in Snohomish County with annual incomes of \$34,500 or less that are spending more than 50% of that income just on housing alone. We desperately need more affordable housing to prevent and decrease homelessness.

The need for housing stabilization in our community is much larger than the currently available resources. This tax will raise about \$20M per year to invest in affordable housing and behavioral health services and will double the current rate of affordable housing produced in Snohomish County.

Stable, affordable housing allows individuals to shift their focus to employment opportunities and income progression; children are able to perform better in school, community members achieve better health outcomes, and it also increases safety in our communities.

Please be part of the solution to protect and support our community members and move forward with 1590 (Ordinance 21-098).

We are writing to urge you to help meet the extraordinary housing needs of our county's most vulnerable residents by approving the 1/10th of 1% sales tax increase enabled by State Legislative action last year and improved upon by Rep. Cindy Ryu's HB 1070 this year. This very modest tax increase will provide an ongoing, locally controlled fund to meet various housing and mental health needs.

This revenue tool will help acquire land or existing buildings and construct affordable housing and provide housing-related services for people whose income is 60% or less of the county median income. It will build on the investments made with Covid related relief funding flowing into Snohomish County, but it is time limited.

This fund will conservatively raise \$20-23 million annually in Snohomish County and serve as a local "housing trust fund" to help meet our housing and support services needs now and into the future. Revenues will conservatively leverage at least five times other funds for affordable housing construction and acquisition.

As fellow elected officials, we know that raising taxes is never an easy action. However, we believe that our affordable housing and homeless challenges are a strong reason for this action. We, the undersigned, have concerns regarding the proposed councilmanic increase to the countywide sales and use tax for affordable housing. While we share the desire to address affordable housing issues in our county, the proposed process minimizes public input and will erode trust with our shared constituents.

A sales tax to produce affordable housing is counterintuitive and will only further burden residents and small businesses throughout Snohomish County. Sales tax is one of the most regressive forms of taxation, creating a disproportionate burden on low-income families who are already impacted by high inflation and on businesses struggling to recover from the economic consequences of the pandemic.

In addition to the merit of the policy proposal itself, we have significant concerns with the process being used to implement this tax increase. Historically, a proposal like this would need to go to the voters for their consideration. While the legislature allowed local governments to impose this sales tax increase using councilmanic authority, we feel that the appropriate and transparent course of action must involve a vote of the people.

We encourage the County Council to place this issue on the ballot and allow the voters of Snohomish County to determine whether this tax increase and proposed spending has merit.

Please do not impose this additional tax burden on Snohomish County residents without their input through a public process and vote.

My name is Maddy Metzger-Utt and I am one of the Board members for the Housing Authority of Snohomish County (HASCO). I am writing to urge you to support the increase of $1/10^{th}$ of 1% tax to help fund affordable housing in the County.

As someone who was born and raised in Everett, I have seen how drastically housing prices have increased in the last ten years. The <u>average</u> rent for a two-bedroom apartment in the County exceeds \$1,800 (that is more than the mortgage I paid on my custom-built house). To afford that, a low-wage household is spending over 50% of their take home pay on rent and making difficult choices between food, transportation, and medical expenses. Most people in these circumstances will find it difficult to save for unexpected financial shocks, which means they are one or two paychecks away from homelessness.

With over 100,000 families in the county struggling with housing costs, and street homelessness becoming ever more pervasive, it is beyond time to act. Ten cents, one dime; is all the additional sales tax you would pay on a \$100 purchase in Snohomish County if the County Council votes to impose a sales tax, authorized by the State Legislature in House Bill 1590. As housing costs have risen, more and more of our friends, neighbors, sons, and daughters, struggle with the ever-increasing costs of living here.

More than anything else, the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the stark income inequality within the region and throughout our country. A McKinsey Institute study estimated that 75% of all COVID-19 related job losses were for people earning \$40,000 a year or less. These are the very same people that already struggle the most in our economy. This is not surprising since most of the jobs eliminated were in the hospitality, retail, and service sectors, where wages are traditionally lower. The irony is that during the pandemic many other low-wage jobs, such as daycare workers, food service workers and agriculture processors, were considered essential and effectively forced to work in unsafe conditions just to make rent. All while continuing to struggle to live in the communities, they literally put their health and safety on the line to serve.

Please vote to increase the sales tax by $1/10^{th}$ of 1% tax to help fund affordable housing in the County.

I often work in the Carnegie building, and see person after person who is unhoused and in need of services. The need for affordable housing in our County is great, and the problem will not solve itself.

Fair Market Rent for a two-bedroom apartment in Snohomish County is \$2,099. My household would need a total annual income of \$83,960 (\$40.37hr) to afford this apartment. Even with my amazing job, that I am so thankful for, I cannot afford a place of my own at today's prices. I am a single mother, and have to rely on the help of my family to stay housed and to keep me and my children off of the streets. I LONG for a place of my own for me and my children. I work HARD to provide for my family, and it is a sad reality that we cannot afford a home of our own. I work HARD to better my community, and help lift others out of the abject poverty that runs rampant in our streets. Even with all of my hard work, and dedication to providing my children a good and stable life, I cannot afford the most basic of necessities, a home to call our own.

When people have a home, opportunity abounds. Children do better in school. Parents are able to get and keep better jobs, making higher wages and securing brighter futures for their families. Medical and mental health outcomes are better, and the strain on our emergency systems is lightened, because people have the time, security, and resources to access medical maintenance and preventive care. The cost to house people is by far less expensive than the cost to hospitalize or jail them, and the benefits reach deep into our communities.

Aside from the moralistic and humanistic benefits, there are expansive economic benefits to passing this ordinance as well. Each \$1 of local funding typically leverages \$10 of additional funding. That means that this sales tax, which will raise approximately \$23M per year, will translate into a potential \$230M investment into our people and our communities in Snohomish County. Building affordable housing also creates high-wage construction jobs right here in our own backyard.

I am firstly, a parent of a now 49 year old son with mental health issues that has taken our family a lifetime of keeping him stable and keeping him housed. Doctors have been amazed he is even alive and he is succeeding so well and is so well liked at Bridgeways Enterprises. The myriads of issues from Day 12 when he was adopted from a prominent adoption agency in TX would fill several volumes! And timely, we have spent the last month searching affordable housing after he had a wonderful duplex for 13 years where the elderly couple knew he was in supported employment trying to better himself so charged him only \$800/month. My son became their animal keeper, house sitter, etc. until the wife passed away and Ray knew he needed more help than he could provide himself. He sold the wonderful property and new commercial owners raised his rent to \$2000. Fortunately, a Bridgeways Enterprises social worker worked with him for weeks visiting every apt. complex in Everett in a reputable area. Living with his mental health issues, a busy, noisy, complex is NOT for him.

But not being able to get out into his yard, having quiet non-stimulating environment, he has regressed back into a depressed individual with blinds totally drawn, earphones around "home". Fortunately, he is still having a teleconference with his therapist once a month---and she REALLY didn't want him in this environment but thankfully he is stable on his meds. This is a gentleman who spent 5 years in a psychiatric hospital in Dallas and we are almost to undoing all the positive strides our budget put out. He is working at Bridgeways Enterprises at accepted salary, perfect attendance but let me tell a bit about this recent "journey". With a little bit of money saved he was cooking fresh vegetables he grew in his yard, went bike riding with a friend when not working, and LOVES his 2 yr perfect attendance PT job at Bridgeways. He's come so far Daddy in Heaven would not believe and is now locked into a year lease because of the lack of reasonable housing.

Let's think another way. For the last 16 years after I was widowed when my husband killed our beloved adopted then 5 yr old grandchild

and then himself(because of lack of resources in WA), I have been the Coordinator of the evidenced-based parent classes through NAMI (National Alliance of Mental Illness) and monthly Parent Support Group. Google me and read all the Herald and other articles that have been written about me working tirelessly for mental health care in Everett. I'm on the CDMH Advisory Board and have been a Board member of all the various names that group has held. I've had several state representatives visit our parent group to hear their cries as they have not had the resources in WA that we had in TX and especially our families with 20ish aged young adults existing totally in their bedrooms because they have nowhere to live. Several live in terror because the young adult is at times physically abusive and they have no where else for them to live. The stress on we parents comes screaming through in these Support Groups.

We MUST have housing decent housing for our youth, and young adults, unstably housed. The lack of resources in this state is criminal. Besides my beloved husband of 40 years and our precious grandchild, we've had several young adults seriously self-harm and one even stopped his medications and killed his mother. Are you proud of this????? HOW MUCH MORE CAN WE AS PARENTS TOLERATE???????

Dear County Council members,

My name is Mindy Woods and I am a single mom, Gulf War Navy veteran, and have experienced homelessness twice in Snohomish County in the last 10 years due to a lack of affordable and available rentals. I am writing in support of Ordinance 21-098, also known as HB 1590.

Prior to the pandemic, there were over 38,000 households in Snohomish County spending more than 50% of their income just on housing. The pandemic has only made this worse. There is a huge shortage of affordable rentals. Studio and 1-bedroom rentals are between \$1,000-\$1,500 month, and 2-bedrooms are between \$1,300-\$2,000 month. This prices out many people in our county, with nowhere to go. People receiving Social Security benefits in 2021 only brought in \$1,500 per month on average (many are lower!), leaving our most vulnerable residents, seniors and people with disabilities, extremely cost-burdened and unstably housed.

The biggest expenses for extremely low-income households are housing, transportation, and food, in that order. This tax will have very little impact on those spending categories. It is estimated that households making less than \$30,000 per year would spend \$9 per year should this tax be implemented. I would have gladly spent \$9 to have access to housing I could afford! This Ordinance would make a huge impact by doubling the current amount of affordable housing production in our county.

Ordinance 21-098 will raise approximately \$18-23M per year to help those who need it most; seniors on fixed incomes, veterans, families with school-age children, people with disabilities, and people earning lower wages. In my day job working in human services, these are the types of people I get calls from the most, and many are on the verge of falling off the financial cliff into homelessness if they haven't already. I've heard that some think that this is a regressive tax, but there is nothing more regressive than homelessness! These funds would also open the doors for vital grant-matching opportunities we are currently missing out on, dramatically increasing the investment into our people and communities. We are in a public health crisis, and unless we do something different, the problem will only continue to get worse and cost us much more.

Without this tax, and without more affordable housing and investments in behavioral health, we will continue to see more housing insecurity, more homelessness, and the associated costs of trying to re-shelter our neighbors. These costs manifest in healthcare, human and social services, law enforcement/emergency response, which are passed on to all taxpayers, with little to no benefit to those in need. Studies from around the world show what solves housing insecurity and homelessness: a roof over people's heads, and supportive services for those needing them. The bottom line, our communities are much stronger when everyone can get the support they may need and has access to a safe, affordable and healthy place to call home, where people can thrive and live up to their full potential.

We cannot keep sitting by and doing nothing, while more people suffer and die being unhoused and untreated. The Snohomish County's Longest Night count of people experiencing homelessness who've perished on the streets this year nearly doubled from before. You've been elected to represent ALL of the residents of Snohomish County, including those without homes and those who struggle with behavioral health challenges, and we cannot afford to waste another second addressing this issue. Like air and water, housing is an essential basic human need. I implore you, please vote yes on Ordinance 21-098 and be part of the solution in our county.

My family and I are recent additions to Snohomish County, having moved to Granite Falls from Seattle a little over a year ago. So please bear with me, as I am new to the issues we confront in this area. But I am perplexed (and concerned) by the move to raise property taxes now, given the impact of the events of the last several years:

- Selective lockdowns have put tremendous pressure on independent business owners, causing many to have to lay off employees or close doors outright;
- *Inflation* is high and getting worse, impacting everything from groceries to gas and beyond. This is a tangible hit to everyone's pocketbook;
- Vax Mandates are forcing people of conscience to make tough choices introducing financial

- uncertainty and/or hardship to hosts of families;
- Supply chain issues are causing shortages and putting further upward pressure on the costs of everyday necessities;
- Eviction moratoriums have impacted individual property owners who may rely on rental income to make ends meet;
- Proposed Vax "passports" would divide us into two classes, and depending on how draconian the measures become, may make it difficult for the un-vaccinated to obtain basic necessities. Adding even more uncertainty...

Perhaps you've considered these items and still believe that raising additional funds is a priority right now. I just don't believe it is a long term viable approach. I cannot name an area that used tax subsidized housing that has resulted in a successful resolution to the lack of affordable housing. A better solution, in my opinion, would be to increase the housing density per acre and increase the supply of available housing. There seems to be a resistance to building up as well as a resistance to utilize areas in unincorporated Snohomish County. Well planned developments, with mass transportation (light rail, trains, and busses) would increase housing availability and increase long term tax revenues. My name Mary Anne Dillon, Snohomish County Executive Director of the YWCA Seattle | King | Snohomish. YWCA has been a long time provider of services, emergency shelter, temporary and permanent affordable housing in Snohomish County. We have seen firsthand how affordable housing can change lives, strengthen families and transform communities. I am a resident of Edmonds and have been working in Snohomish County for 25 years. The county, the cities, the people have been talking for years about the need to address the lack of affordable housing and increasing numbers of people who are experiencing homeless...Talking for years while more people become homeless and more homeless people die in our parks, in our woods and in our neighborhoods. The Council has all the information it needs and knows we don't need a public vote to understand the need to build more affordable housing.

The Fair Market Rent for a two-bedroom apartment in Snohomish County is \$1,940. A household would need a total annual income of over \$77,000 (\$37.01hr) to afford this apartment, and there are more than 20,000 households in Snohomish County with annual incomes of \$34,500 or less. The math simply doesn't work. Passing ordinance 21-098 is an investment in the future of the over 3,000 school-age children living on the street, in cars, in hotel/motels or doubled-up with others. When people have a home, children do better in school, employment opportunities and income levels increase, medical & mental health outcomes are better and communities thrive and people prosper when everyone lives in a safe, healthy, affordable home. This sales tax is a very minimal effect to the taxpayer and will have a maximum effect for our community. This is a crisis that demands immediate action, not delay.

I support the sales tax increase to pay for more affordable housing and services because I value our community and understand there is nothing more regressive than homelessness.

I am writing to urge you to authorize a local revenue option to support housing for our most vulnerable neighbors in Snohomish County. As you know, we have extraordinary affordable and supported housing needs that require regional solutions. As a resident of Snohomish County, I support this action.

As a child, I watched my stepfather who served this country in the U.S. Navy during Desert Storm experience severe mental distress related to his service in the military upon return to civilian life. The police and the court system punished my stepfather for his mental health crisis, compounding the factors of our family experiencing chronic homelessness even though both parents worked two or more jobs. Snohomish County could not successfully house our family of six even in the late 90's as there was not enough housing or mental health support for families in crisis. In 2021 this is still tru today, there is not enough support for families and individuals who are met with unstable housing and mental health crises.

The reason I support this action is I am a person who has been living in poverty for thirty-seven years of my life. Twenty-five of those years have been spent in Snohomish County with housing instability and childhood poverty. I grew up homeless as a child in the Lynnwood and surrounding areas. I lived throughout elementary, high school and community college where I continued to experience housing instability and homelessness. I always had two jobs, but I still could not afford a stable apartment or establish a foundation to emerge out of poverty. The non-profit YWCA Pathways for Women in Lynnwood was the reason for our stable housing which has ensured that my child with special needs has a safe home and a secure foundation to thrive. The due diligence of the non-profits and individuals who support them have been doing the work which this ordinance will strengthen immensely. I am grateful to the YWCA and the many others who have continued to support and advocate for the critical needs in our community.

Snohomish County must work to ensure low-income people can thrive and when doing so it supports a stronger local economy and overall healthier community. No one is immune to sickness, poverty, or becoming homeless despite their previous life experiences. We must invest in our community especially our youth and those who cannot support themselves because as human beings they deserve nothing less. I applaud the county council members who have supported this ordinance, we are grateful for your leadership and dedication to ensure everyone in Snohomish County can have a safe and healthy home.

Unfortunately, I will not be able to attend Wednesday's public comment session regarding the proposed sales tax increase, Ordinance 21-098. I would like to state my opposition to this tax increase regardless.

I have written you all previously regarding my opposition to this tax, but I would like to reiterate some of what I have said before the public comment session tomorrow.

First, residents of Snohomish County are already paying enough in taxes. Many families are being taxed out of their homes due to skyrocketing property values. I believe it is extremely insensitive to propose a sales tax increase, which is a regressive tax, while we are seeing such instability in our region. People are losing jobs and businesses and we are experiencing record-breaking inflation. Inflation is increasing the prices of essential goods at the highest rate in 40 years - an estimated 9% in the Puget Sound region. Inflation alone is crippling average families. Please, do not add another tax burden on the backs of already strained taxpayers.

Next, I do not believe that the proposed tax increase, if implemented, would help the homelessness crisis. If we look to King County as an example, they have implemented similar programs, and the housing purchased by the County becomes a center for crime while homelessness is not meaningfully decreased. I too want to help our neighbors in need, but I do not think a regressive tax to purchase housing for the homeless is the way to do it. Snohomish County should use the funds it already has to find new and innovative ways to help our less fortunate neighbors. We should not follow the lead of failing programs already implemented in our State.

Finally, a decision of this magnitude and that raises such controversy should be sent to the People for a vote. I know every issue cannot be sent to the voters, but I believe this should be an exception. Let people speak their minds through a vote. I know many people who have strong opinions on this issue, but cannot take time out of their busy schedules to attend midday weekday meeting. Many don't even have time to send a well worded email. As a matter of fact, the only people I have spoken to about this who have time to comment are those who are retired. Please accept my written testimony regarding Ordinance 21-098, the local implementation of House Bill 1590. On behalf of Enterprise Community Partners, I am writing in strong support of the proposed ordinance to enact a 0.1% sales tax increase, countywide, for behavior health & affordable housing.

Enterprise is a national nonprofit that exists to make a good home possible for the millions of families without one. We support community development organizations on the ground, aggregate and invest capital for impact, advance housing policy at every level of government, and build and manage communities ourselves. Since 1982, we have invested \$44 billion and created 781,000 homes across all 50 states – all to make home and community places of pride, power and belonging.

In many of Washington's densely populated areas, housing is expensive. The combination of skyrocketing land costs, zoning and regulatory requirements, and labor and materials costs translate into high rents. Studio and 1-bedroom rents are \$1,000-\$1,500 per month and 2-bedroom rents can climb as high as \$2,000 per month. These rents are simply out of reach for many members of our community—people earning minimum wages in retail and restaurants, child and health care workers, seniors and people with disabilities.

Building affordable housing with public subsidy is a proven solution. By enacting HB 1590, Snohomish County will make our local affordable housing development proposals feasible and make them more competitive for state and federal resources such as the state Housing Trust Fund and the federal bond and tax credit programs administered by the Housing Finance Commission.

Even though a sales tax increase may not be our first choice, the 0.1% sales tax is the tool the legislature has granted local governments to tackle affordable housing. And, it is estimated that households earning \$30,000 a year or less will pay no more than \$9.00 a year in additional tax. Since the pandemic has only exacerbated the affordable housing crisis, Snohomish County can no longer wait to act.

Affordable housing is critical for our local communities. This ordinance is key to creating lasting solutions that move people to permanent, stable homes and help restore our region's economic and public health. When our neighbors are housed, children do better in school, employment opportunities increase, and health outcomes improve. I strongly encourage this Council to pass Ordinance 21-098 and enact HB 1590 for behavioral health & affordable housing, and a better Snohomish County.

Unfortunately, my schedule will not allow me to attend the hearing tomorrow regarding this proposed ordinance.

As I have spoken with both of you regarding this proposal I wanted to submit my comments for the record as a resident of Mill Creek (14604 32nd Dr SE, Mill Creek, WA 98012).

I believe a proposal like this should be put to the voters of Snohomish County and not adopted by "councilmatic" action.

I have substantive concerns with the proposed affordable housing tax. I liken this tax increase to treating a cold with Sudafed. It makes you feel better for a short time but doesn't do anything to address the underlying illness.

The fundamental and driving factor in our housing affordability crisis is the lack of supply of housing at all segments of the market. That lack of supply is driving the cost of land on which to build housing "through the roof" (pun intended). This housing tax will do nothing to increase the supply of land on which to build.

So if this tax were to be adopted, and without doing anything to address the lack of supply that is driving up land prices, the only choice going forward will be to keep increasing this tax in the future as the cost of housing continues to soar. That would be nothing but a band aid on a patient who is hemorrhaging.

Further, purporting to address housing affordability through an increase in the sales and use tax is not good public policy. The sales and use tax is regressive. It disproportionately impacts people at the lower end of the economic spectrum and will make the goods and services they buy more expensive; even more so given the current inflation in the economy. Thus, increasing the sales tax to address housing affordability would negatively impact the most the very people for whom you are trying to make housing more affordable.

Adopting this tax might make some feel better because they think they will be doing something for affordable housing. But this tax would do nothing to address the underlying causes that are driving the housing affordability crisis in Snohomish County and the Puget Sound region.

In closing, as a resident of Mill Creek I believe the decision whether to impose this tax should be left to the voters. Substantively, I do not support this tax for all the reasons I have stated.

I support the passage of Ordinance 21-098. It would raise approximately \$23M per year for affordable housing and behavioral health and double the current rate of affordable housing production in Snohomish County.

Right now, there are more than 20,000 households in Snohomish County with annual incomes of \$34,500 or less that are spending more than 50% of that income just on housing. The Fair Market Rent for a two-bedroom apartment in Snohomish County is \$2,099. A household would need a total annual income of \$83,960 (\$40.37hr) to afford this apartment.

In 2020, there were 1,132 people living unsheltered in Snohomish County and over 3,000 school-age children living on the street, in cars, in hotel/motels, or doubled and tripled-up with others in the 2019/20 school year.

When people have a home...

- Children do better in school
- Employment opportunities and income levels increase
- Medical & amp; mental health outcomes are better
- Communities thrive and people prosper when everyone lives in a safe, healthy, affordable home

It costs far less to house and treat someone than it does to jail them or take them to the emergency room. Each \$1 of local funding typically leverages \$10 of additional funding. This sales tax will raise approximately \$23M per year which translates into a potential \$230M investment in our people and our communities in Snohomish County. Building affordable housing creates high-wage construction jobs.

Getting people off the streets and into a safe, healthy, affordable home is a public safety measure. Housing and treatment are a much more effective and long-term solution to homelessness than a police response.

Children do better in school, adults do better in the job market and families thrive when they live in a safe, healthy, and affordable homes.

I am urging you to support passage of Ordinance 21-098 which will provide critical tax dollars to provide affordable housing and behavioral health facility funding.

No tax is ever met with enthusiasm, but few taxes reduce social costs in the way that housing supports do. The impact of inadequate housing is obvious to us all as we go down streets and freeways as well as in the doorways of our communities. In 1980 the State created the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment and Shelter Act (ADATSA) that demonstrated the tremendous impact offering housing with treatment services has on helping persons with behavioral health disorders to get back on their feet and become productive citizens. If you attend self-help groups today you can hear the long-term recovery stories of persons who started this journey in the early 1980's under the ADATSA program was documented to create huge cost savings to the State. Changing social policy changed this program over time, but it is clearly the most important program in the past 50 years to address the complexities of homelessness caused by underlying substance use and mental disorders.

Poverty and homelessness are also accompanied by intergenerational adverse effects. I know this because my own mother was among those who was permanently impacted by the horrible impact that homelessness has on families. As one of 9 children living in a tent city in this area during the Great Depression, the deep trauma, fear and shame she experienced during those homeless years left painful permanent scars and stories.

Evergreen Recovery Centers monthly see hundreds of homeless in our LEAD, treatment and family programs, Even individuals with jobs are unable to find affordable housing. In the past year I was working with Whatcom County, which passed this tax over a year ago, and was stimulated by the opportunities this tax creates.

1590 funding is an investment in an improved economy, reduced crime, and more jobs. And as the economy improves, there are more sales and revenues. Thank you for your consideration and compassion in supporting this important ordinance!

HB 1590 "Allowing the local sales and use tax for affordable housing to be imposed by a councilmanic authority" was signed into law by Governor Inslee and took effect on June 11, 2020. To date this has been implemented in various municipalities in our region.

Without question, we are living in a time and place of unaffordable housing as well as a shortage of housing that is safe and livable. Living without stable housing for anyone is dangerous and debilitating, but even more so for our children. In the Edmonds School District alone there are hundreds of unhoused students and their families. We must take steps to curtail generational homelessness.

I have been an active volunteer and advocate in the homeless community for many years. I have witnessed the instability that homelessness, lack of social services, and broken connection to society have on the most vulnerable.

Men and women often need to work two or more jobs to afford housing in our area. Government has grappled with housing issues for years and has been seemingly content to allow nonprofit organizations to shoulder the burden of finding locations, funding, partnerships, and development. The best time to provide for affordable housing was likely 20 years ago. The next best time is now.

In the last three years, much time and effort has been put forward by the Snohomish County HART Committee as well as Lynnwood's Housing Action Plan and Lynnwood City Council's Housing Policy Committee. <u>It is time to put those plans into action.</u>

I am adamant about moving the issue of affordable housing out of the shadows and into the light of all our community. Seeing homeless men, women, and

children in our parks, on our streets, and living in their cars is a constant reminder that we, as a society, have failed to provide for the most fragile in our community.

Obviously adding a new tax is never entered into lightly. Adding a .1% Sales Tax increase will cost taxpayers (in particular, those who are housed and more inclined to spend money on taxable items) an additional \$1 on every \$1,000 of purchases.

I ask that for every new housing unit created that long term services also be provided to those that need them. Services such as life skills classes, education, job training, mental health, physical health, and others are necessary to help heal the brokenness in our system. Simply putting a roof over someone's head is NOT enough. We must provide ways for people to grow, prosper, and provide for themselves and their families and thereby move out of homelessness and into stable and safe living.

I further ask that the cities whose sales tax base are the greatest contributors to this tax have representation on the board that will be governing these funds. Businesses in our city generate these funds and city representatives should have a voice at the table as to how they are to be appropriated.

I support your vote to implement HB 1590 in Snohomish County and hope that you consider my comments as you put HB 1590 into effect.

In a perfect world, you would be raising taxes on rental income, increasing excise real estate taxes on properties that 99% of residents in Snohomish County can not afford to buy, and also creating tax incentives for landlords who rent units at less-than-market value or who own a small number of rental properties. The housing affordability crisis has been upon us for years, and there was extensive public involvement and debate through the County's Housing Affordability Regional Taskforce process and when the legislature passed HB 1590. Public input through these initiatives have shared loud and clear that voters have repeatedly identified housing affordability and homelessness as their top concern. This Ordinance is in direct response to voters who have asked for a more proactive response to solve this matter.

This Ordinance was introduced on December 1 and the standard two-week notice was given for the Public Hearing on December 15 at 10:30am and the issue was discussed in a committee meeting on December 13th at 1:30 pm. Your email has been added as public record, and if you would like to share any further comments, you're more than welcome to

join the Public Hearing meeting on December 15th, or email the full council at contact.council@snoco.org. I understand how important this issue is, so please know that I took your comments into consideration, and I will continue to support taking action to address this crisis.
