Subject: 2022-2023 Annual Reports for the Puget Sound Taxpayer Accountability

Act (PSTAA) Interlocal Agreements

The reported fund allocations for each school and school district are higher than what is shown in the 2022-2023 Services and Expenditure Plans. This is pursuant to Ordinance 22-072¹, which allowed the Executive to reallocate unspent funds from previous programs years to

PSTAA recipients.

<u>Background:</u> The State of Washington Legislature established the Puget Sound Taxpayers Accountability Act (PSTAA) account pursuant to RCW 43.79.520².

On November 9, 2021, the Snohomish County Council passed the 2022 budget providing \$1,660,000³ in expenditure authority for PSTAA revenues.

On August 17, 2022, the Snohomish County Council passed amendments to Interlocal Agreements for each participating school or school district which adopted their proposed Service and Expenditure plans for the 2022-2023 program year.

Each ILA contained language indicating that the receiving school "shall submit to the County an annual report detailing the use and effectiveness of PSTAA funds based on

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metrics identified in the Services and Expenditure Plan" by October 30 of the following program year in which the funds were expended.

On August 15, 2023, Council approved Motion 23-334⁴ amending the Edmonds School District 2022-2023 Services and Expenditure plan, changing the early learning service provider from the King County YMCA to the Foundation for Edmonds School District.
