On behalf of the undersigned Snohomish County mayors represented by the Mayors and Business Leaders for Public Safety coalition, we are writing to convey our support for Ordinance 23-046, relating to the use and possession of controlled or counterfeit substances.

Currently, cities in Snohomish County and across Washington state are looking to enact laws governing the possession or public use of illegal drugs in our communities. RE: Support for Statewide Approach to Substance Use Disorder and Recovery Options

To Whom It May Concern:

As individually elected officials, community members, advocates, and allies, we support the following: a public health and statewide approach to end illegal drug use and for those struggling with substance use disorder and untreated addiction to have access to recovery options and pathways to stability. We need tools to address the rising use of harmful drugs and we need to prioritize treatment and recovery for substance use disorder.

The increasing amount of drug use in our communities and its residual effects is an issue that impacts us all. We are encouraged that the State Legislature will reconvene and find consensus on a fix to public consumption of illegal substances laws and pass critical funds for treatment.

Local ordinances come with many unaddressed details and only exacerbates the confusion caused by a patchwork approach towards a solution. Additionally, the local ordinances do not include the funding needed to close the gap in treatment and workforce needs.

Law enforcement is undecided on the approach for this issue, Fraternal Order of Police issued a statement on 4/13/2023 calling for a statewide solution and stressed, "the three pillars of effectively dealing with substance abuse disorder cases include: treatment, accountability, and consequences." These rank-and-file officers have stressed to the legislature that the best solution, from enforcement to funding consistency, is a workable, consistent <u>statewide</u> approach.

Municipalities and the State must do their fair share to ensure access to services, including treatment centers, low barrier housing, expanding the recovery navigator program to improve capacity and workforce, pre-arrest/post-arrest/pre-trial diversion and therapy courts, and other solutions.

We are concerned that misinformation campaigns have falsely claimed that the proposed bills allow "safe consumption sites" and "safe injection sites" which is confusing residents and adds to stigmatism of this disease. Washington State has no safe injection sites.

Incarcerating people for addiction is the costliest and least effective way to help a person on a path towards recovery and stability. Jails are ill-equipped and inappropriate for people struggling with addiction. As elected officials and community leaders, we are asking you to join us in focusing resources on prevention, detox facilities, treatment facilities, and other proven measures that give people the tools they need to set them up for success.

We, the undersigned, encourage proper due diligence, ensuring all voices are at the table, and allowing the Washington State Legislature to pass common sense reforms and fund necessary treatment options.
