6. Committee of the Whole

Nicole Gorle, Sr. Legislative Analyst, provided background information leading to this proposed ordinance and explained the current proposal. She said this ordinance would go into effect on July 1st of this year. [see written staff report for detail in link on the agenda 2023-0476]

Councilmembers Peterson and Dunn shared several concerns with setting an early time and date for a public hearing on May 17th, including not enough time to answer and/or clarify questions, do outreach, discuss with the courts, training for public offices, keep pressure on the State, and finding out what other jurisdictions are doing.

Vice-Chair Nehring explained why he thought it was critical to move quickly on this ordinance. Chair Mead agreed and provided comments in support of moving forward.

Responding to Councilmember Peterson, Chair Mead said meetings can be held next week for follow up discussion.

Councilmember Dunn commented on timing and explained that Councilmember Peterson and she do want to meet the needs of the community, they are asking for more time for due diligence and need more than two weeks to review.

Councilmember Peterson listed his concerns in more detail. He said he believes Council should absolutely move forward; he is just not supportive of the May 17th public hearing date.

ACTION: Vice-Chair Nehring made a motion to set time and date for a public hearing for May 17, 2023, at the hour of 10:30 a.m. Councilmember Low seconded the motion.

Councilmember Dunn encouraged councilmembers to vote no to show the State what a robust process looks like. She commented briefly on bi-partisan process and encouraged a later public hearing date.

Councilmember Peterson provided additional comments also asking for a no vote and a delay.

Chair Mead explained that he is supportive of May 17th. He said after discussions next week, if it is necessary, the hearing date can be re-visited.

The question was called for and the motion to set time and date for a public hearing for May 17th at the hour of 10:30 a.m. carried three to two with Councilmembers Dunn and Peterson voting no.
