RE: Legislative Report – Week 4

Friday, January 28 marked the 19th day of the 2022 Legislative Session. Committees are still holding hearings on new bills and moving bills out of committee. Bills are continuously being revised as they move through the legislative process. As of Friday, January 28, a total of 1,132 bills have been introduced in the House and 990 in the Senate. One week remains until the first legislative deadline, Thursday, February 3, when all policy bills must be voted out of their policy committee to remain under consideration. Bills approved by policy committees that have an impact on the state budgets will be referred to a second fiscal committee, which will evaluate the financial implications of the bill. Bills must move out of their respective fiscal committee by Monday, February 7 to remain under consideration. Given the proximity of these deadlines, it is highly likely that fiscal committees will be working the weekend of February 5.

Legislative Priorities

Increase Counties' Share of Marijuana Revenue for Behavioral Health and SUD Treatment Snohomish County requests that the legislature increase counties' share of marijuana revenue to be used for behavioral health and substance use disorder treatment programs. We have been working on a strategy to provide Snohomish County with additional marijuana revenue for behavioral health and SUD treatment through <u>Senate Bill 5796</u>, sponsored by Sen. Rebecca Saldana (D- Seattle) and



Sen. Derek Stanford (D- Bothell), which restructures cannabis revenue appropriations. Last week, we shared language for an amendment with Sen. Saldana and Sen. Stanford; unfortunately, the bill moved out of committee without our requested amendment. We spoke with Sen. June Robinson (D-Everett) over the weekend on this issue. Sen. Robinson is potentially open to amending the bill in the Ways and Means Committee with our language; however, she will need to check with other members to identify the bill's path forward. Meanwhile, Councilmember Dunn will be checking with Sen. Saldana to see why our language was not advanced in committee, and Josh will talk with Sen. Stanford.

Regional Apprenticeship Pathways Program

Snohomish County's Regional Apprenticeship Pathways Program (RAP) received \$1.5 million in both the 2019–21 biennium and in the 2021-23 biennium; however, the County has not been successful at securing ongoing investment of \$1.5 million/biennium to support the program. We are looking for potential opportunities to advance our goal this legislative session. We are also looking for chances to support expansion of apprenticeship programs statewide.

<u>House Bill 1536</u>, sponsored by Rep. Jacquelin Maycumber (R- Republic), establishes statewide regional apprenticeship programs under Educational Service Districts (ESD). Councilmember Nehring reached out to Rep. Maycumber to request an amendment to the bill that grandfathers the RAP program to ensure that funding remains whole. The bill was scheduled move out of committee last week, but has been rescheduled to Tuesday; we will be monitoring to see if the language is included.

Senate Bill 5575 – Adding Superior Court Judges

Snohomish County supports <u>Senate Bill 5575</u>, funding 2 additional superior court judges in Snohomish County. This bill is brought forward by the Administrative Office of the Courts on the County's behalf and is sponsored by Sen. John Lovick (D- Mill Creek) and Sen. June Robinson (D-Everett). The bill has been amended to require documentation of the County's approval of the additional positions and agreeing to pay for the associated costs. The bill has been referred to the Senate Ways and Means Committee and is scheduled for a hearing on Thursday, February 3. GTHGA will testify at the hearing to inform the Committee that the County has budgeted for their share of costs.

Transportation

GTHGA and Snohomish County Public Works staff met with the lobbyists and staff for the cities of Lake Stevens and Everett on Monday, January 24, to discuss US 2 Trestle strategy, following our meeting with Sen. Marko Liias (D- Lynnwood) last week. We are on the same page as the cities on our messaging for the trestle and will continue to work closely on our transportation advocacy. On Thursday, GTHGA and the lobbyists for Lake Stevens and Everett met with Rep. Emily Wicks (D-Everett) to ensure we remain coordinated between the House and Senate.

At Sen. Liias's recommendation, we have drafted a letter in support of passing a transportation package this session. County staff is currently reviewing this letter; once the language is finalized, we will distribute the letter to our partners, including SCCIT.

We are also circulating an amendment for <u>Senate Bill 5528</u>, which authorizes Sound Transit to establish "enhanced service zones" within certain parts of the RTA, allowing voters to approve additional financial investments to speed up system improvements in certain areas. GTHGA and



Public Works staff drafted language that would address the County's concerns, and provided it to Sen. Liias. Sound Transit staff are currently reviewing the language and we are waiting to hear if there are any concerns. The bill has not been scheduled for executive session and must move out of committee before February 7 to continue to be considered.

Transportation Revenue Package Negotiations Continue

As previously reported, the House and Senate Transportation Chairs, Rep. Jake Fey (D-Tacoma) and Sen. Marko Liias (D- Lynnwood), and their negotiating teams continue to work out an agreement for a "mini-package" this session. The Chairs reported this week that they are close to an agreement on revenue components of the package; now, their conversations will shift to identifying investments. It is expected that an outline of the investment package will be shared publicly at the end of this week.

Other Items

Stormwater Jurisdiction – House Bill 1996/Senate Bill 5742

This week, <u>House Bill 1996</u> and companion <u>Senate Bill 5742</u>, sponsored by Rep. Drew MacEwan (R-Allyn) and Sen. Jim Honeyford (R- Sunnyside), were heard in their respective local government committees. This legislation would prevent the County from collecting stormwater fees within a drainage or diking district boundary. It also creates uncertainty around NPDES permit jurisdiction. Based on SWM staff recommendation, the County opposed these bills at the hearings. We provided County staff's comments to Sen. Jesse Salomon (D- Shoreline), Rep. Davina Duerr (D- Bothell) and Rep. April Berg (D- Mill Creek), prior to the hearings. Fortunately, we have heard from House Local Government Chair, Rep. Gerry Pollet (D- Seattle), that this bill will likely not advance this session, and the Senate version of the bill has not been scheduled to move out of committee.

Governor Request Riparian Habitat Bill - House Bill 1838

The prime sponsor, Rep. Debra Lekanoff (D- Bow) has indicated that Governor's request legislation to establish and protect riparian management zones, <u>House Bill 1838</u> and companion <u>Senate Bill 5727</u>, will no longer be considered this year. In lieu, Rep. Lekanoff will be advancing her legislation from last year, House Bill 1777 (see below). In the Senate, the Senate Agriculture, Water, Natural Resources, and Parks Committee will be hosting a work session on the Governor's salmon recovery package on Thursday, February 3, at 1:30 p.m. County staff may join the work session.

Salmon Recovery in the GMA – House Bill 1117

This week, <u>House Bill 1117</u>, sponsored by Rep. Debra Lekanoff (D- Bow), was moved out of the House Rules Committee and voted out of the House 57-40. This bill establishes salmon recovery as a goal of the GMA and implements a standard of "net ecological gain." WSAC negotiated a null and void clause last session and will be supporting the bill in its current form. Staff flagged potential fiscal impacts on county projects.

Microtrenching – House Bill 1722

Public Works staff have raised concerns about <u>House Bill 1722</u>, sponsored by Rep. Matt Boehnke (R-Kennewick), which requires cities and counties to allow microtrenching. Among other concerns, this bill bypasses franchise agreements, preempts local control over permitting, and creates issues for road maintenance and preservation. In anticipation of bill advancement, we asked delegation members sitting on the House Local Government Committee Rep. Davina Duerr (D- Bothell) and Rep. April Berg (D- Mill Creek) to sponsor a striking amendment that would establish a workgroup on



broadband best practices. The bill is scheduled for executive session on Wednesday; we have heard the bill will either be amended to reflect these changes or will not advance.

Community Property Assessed Clean Energy Program (CPACER) Fix - Senate Bill 5862

<u>Senate Bill 5862</u>, sponsored by Sen. Liz Lovelett (D- Anacortes), implements changes requested by the County Treasurers Association to the Community Property Assessed Clean Energy Program (CPACER) that limits their liability. Snohomish County staff has assessed this bill and determined it would be beneficial to the County, which will implement a program soon. We will look for opportunities to support this bill as it advances.

Supreme Court Rules on Ballot Box Unfunded Mandate Lawsuit

WSAC, Snohomish, Kittitas and Whitman Counties filed suit challenging that <u>Senate Bill 5472</u> (Ballot Drop Box Bill) was a violation of RCW 43.135.060 the state prohibition of new or expanded programs without full reimbursement. Though the county plaintiffs were successful at Superior Court, the Supreme Court overturned the lower ruling and found that counties are entitled only to reimbursement for the state's proportional share of the new costs. The entire <u>Supreme Court opinion may be found here.</u>

Changes to the Long-Term Care Act Signed Into Law

On January 27, Governor Inslee signed two bills that make modifications to the Long-Term Care Act, a program to provide long-term care benefits to Washington workers, funded through a 0.58% payroll tax. As anticipated, both bills have moved quickly through the legislative process, receiving a public hearing, a vote out of Committee, and a full vote out of the Senate this week. While Republicans have continued to call for a full repeal of the program, many voted in favor of both bills.

- <u>House Bill 1732</u> delays the implementation from January 1, 2022, to July 1, 2023 (18 months). This bill also addresses near retirement age workers by allowing a person born before January 1, 1968, who has not met the duration requirements, including payment of the premium, to be eligible for the program at the percentage of years paid into the program. It also provides that any premiums collected from the employee prior to July 1, 2023, shall be refunded to the employee within 120 days of the collection of the premiums.
- <u>House Bill 1733</u> allows disabled veterans, spouses, or domestic partners of active-duty service members, nonimmigrant visa holders, and Washington workers who hold residence outside of the state to seek exemption from the program. The bill stipulates that should the status qualifying a worker for the exemption change for any of the groups outside of disabled veterans, their exemption will be discontinued.

Clarifying Police Reform Proposals

The legislature continues to grapple with the best policies to address the unintended consequences from the passage of multiple police reform bills last session. With the first cutoff approaching, several bills are still in committee and may or may not advance this session. Below is the latest:

 <u>House Bill 1719</u>, sponsored by Rep. Dan Bronoske (D- Lakewood), clarifies that bean bags can be used as a de-escalation tactic. This past week the House voted unanimously to advance this bill.



- House Bill 1735, sponsored by Rep. Jesse Johnson (D- Federal Way), also passed out of the House by a vote of 90-5. The bill clarifies that deadly force may be used in the face of an immediate threat of serious injury against the officer or another individual, and that physical force would be allowed under limited circumstances to ensure the safety of officers when taking a person into custody for civil or forensic commitment (ITA). It eliminates the broad provision regarding enforcement of a court order and more narrowly authorizes physical force in specific circumstances. It also modifies the provision allowing a peace officer to use physical force to the extent necessary to take a minor into protective custody by removing references to specific statutes. Instead, an officer may do so when "authorized or directed by statute."
- Rep. Roger Goodman (D- Seattle) introduced House Bill 2037, in response to the request to . define "physical force." At the public hearing this week, 46 people were signed in to testify. Over 2,400 people signed in not testifying, with the overwhelming majority opposed. Those in support of House Bill 2037 stated the need for clear definitions of what "use of force" means. Supporters want to see a continuity across the state for training standards and give officers the tools they need to investigate crimes during Terry stops. Officers and city officials shared that police have been struggling with confusion about the new laws and this bill would provide clarity for what is allowed during investigatory stops and detentions. Many opponents of the bill are family members of victims of police killings and find it problematic to allow officers broad authority to use physical force to detain someone without reasonable suspicion. Opponents have shared concerns that this leads to misuse of deadly force when someone resists due to fear of law enforcement and pain caused by physical force. Police accountability advocates expressed that escalation from a Terry stop may lead to obstructing an investigation and resisting arrest which, under state law, allows an officer to use harsher physical force, including deadly force. There does seem to be some confusion with legislators and testifiers regarding felonies and misdemeanors, and what constitutes reasonable suspicion. The bill is scheduled for executive session this week, either Tuesday, February 1, or Thursday, February 3.
- <u>House Bill 1788</u>, sponsored by Eric Robertson (R- Sumner), had a public hearing in the House Public Safety Committee this week. The bill would restore the ability of law enforcement to engage in vehicular pursuits if there is reasonable suspicion that a person in the vehicle has committed, or is committing, a criminal offense. Legislation passed in 2021 limited vehicular pursuits to instances when an officer has probable cause that the person has committed, or is committing: a violent offense, sex offense, or escape, or there is reasonable suspicion the person has committed, or is committing, a DUI, or is an imminent threat to the safety of others. The bill is scheduled to be voted out of the House Public Safety committee this week, either Tuesday, February 1, or Thursday, February 3.
- <u>House Bill 1507</u>, sponsored by Rep. Debra Entenmann (D- Covington), builds on legislation enacted during the 2021 legislative session to establish an Office of Independent Investigations for instances of police use of force that result in serious bodily injury or death. House Bill 1507 would establish independent prosecutorial authority within the Attorney General's Office that would apply concurrently to local prosecutorial authority. The Washington Association of Prosecuting Attorneys testified against the bill, indicating that they believe constitutional issues remain with the proposal. The bill was scheduled to be voted out of committee last week but no



action was taken. It is scheduled for executive action again on Tuesday, February 1, or Thursday, February 3.

Senate Bill 5919, sponsored by Sen. Kevin Van de Wege (D- Sequim), allows an officer to • engage in a vehicular pursuit if there is reasonable suspicion (rather than probable cause) that a person in the vehicle has committed or is committing a violent offense or sex offense, an escape, a DUI, a crime against a person, or another criminal offense where the public safety risks of failing to apprehend or identify the person are considered greater than the safety risks of the vehicular pursuit under the circumstances. The bill also includes a statewide definition of physical force that seems to align with the Criminal Justice Training Commission definition, and allows force in some additional scenarios not contemplated in last year's legislation preventing a person from fleeing a lawful detention by a peace officer: carrying out a warrant or other court order directing an officer to take a person into custody; ensuring the safety of an officers or others when encountering a person reasonably suspected of possessing firearms or other dangerous weapons, or when conducting a search of other lawful activity that reasonable creates a high risk of danger to the officer or another person. It states that de-escalation tactics and less lethal alternatives should be used when safe and feasible rather than possible, and that a proportional amount of physical force be used to overcome resistance, rather than the least amount of force. The bill is scheduled for a public hearing on Tuesday, February 1, and for executive action on Thursday, February 3.
