- The Growth Management Act (GMA) and the Snohomish County Comprehensive Plan direct Snohomish County to identify and encourage the preservation of land, sites, and structures that have historical or archaeological significance.
- Existing archaeological resource procedures for archaeological survey reports, permit approvals for properties that contain documented archaeological sites that cannot be avoided, and the inadvertent discovery of archaeological resources and skeletal human remains do not align with current state laws related to the regulation of archaeological resources.
